grams in partnership, generate specific programs and seminars open to police and student populations, and for the OPP to consider new ways of selecting and recruiting directly from Humber's Police Foundations program.

"The two organizations share a commitment to quality training and education for OPP staff and Humber Police Foundations students as it contributes to enhanced policing and society," said William H. Currie, OPP Deputy Commissioner, Strategic Services.

"This agreement is of mutual benefit to Humber's academic programming and the officer training requirements of the OPP," said Dr. Robert A. Gordon, President, Humber College. "This partnership speaks to the OPP's commitment to a lifelong learning environment for its personnel, and the fact that the OPP is looking at ways to recruit

Beginning in Fall 2002, this learning partnership is expected to evolve and develop over its five-year term to support a total human resource development strategy for the OPP workforce. It will cover recruiting

and in-service training through to degree completion for all OPP staff, including high command officers. Humber faculty and OPP instruc-

tors will take part in exchanges that will allow professionals in both organizations to bring their teaching expertise to the other. Humber Police Foundations students will have the opportunity to interact directly with OPP personnel and officers who will be in the classroom, making use of Humber College facilities and taking part in convocation ceremonies.

"This learning partnership will offer Greater Toronto Region staff a range of opportunities to pursue further education," said OPP Greater Toronto Region Commander Peter Burns. "It will also bring us into closer contact with potential future recruits for our organization."

Humber Interns in High Demand

Many local businesses make use of the unique skills of Humber students through internship programs. Increasingly, students are even being asked to continue on as employees after their internships are finished.

Hannah Skeete, a recent Humber Human Resource Management Postgraduate program graduate, was selected from a sea of more than 6,000 applicants to take part in The Ontario Internship Program. Each year100 students are hired for twoyear internships in areas within the government such as finance, communications, policy, human resources, information technology and organizational development. During the 24 months, students are rotated between three ministries throughout the province, and these coveted internships not only include a regular salary, but benefits and vacation as well! The program has grown rapidly since its inception in 1999, with the number of applicants tripling since the establishment of the program. Approximately 76 per cent of these interns continue working with the government after the two-year period.

Skeete, who is currently working in Organizational Development at the Ministry of the Environment, is responsible for orientation, job fairs and coordinating summer student positions. "It's a good program and a great way to gain experience, and my HR-specific training from Humber prepared me really well for this position," says Skeete.

Ed Smyda illustrates another internship gone right. A student in the Business Administration program (marketing profile), Smyda was hired by the Old Cabbagetown Business Improvement Area, an organization that contacted Humber early in the year looking for an intern. The organization was created in an effort to promote the independent Cabbagetown-area merchants and to encourage new business and employment in Old Cabbagetown, through research, marketing and cooperative promotions. "When I get someone from Humber with the latest marketing trends and expertise under their belt, it's a tremendous pay-off for us. We get the kind of help that we couldn't afford to pay for. I really, really depend on him. It's a real contribution," says Joice Guspie, Manager of Old Cabbagetown Business Improvement Area. Some of the projects Smyda worked on during his internship include organizing a Valentine's week promotion; initiating and implementing the Merchants-ofthe-Month program; redesigning the Old Cabbagetown Web site; finding corporate sponsors and helping to coordinate the 2002 Old Cabbagetown Festival. Smyda was hired on for the summer. Humber internships not only provide students with practical work experience, they also give companies the opportunity to give back to the community while testing a student's fit with the company. The company can also get short-term projects done proficiently and economically. Ontario Post-Production Training Centre in Full Swing

ey industry personnel and Ontario government officials saw first hand, state-of-the-art post-production training options, including a demonstration of the VICON 8 Motion Capture system, at the official opening of the Ontario Post-Production Training Centre (OPTC) at Humber last February. The OPTC is a joint venture between Humber College and the Strategic Skills Investment Program of the provincial Ministry of Economic Development and Trade. The Centre offers a one-year Post-Production Certificate program, as well as lifelong learning opportunities for professionals, including members of the Directors Guild of Canada, who wish to keep their skills current. The first class of Post-Production Certificate students graduated in the Summer of 2002.

"It's not hard to tell that the Ontario Post-Production Training Centre will be a very strong force in a very progressive industry, for many years to come," said the Honourable Bob Runciman, Minister of Economic Development and Trade.


Currently, the three-semester Post-Production Certificate program accommodates 26 students, and standards for admission are high. Students are given exposure to a wide variety of post-production platforms in three principle craft areas: picture editing, sound effects and visual effects.

> Also, "The professional experience and industry connections of the faculty are invaluable," said Marnie Soloneka, a student in the Post-Production program.

"I'm impressed with the variety of post-production software we are exposed to. Most schools don't come close to the breadth of platforms that this Post program covers," said Steve Budd, student. "A constant touchstone of the curriculum is how things are done in the professional world," added Joel Davies, student.

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
Students Set the Stage for Pope's Visit

Humber Landscape Technician students set the stage for World Youth Day (WYD) 2002. The international youth conference and papal visit to Canada drew hundreds of thousands of people from 150 countries to Toronto from July 18th -28th. Eighteen Humber students accepted the honour of preparing the stage and surrounding area at Downsview Lands, the site of the culmination of WYD, the Evening Vigil and Papal Mass. Both events were presided over by Pope John Paul II.

Michael Madden, chief designer for the project, discovered the talents of Humber Landscape students in March at the Canada Blooms show. He discussed the possibility of these students participating in the WYD project with Landscape Technician Program Co-ordinator, Harry Chang, who thought the project would be well suited for students in pre-apprenticeship Landscape Design looking to gain experience. The students set to work on the project, which consisted of a 40,000 square foot stage with seating for 1,300, surrounded by 1,000 blue flowering plants meant to symbolize water, as well as 1,500 shrubs and trees.

"The project involved construction, pre-cast paving, a retaining wall and planting. The students found it a great experience to be involved in such a high-profile project with a broad range of landscaping activities to work on," said Chang.





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


CCAA 2001-2002 Athletic Director of the Year

The national contest required students to design and build a robot for competition in this event, where science is turned into sport. Graduating Fashion Arts Students Present Hourglass





Update on the new University of Guelph-Humber

Construction is in full swing on the University of Guelph-Humber's new academic building. The construction crane went up in mid-April, and the foundation was completed in June. Completion of the new building is planned for September 2003, in time to help accommodate the growing demand for college and university education caused by the 'double cohort' and the rapid expansion of the Toronto area.

The new university will have specialized laboratories, an Internet café, a learning commons, a student-run art gallery and an atrium for major lectures and events. The Ontario government's SuperBuild program has provided \$28.6 million towards the cost of construction. Construction is being managed by Ball Construction Inc. of Kitchener, which has built more than 40 academic buildings in Ontario.

The first Guelph-Humber students will start class this September, using newly renovated space at Humber's North Campus. More than 1,400 students applied this year for the 200 spots currently available in Business, Media Studies and Computing. In 2003, new programs will be added in Justice Studies and Police Foundations, Early Childhood Studies, Family and Community Social Services and Gerontology.

By 2005, the University is expected to enrol 2,000 students annually. Admission standards are the same as those at the University of Guelph, which is ranked highest in Canada for students who enter with averages above 75 per cent.

The University of Guelph-Humber Web site was launched in September of 2001 and received approximately 800 hits per day throughout the winter recruitment season. The expansion of the site paid off in April when it received the silver medal in the 2002 Canadian Council for the Advancement of Education (CCAE) Prix d'Excellence competition.

The University of Guelph-Humber is the first institution to offer both a degree and a diploma in just four years of study. It is a new option for students looking to live in Toronto while completing their post-secondary education, complementing the three other universities in the Toronto area.

Humber Dean Receives Provincial and National Awards

Anne Bender, Dean of the School of Health Sciences and Associate Vice President, Quality Assurance, has been honoured both provincially and internationally this year with awards for administrative excellence and academic leadership. Bender received the Doug Light Award for Administrative Excellence from the Ontario College Administrative Staff Association (OCASA) and the Dean's Award for Academic Leadership from the College of Extended Learning, Central Michigan University (CMU).

The Doug Light Award, named after the first Dean of Faculty at Humber and later President of Centennial College and George Brown College, honours an Ontario college administrator for leadership, excellence in administration and contribution to others. "I feel very honoured to have my work recognized by my peers at OCASA," says Bender. "The award is especially meaningful given that Mr. Light

She has been a Director of the Registered Nurses Association of Ontario and in 1998 was the only nursing educator on the Ontario Nursing Task Force, established to advise the government on ways in which the province's health care system could be improved through nursing services. She served as Member and Chair of the Advisory Committee on Nursing Manpower for three years,

Humber's Student Demographic Changing

n the past twenty years, what has been the biggest change in the classroom at Humber College? A first impression might be that we have aged. For example, from the

Statistics show an increase in students with university experience taking a career program at

The most consequential change in the educational background of the student body from 1979/80 to 1999/ 00 is the increase in the number of students who have post-secondary experience. In 1979/80, the registrar's records show that 5.4% of the students had partial university experience and only 1.9% of the students had a university degree before registering at Humber. By 1999/00, 6.2% of the students had partial university experience and 12.4% of Humber's students had completed a university degree.

Students enrolled in Humber's Community Music School won ten Gold and a Silver medal at the 2002 MusicFest Canada National Competition held this Spring in Calgary, Alberta.

The students, ranging in age from 11 to 19 years, won in the Jazz Combo Division. Many have been studying at Humber since they were three or four years old.

And, if that isn't impressive enough, Adam Arruda, 13, won the Zildjian Young Drummer Award (the fourth consecutive Humber student to win the award), and Tyler Harrison, a saxophone player, won a \$500 scholarship to Humber. Harrison was also selected to perform with the Yamaha All-Star Band.

school year 1979/80 to 1999/00, the number and proportion of students 24 years of age and older attending Humber doubled from 12% to 24%.

The most significant factor affecting the classroom today, however, is that the students' educational level at entry into the College has changed. In 1979/80, over half of Humber's students had come to college out of grade 12. However, by 1999/00, just over a quarter of the students had this educational background. Another quarter of the students had completed one to five O.A.C. courses, and 13% had completed six O.A.C. courses (previously referred to as grade 13).

These statistics show a huge increase in the number and the proportion of students with university experience taking a career program at Humber. With the further development of Humber offering degree programs, this trend will become even more significant. A new reality and a new character of student body may begin to emerge at Humber over the next decade. By 1999/00, Humber had responded to student demand by adding postgraduate, career oriented diplomas and certificates to its curriculum and 6.2% of the students now had partial university experience and 12.4% of Humber's students had completed a university degree.



The Guttman Award, a piece of wood with glasses and a fannypack around the middle, was conceived and designed by Ladyshewsky and meant to resemble its namesake.




Humber Design Students Compete at the International Level

Humber College students placed third in the World Automotive Design Competition held at the Toronto Skydome and Metro Toronto Convention Centre as part of the Canadian International Auto Show. Professionals in the automotive industry made up the jury for the competition.

Students from six prestigious design schools from around the world were asked to design the 'ideal shared mobility vehicle'. The plan was to take into account the uniqueness of their city and country as well as to provide an overall pleasing design. Humber's thirdyear industrial design students, Andy Anissimoff, Bruno Mediati and Jeff Young, placed third overall for their vehicle, the *Shair*, earn-

ing them \$2,500 US. The Humber students' design was recognized for its well-researched plan that stayed close to the design brief.

"It took some time to develop the concept," said Anissimoff. "All they said was 'a shared mobility vehicle', so it could have been a plane or rail design or anything. We really had to look at Toronto and at the people who inhabit the city."

Based on the PT Cruiser platform, the *Shair* is powered by a 1.3 L Mazda rotary engine and is fueled by hydrogen with a CVT transmission. With its plastic modular body panels and a top speed of 200 km/h, the *Shair* concept is only a few years away from being street legal.

Humber students were at a disadvantage in this competition because, unlike their competitors, the Humber design program does not specialize in automotive design, making their accomplishments even more significant.

"We're very proud of our students, especially bearing in mind that they were competing with fourth and fifth-year university students from around the world. This award is a reflection of the quality of education here at Humber," said Ken Cummings, Industrial Design Program Coordinator, Humber School of Applied Technology.

Organizers are already planning the second World Automotive Design Competition for 2003 and expect to make it an annual event at the Auto Show.




International Students at Humber: Numbers on the Rise


son, Team Manager and Executive Chef, House of Commons, Ottawa. "It is important to inspire the next generation of competitive chefs!"
