

GENERAL STUDIES CERTIFICATE PROGRAMME part-time

Length of Program: 8 half courses

Description:

The General Studies Certificate program is offered to members of the community who are interested in developments in the world around them and who recognize how some study and learning can make these developments more understandable.

Developments in such areas as urban living, psychology, mysticism, family life, separatism in Canada, prejudice and the energy crisis, to name but a few, become much clearer following study and discussion. Humber College is introducing this year, for the first time, a certificate program in General Studies. People

who complete the required courses will have full credit for the general education component for any program in the Humber College calendar. In addition, many universities recognize Humber courses for admissions purposes.

Requirements of the Program:

To obtain a certificate in General Studies, a person would complete eight half courses (7 weeks in length) or four full courses (14 weeks). Students with Grade XIII or post-secondary courses may obtain up to half of their requirements by exemption. Under certain circumstances persons without formal study but with extensive experience can have that experience recognized through exemption.

Areas of Specialization:

Two areas of Specialization within the General Studies certificate program are recognized :

1. CANADIAN STUDIES: six of the eight courses from those marked (CS)

Canadian Studies courses are currently the fastest-growing and most important areas of study in Canada today. By choosing the Canadian Studies Specialization, a student may gain the benefits of the General Studies Certificate as well as taking the advantage of studying his country from the most up to date points of view taught by experts in the subject.

2. SOCIAL SCIENCES: six of the nine courses from those marked (SS)

The social sciences are the sciences of human behaviour, the sciences of the Twentieth Century. Psychology, sociology, anthropology, economics and political science have transformed the life of man and his under-standing of himself. A student who chooses the Social Science Specialization will be studying these sciences taught by experts in each area.

URBAN SURVIVAL CERTIFICATE PROGRAMME part-time

Length of Program: 8 half courses

Description:

The Urban Survival Certificate program involves a study of those aspects of urban life which most affect and raise problems for people living in an urban society. Survival and successful living today in our society depends upon a good knowledge of a number of areas seldom encountered in a person's education but which become more important as the days pass.

Topics such as energy and fuel conservation, home improvement and repair, financial management, family safety, the city garden, bureaucracy and raising children, among others, will be stresses in this program.

Requirements of the Program:

To obtain a certificate in Urban Survival a person will complete 8 half courses (7 weeks in length) or 4 full courses (14 weeks). Students with previous study may obtain up to half of their requirements by exemption. Under certain circumstances persons without formal study, but with extensive experience can have that experience recognized through exemption.

Courses marked (U-S) are those leading to a credit towards the Urban Survival Certificate.

HEALTH CARE AIDE PROGRAMME

The Health Care Aide Program trains auxiliary workers who assist in the care of residents or patients in nursing homes, homes for the aged, and various chronic care and convalescent facilities. The ever-increasing life span, the increasing awareness of the community's obligations toward the handicapped and the aged, is creating new types of paramedical services requiring trained people, but not necessarily professional medical practitioners or nurses. The Health Care Aide fits in here as a member of the modern medical services team. The program is designed to be conducted on an in-service basis at the request of an employer or group of employers. Financial assistance may be available to employers through Humber College's Training and Business Industry program. NOTE: For further information, phone: 675-3111, ext. 567

EMERGENCY AID SKILLS CERTIFICATE

This program is designed to prepare individuals to deal with emergency situations as they arise in the com-munity, family or on the job. Concerned family and community members as well as professionals encountering emergency situations should consider this program.

The knowledge and skills to save lives and provide emergency care to victims of accidents, injuries and other health hazards is required of many people in a variety of occupations and walks of life. "Know what to do when you're needed.

Upon completion of the required components as outlined below, the student is given the opportunity to select an option from among the specialized areas of study according to his particular interest: First Aid and Accident Prevention, Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation. (both offered at York-Eglinton Centre)

SOCIAL DANCE CERTIFICATE PROGRAMME

A certificate program in the Dance has been established by the Creative & Communications Arts Division. Opportunities are provided for interested students to become proficient in all aspects of the dance. For dancers who wish to become instructors, there are several courses which provide a teaching background. Course choices will include: Social, Discotheque, Jazz, Ballet, Old-Tyme, etc

Humber College ADULT DANCE PROGRAMME

BALLET (ROYAL ACADEMY OF DANCE CERTIFICATION)

Our ballet program has five levels and each level is a pre-requisite for the next. Exceptions will be made for students with prior training and he or she will be placed at the appropriate level.

Level I - This level is for beginners. It should be considered an introduction to the classical art form. The classes are based on the Royal Academy of Dance Syllabus (preliminary grades)

Level II - This level is for students with limited training, depending on individual achievement. Here the work is a little more advanced and deals with the R.A.D. Syllabus (grades 2 & 3).

Level III - This level is for students with a year or more of training. The work deals again with the R.A.D. Syllabus (grades 3 & 4).

Level IV - In this level, R.A.D. exam certification is available. Each student having obtained a level III standard may enter for the Dance Education Syllabus (D.E.S.) exam offered by R.A.D., which is a certification universally recognized.

Level V - This course deals with the Elementary R.A.D. Major exam. It is a professional exam recognized universally and is also one of the qualifications necessary to apply to programs for professional dance teachers and performers.

CHILDREN and TEENS PROGRAMME

BALLET (ROYAL ACADEMY OF DANCE CERTIFICATION)

Our ballet program for children offers five levels of instruction. Exam certification is available to all students by the Royal Academy of Dancing (entry for exams is at the discretion of our director). Children with previous training will be placed at the appropriate level. All students must be under 16 years of age. Pre-primary - This level is for all children between 4 and 5 years of age. The classes are based on the R.A.D.

Syllabus. Primary - This level is for children between the ages of 6 and 7. The classes are based on the primary Syllabus. Grade one - This level is for children 8 - 9 years of age. Classes are based on the grade one R.A.D. Syllabus.

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MAKING CHANGES Course for Immin



INFORMATION FOR STUDENTS REGISTERING IN HUMBER COLLEGE COURSES

Students are strongly urged to advance register by mail OR register during the evenings of September 19 and 20 at the nearest Neighbourhood Learning Centre. Courses with insufficient registrations are subject to cancellation immediately following the registration nights. Students affected by a cancellation will be immediately notified by telephone and advised of other courses that are available. Full refunds will be issued upon request where courses are cancelled due to insufficient registrations. A refund of fees, less a \$10.00 service charge, will be made to those who request a refund prior to the third session.

Full payment of course fees must be made at the time of registration, whether by mail or in person. Payment can be made by personal cheque (not post-dated), cash or money order. All students must sign a waiver form. Students registering in a Humber College course are entitled to access the full facilities of the College upon presentation of their student identification card.
