## Humber alumnus receives Order of

### Ontario

The first female provincial police commissioner in Ontario, Humber alumnus Gwen Boniface, was awarded the Order of Ontario on December 4, 2001. Commissioner Boniface was recently elected president of the Canadian Association of Chiefs of Police. She was appointed in 1997 to the Law Commission of Canada advising Parliament on the improvement and modernization of Canada's Law. Through this appointment and her work as an adjunct professor at the University of Western



Ontario, she has made significant contributions to the field of justice. She was honoured for these accomplishments and for her contributions to the development of First Nations Policing Services.

"The Law and Security Administration program at Humber College helped to give me the confidence and the desire to pursue a career in law enforcement," says Commissioner Boniface. She later completed a Bachelor of Arts degree from York University and a Bachelor of Laws degree from Osgoode Hall Law School. Commissioner Boniface received a Premier's Award in 1998 for outstanding achievements and important social and economic contributions made by a community college graduate to the province of Ontario.

### University of Guelph-Humber breaks ground

November 29, 2001 - 4 p.m. - It was a dark and stormy day, and the Minister of Training, Colleges and Universities was due to arrive at the North Campus of Humber College to break ground for the new University of Guelph-Humber. ENTER - The Humber College Maintenance and Operations Department. "We set up a red carpet, some large plants and a parcel of sod delivered by a local nursery in the lobby of the Corporate & Continuing Education Centre," laughs David Trick, Vice-Provost, Administration. "The show must go on..."

Faculty and staff working with the new institution, students from the University of Guelph and Humber College, and the Presidents and Board members were delighted when the Honourable Dianne Cunningham was whisked in from the wind and rain, alighted on the red carpet and reached for a spade. "The government is proud to be a partner in this exciting project that will benefit thousands of Ontario students in the years to come," said Minister Cunningham.

The University of Guelph-Humber, a joint venture of the University of Guelph and Humber College, will be the first in Ontario to offer both a university degree and a college diploma to every graduate in just four years of study. Three programs will be offered beginning in the Fall of 2002, and the almost 45 million dollar building will be complete in the Fall of 2003. The venture received 28.63 million dollars in funding as part of the Ontario government's SuperBuild project to meet the needs of the growing, postsecondary student population.

Next September, the University of Guelph-Humber will admit 200 students into three programs: Business, Media Studies and Computing. "Additional programs are being developed for 2003," says Michael Nightingale, Vice-Provost, Academic. By 2005, the University will have the capacity for 2,000 students in the new building.

"As part of Humber's commitment to a learner-centred environment, we have developed a curriculum that meets the emerging needs of employers for strategic skills, and will enable students to pursue post-graduate studies if they choose to continue their education," said Dr. Robert A. Gordon, President of Humber College.

More and more university gradu-

ates take a post-graduate college program to get the skills training they need to enter the job market. This takes one or two years on top of the four years it takes to get a degree. The University of Guelph and Humber College recognized an opportunity to provide programming that combines the theoretical knowledge of a university education and practical knowledge of a college education in just four years of study. "It is all about students and expanding student accessibility and opportunity. Students are attracted by the opportunity to attend this academically rigorous program that combines the individual strengths and traditions of the University of Guelph and Humber College", said Dr. Mordechai Rozanski, President of the University of Guelph.

The new building will have specialized laboratories, an Internet café, a learning commons and an atrium for major lectures and events. Most of the classrooms are designed for small classes of 65 or fewer. Students will spend all four years at the University of Guelph-Humber in northwest Toronto where they will be able to make use of the services and facilities at Humber College. 

## Booker

Peter Carey, distinguished Australian author and faculty member with the Humber School for Writers (HSW), won the Booker Prize for his critically-acclaimed novel, *The True History of the Kelly Gang*. The Booker Prize is the world's most prestigious literary award and Carey is only the second author in the Booker's history to win the prize twice. His first win was for the equally splendid *Oscar and Lucinda*.

"I'm thrilled that Peter won," says Joe Kertes, Dean, Creative & Performing Arts. "He's a brilliant writer and The True History of the Kelly Gang is a masterful piece of writing."

# Media studies programs welcomed by Lakeshore Campus and community

In the year 2000, the South Etobicoke Regeneration Project Committee commissioned an employer cluster capacity study. The final report identified three sectors that play a key role in employment in Etobicoke: food preparation, auto-

motive parts and media. The media industry includes photographers, graphic designers, advertising and public relations agencies, printers, producers, distributors and reproduction companies. Humber's Media Studies programs include: Public Relations, Advertising and Graphic Design, Electronic Publishing, and Advertising Media Sales. The report recommended that the Committee should approach Humber College to determine the feasibility and interest of moving the School of Media Studies to the

Lakeshore Campus from the North Campus. Humber College listened.

"Media is the fastest growing industry group in South Etobicoke," says Judy Dunstan, Economic Development Officer with the City of Toronto. "We see the opportunity to create a synergy between Humber College and the businesses in the community." One way to do this would be to establish a South Etobicoke media enterprise campus to anchor media enterprise development and innovation within the Greater Toronto Region through partnerships, provision of space to fledgling enterprises and provision of supporting amenities. While a campus such as this is still in the planning stage, Humber's Media Studies programs look forward to partnering with area businesses in the near future.

"All of our programs include a period of work experience and training at actual job sites throughout Toronto," says William Hanna, Dean of the School of Media Studies. "We look forward to placing students in local businesses for work-study initiatives, as well as providing well prepared graduates to fill the growing human resources needs in this area."



# Key film and television industry personnel partner with Humber to deliver post-production training


State-of-the-art training in film and television post-production techniques is now available at Humber College. The Ontario Post-Production Training Centre will provide training in disciplines such as: non-linear editing, special effects, sound mixing and 3-D digital art.

The Centre is an initiative that was spearheaded by Humber in partnership with the Ministry of Economic Development and Trade and the post-production industry. An advisory board made up of key industry personnel from some of the foremost post-production facilities in Canada advises on the curriculum of the Post-Production Graduate Certificate program. The program includes full lab instruction plus editing theory and analysis, training in post-production supervision and management, and insight into the way in which the different disciplines overlap - eg. visual and sound editing.

"We try to give our students a leg-up in a very complex and technically dynamic world," says Robb Wright, Program Manager of the Centre. "Our first students are just getting started in the program, but look for some interesting work coming out of these labs this Spring!" As well as being the training ground for a postgraduate certificate, the Centre will offer life-long learning to professionals who wish to keep their skills current. Additionally, 230 full-time students from related programs at Humber will take courses at the Centre.

"The Ontario Post-Production Training Centre is the realization of a plan to creatively link leading industry hardware and software manufacturers, content creators in the film and television production community (our board members and faculty), and a committed training institution – Humber College," says Donna O'Brien, Manager, Ontario Post-Production Training Centre. Industry partners include: Avid Technology, Media 100 Inc., Sony of Canada LTD, Apple Canada, Silicon Graphics Canada, Alias Wavefront and The Directors' Guild of Canada, Ontario.

She also stresses the importance for students to start networking early in their careers. "Networking is really important and an event like this is great for students who have the foresight to see opportunities to connect."

### Partnership to give journalism students international perspective

Journalism students will be joining with students from the U.S. and Mexico in a fascinating trilateral four-year project. Cross Currents: Journalism and Globalization is a partnership agreement involving two U.S. universities, two Mexican universities, Mount Royal College in Calgary, and Humber.

The program features a combination of student exchange and group projects through distance education. Starting as early as next September a total of 13 Humber journalism students will be invited to spend a semester studying at a partner institution and students from each of the partners will study journalism at Humber. Funded in Canada by Human Resources Development Canada, as part of the North American Mobility Project, it is designed to increase professional mobility in the field of journalism and prepare students to work and study abroad. Humber's Canadian partner is Mount Royal College in Calgary. The consortium includes, the University of Iowa, the University of Georgia, the Universidad de Colimo, and the Universidad Autonoma de Guadalajara.

In total, 76 students from the six partner institutions will participate in the exchange. The project also aims to develop common curriculum components in the member schools, increase the international perspective of all six journalism programs and foster a co-operation that will extend beyond 2005.

Faculty from each institution will tour the facilities and explore transferability of credits in January and February in preparation for student exchanges due to start as early as next September. Faculty from the partner schools will be at Humber, the last week of January to familiarize themselves with our print and broadcast pathways. The BN degree program has been offered at Humber since September 2001. Students are taught by Humber and UNB faculty and take the entire four-year program at the College. Graduates earn a

> BN degree from UNB. "The program encompasses professionalism, human caring, research and a holistic view of nursing," says Fortin. Having spent a year at university, she compares the two experiences.

"This program is difficult, but it's different than


being at a big university. The faculty are supportive and they're always available. They have a lot of experience and education, and they're willing to help. I've always questioned my ability to do this, but now I know I can."


Fortin says she's excited about her upcoming clinical placements in long-term care agencies and then in the community working with adolescents and young adults. Eventually, she'll do clinical practice in a hospital such as the Etobicoke site of the William Osler Health Centre. Though graduation is still a few years away, she's thinking ahead. "I'll probably take further education, to specialize in an area like critical care or neonatal ICU." Research is another area of interest, so she may go on for graduate studies, and after that, teaching.

In the meantime, Fortin says she's enjoying the program. She's also developing skills in leadership. Through her efforts, students in the BN Program are members of the new UNB-Humber Nursing Society, which in turn is a member of the Canadian Nursing Students' Association (CNSA). Among its activities, CNSA promotes networking between students in nursing programs nationally, organizes health promotion and charitable fund raising activities and holds an annual conference that addresses many professional and ethical issues in nursing. Natalie and other students, who have affectionately dubbed her 'the information giver' for her groundwork in establishing the group at Humber, plan to attend this year's conference in Victoria, B.C. "The association provides opportunities for students to build themselves personally and professionally," says Natalie. "It's also another way for students to stay on top of changes in the nursing profession."

One recent change is the requirement that all new nurses in Ontario, beginning in 2005, must have a baccalaureate degree in nursing, a reflection of the increasing complexity of today's health care environment. The collaborative BN Program at Humber was developed in response to the new requirement and is equivalent to the program being offered by UNB in New Brunswick. It is offered under a provincial government ministerial consent granted for students entering the program until 2005. All students admitted into the program during this period will have the opportunity to complete their degree requirements at Humber.

Paul Quarrington is the author of nine novels and several works of nonfiction. Quarrington has won both the Governor General's Award and the Stephen Leacock Award and has also written several screenplays and plays. His most recent novel is the imaginative The Spirit Cabinet.

## American Sign Language Course Offered

Response to the Introductory American Sign Language course at Humber College has been so positive that students have been asking for a more advanced class. A level two class was offered for the first time beginning in January 2002.

Students interested in taking the course generally include those who are acquainted with someone who is deaf or who benefit in the workplace by having a knowledge of sign language.

American Sign Language (ASL) classes at Humber are taught by instructor Len Charbonneau as conversation classes, meaning that students are completely immersed in the language and rely on watching the hand signs of the teacher rather than on oral instruction. In fact, almost no speaking goes on in the classroom. "We couldn't offer this program without a very special person to teach it," says Pat Burke, Program Coordinator for the Language & Culture Centre. "The

instructor is on stage. He relies on expressive motions, body language and facial expressions to teach."

In order to learn and to understand, students must carefully watch the instructor at all times. As a part of the curriculum, students require a textbook and video, which are used to complete homework assignments. Although no lecturing is done in class, overheads and faceto-face conversations are often used as teaching tools.

## Great support staff



Recent Graduate Category -Valeria Pugliese Film & Television - 1998




De La Chaîne Des Rôtisseurs is an international gastronomic society that provides scholarships and competition for young chefs.




## Sailing through the Winter





Humber is one of the first schools in Toronto to offer three accreditation opportunities to Business Administration and Continuing Education students

the Human Resources Professionals Association of Ontario (HRPAO), the Canadian Securities Institute (CSI) or the Canadian Institute of Management (CIM) while fulfilling requirements for graduation from the three-year Business Administration Diploma. According to Laurie Turner, Coordinator of the Business Administration program, a relationship between a business school and professional association reinforces the industry recognition that the program receives and as a result, students benefit. "Students gain validation and professional recognition from a professional association and it also provides them with a networking opportunity," says Turner.

Part-time students can also gain professional accreditation for the HRPAO, CSI or CIM, even if they are not Business Administration students. "The courses are bundled separately for Continuing Education students and are offered as separate certification," explains Turner. Continuing Education students who are working towards their diploma on a part-time basis, however, are still eligible for professional accreditation at graduation as long as they have completed the required classes.

Humber is one of the first schools in Toronto to offer all three accreditation opportunities to Business Administration and Continuing Education students.

believes that she would not have been able to take classes if not for on-line learning. "Attending three hour lectures on weeknights or weekends was not an option," says Lihou. "I needed something that would make time work for me."

Although Lihou finds that instructors have been extremely accessible and helpful, she has been impressed by the additional learning opportunities that distance education offers. "Group work has very much been the highlight of this course," she states. "E-learning provides a lot of opportunities to learn from classmates in new and different ways."

Improvements in on-line teaching tools have made on-line learning a viable option for students. WebCT is an application that Humber uses to ensure that students have equal access to email, presentation tools, quizzes, assignments and on-line

collaboration forums like whiteboards, message boards and realtime chat.

Chris Coleman, Instructional Designer for On-line Learning at Humber College, finds that most students respond well to WebCT since it is easy to navigate and provides effective communication tools despite being an older application. "On-line learning offers education opportunities that people wouldn't otherwise have," says Coleman. "It will never replace traditional classroom learning, but as lifelong learning becomes more important,

on-line education will become more prevalent."

The 577 students registered for on-line learning courses in the Fall semester were able to take advantage of the free support offered by the Open Learning Centre. "Some students need the flexibility of an on-line forum but

are not familiar with the technology," explains Ruth Hickey, Manager of the Open Learning Centre. "We walk students through the process of accessing the course and feeling comfortable with the WebCT tool."

According to Coleman, about 40% of the population have characteristics that make them potential on-line learners. Criteria for successful learners include being able to overcome distractions, having confidence in personal abilities to learn independently and being committed to completing the program. ### Marsalis motivates music students

ranford Marsalis, one of the world's premiere jazz saxophonists, recently spent a couple of hours at Humber's Lakeshore Campus answering questions from students enrolled in the College's Music program. Marsalis was in town with his jazz quartet to perform at the Toronto Centre for the Performing Arts.

"One of our students studied with Branford Marsalis at a summer workshop in the States," explains Denny Christianson, Director of Music at Humber. "When we found out he'd be performing in Toronto, I contacted his management group about the possibility of a Humber visit."

No one questions Marsalis' musical savvy, but equally impressive is his knowledge of current events, history, literature, and other musical forms. Frequent references to Shakespeare, historical data, opera and pop peppered his dialogue with the audience.

He offered sage advice. "There are no short-cuts to playing well," he told the students. "Either you're prepared or not."

When asked about what inspires him, Marsalis pointed out that he was energized by great music - be it jazz, classical, or pop. "There's a lot of bad stuff out there, so you have to actively hunt for the good. But, remember one thing: the hunt is worth it."

The multi-Grammy Award winning Marsalis was born in New Orleans into a musical family that



includes brothers Wynton, Delfeayo, and Jason, and the family patriarch Ellis Marsalis. In addition to performing at all the major jazz venues in North America and Europe, he has also played with symphony orchestras as well as with Sting, Bruce Hornsby, and The Grateful

"His life story is unique," explains second-year Music student Young Jik. "He's part of an incredibly musical family. What I like best about him, though, is that he's always been innovative in his approach to jazz. That's what makes him great."


### Official Magazine of the **Ontario Colleges Athletics Association**


