Firebug hits Humber!

Damages are set at \$250,000

Metropolitan Police and Fire Department officials are still trying to find the arsonist who struck Humber four times over the summer break.

The fires did about \$250,000 damage and had College employees continually on edge between May 20 and June 15.

According to a fire report from the office of Harry Edmunds, director of physical resources the first fire, in the fieldhouse, was well underway at 4:00 p.m. Sunday May 20 and by 5:45 p.m. the fire had been extinguished.

After examining the damage and questioning witnesses Fire Marshals designated the fire "undetermined in origin".

The damage in the first fire was estimated at \$215,000 plus another \$50,000 to \$100,000 in cleanup expenses.

Most of the damage was concentrated in the north-east section of the second floor. There was considerable damage to the roof decking and support trusses in the halls.

Doug Knapp, a college employee, was working in the I.M.C. darkroom below the fire area. Mr. Knapp said when he was alerted he ran into the hall which was thick with smoke. He said he could hear the flames above running down the hall and the ceiling was rippling in the heat. According to Mr. Knapp he and another witness pulled four fire alarms before one sounded. When he finally found one that worked they fled from the building.

Emergency repairs were begun almost immediately and by the 24 of May plans were underway for reconstruction.

There were three subsequent fires in the next few weeks. One fire in the combined classrooms B300 and B302 did \$3,000 damage. The fire was extinguished by Jack Kendall supervisor of custodial services.

Humber employee charged and convicted of theft

A Humber College employee was convicted of theft and possession of stolen goods in connection with thefts of College equipment totalling \$2,500 in value.

Ron Ushctenko, of Weston, pleaded guilty to the charges and was given a suspended sentence and two years probation.

Ted Millard, Humber's chief security officer, said the thefts occurred over a five month period between February and June 14 of this year.

On June 14 the security staff found an empty box

Almost 600 housing inquiries but little available

Out-of-town students wishing to find a place to stay in Toronto had better start phoning landlords, according to Kate Earlix, Humber's housing clerk.

"As of August 20 we have had 589 mailed requests for housing from all over Canada, Jamaica, The Bahamas, Hong Kong, St. Vincent, the United States and England," said Ms. Earlix. "I don't know how many students have come to the office — I stopped counting about two weeks ago."

The majority of housing listings are for room and board, some of which are "exorbitant", according to Ms. Earlix, with a few apartments, no houses and few flats. "The problem is everyone wants something close as across the street," Ms. Earlix continued.

in a stair well leading to the roof of what is now E building. The box had contained a turntable valued at \$300. The turntable had been reported missing from a music room earlier.

Humber security then contacted the Metro Police and gave them all the investigative research. Mr. Ushctenko was picked up the following day.

Among the items recovered were two turntables, and amplifier, two speakers, an Ikon camera valued at \$160 and a tape recorder valued at \$1000.

In order to combat the shortage, Osler School of Nursing is again offering Humber room for 50 female students, available at Osler rates. As well, York University has set aside 44 beds for Humber students, male or female, which can be obtained by students having enough money to pay for them. The price for a double room is \$615, with a single going for \$740, but in order to live there, you must also eat there. Students must purchase

Fire strikes Humber

Another fire in the Coven Morgue in room B405 and one in room B412 were put out before any damage was done.

It was felt at one time that the fires may have been set just to cause a nuisance and the first fire got out of hand.

Ted Millard, chief of security and Humber's safety officer said the first fire had investigators confused because the fieldhouse was a low risk area, yet there was so much damage. Tests of the debris explained why; the carpets in the fieldhouse were fire rated several years ago when, according to Mr. Millard, the ratings were not as strict as they are now. When the carpets are exposed to heat over 400 degrees F they burst into flames of temperatures over 1000 degrees F.

Mr. Millard also said the fire alarms that did not sound had fused in the heat. The alarms have now been altered to avoid such a re-occurrence and all carpeting similar to that in the fire area is being replaced.

Mr. Millard wished to emphasize the safety aspect of the first fire. He said college officials and students alike have taken for granted the safety of the school in case of fire. According to Mr. Millard, if there had been classes in the fieldhouse at the time of the fire they would have been wiped out because the halls would have been an inferno allowing no escape.

Speakers bureau

The Student Union is trying to organize a "speakers bureau" in an effort to diversify the directions the SU is taking.

Keith Nickson, SU vice-president, said the SU has been doing what past unions did for too long, there is a need to add some vitality into the Colleges atmosphere.

Mr. Nickson said the term "speakers bureau" is not altogether accurate. He hopes it will be more than traditional lectures. Mr. Nickson sees workshops, seminars and presentations of all sorts being included.

The SU contacted one firm that books speakers for college tours but other than booking jazz artist Don Ellis for a concert nothing was accomplished.

Mr. Nickson explained that there is a question of booking well known speakers or unknown speakers tied to important issues.

The SU is looking into the possibility of having an educational network or a cable company come and tape the sessions for tv.

Busing

Humber College has added two new bus routes this year bringing the total number of routes to 14.

The two new routes are to and from Malton. College busing is paid for by the Student Affairs Committee which allocated 7% of this years student activity fee to the service and by fares paid by students.

Bus passes cost \$20. per semester or 25¢ per ride.

Information on routes and schedules can be obtained from the student services offices, financial services and the College switchboard.

College plans ice arena

Even though students voted last year 2 to 1 against building an ice arena the college is going ahead with plans to build one.

Harry Edmunds, director of physical resources explained the College's actions. Mr. Edmunds said the questionnaire which was sent to Humber students asking for their choice of an ice arena, a student centre or an athletics and recreational fieldhouse and their choice in financing the project preceded a report from Allward and Guinlock, the architectural firm employed by the college.

The report says the fieldhouse, the building that sustained the most fire damage over the summer, would provide all the space necessary for both a student centre and athletic and recreational facilities.

Therefore, according to Mr. Edmunds, the college has the necessary facilities already and can move on to provide new facilities for the student body.

Mr. Edmunds said there would be an added advantage in using an existing structure for a student centre and athletic facilities — it would cost the students less than it would to erect a

completely new building and the cost would not only be less for building but there would be no land costs and a reduced designing fee.

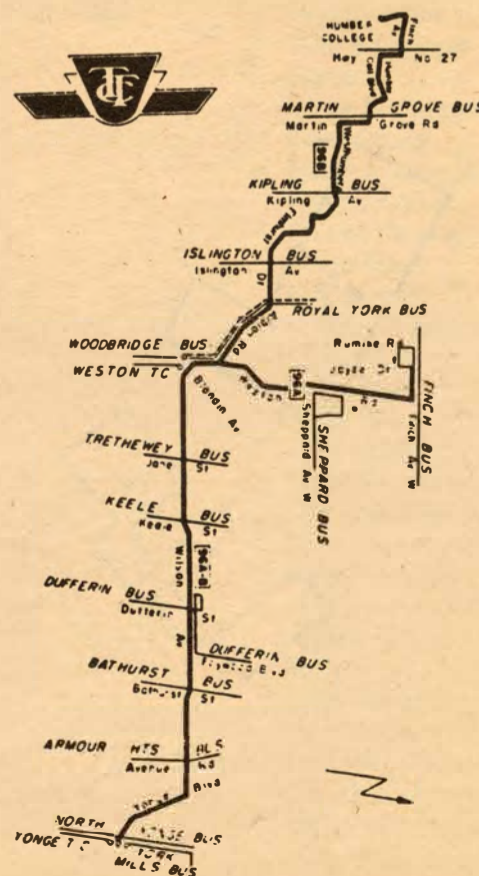

SU started year \$17,000 in debt

Because of budget hassles and overspending last year this year's SU started its administration almost \$17,000 in debt.

SU vice-president Keith Nickson said there were a number of reasons for the problems.

First of all there were \$7,000 worth of unpaid bills left over from last year which had to be paid in this year's SU's first week of office. That along with \$10,000 owing for rent of the new SU lounge was paid by Student Affairs Committee treasurer Laurie Sleith from the SU surplus account.

Mr. Nickson said in some cases last year's administration couldn't pay because the bills didn't arrive at the College until after they left office and with enrolment lower than was expected last year their budget was cutback.

However, according to Mr. Nickson, near the end of last year former SU president Ferguson Mobbs and SU business manager Peter Hyne were simply refusing to sign cheques to pay bills.

In order to ride out the storm the SU has been forced to make cut backs.

There will be only one free movie a week this year, there were three last year, and the SU has dropped out of the Association of Community College Students' Councils. These two moves will save the SU about \$3,100. The Union also managed to talk the College into paying for \$5,000 of furniture in the SU lounge and with the resignation of last year's SU business manager the SU has saved an additional \$8,000.

Therefore the SU has managed to save almost \$16,100 in all.

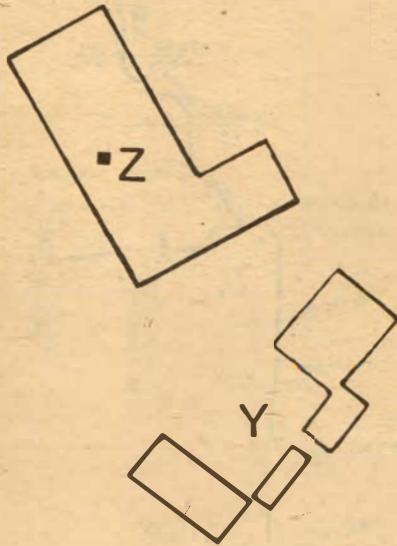
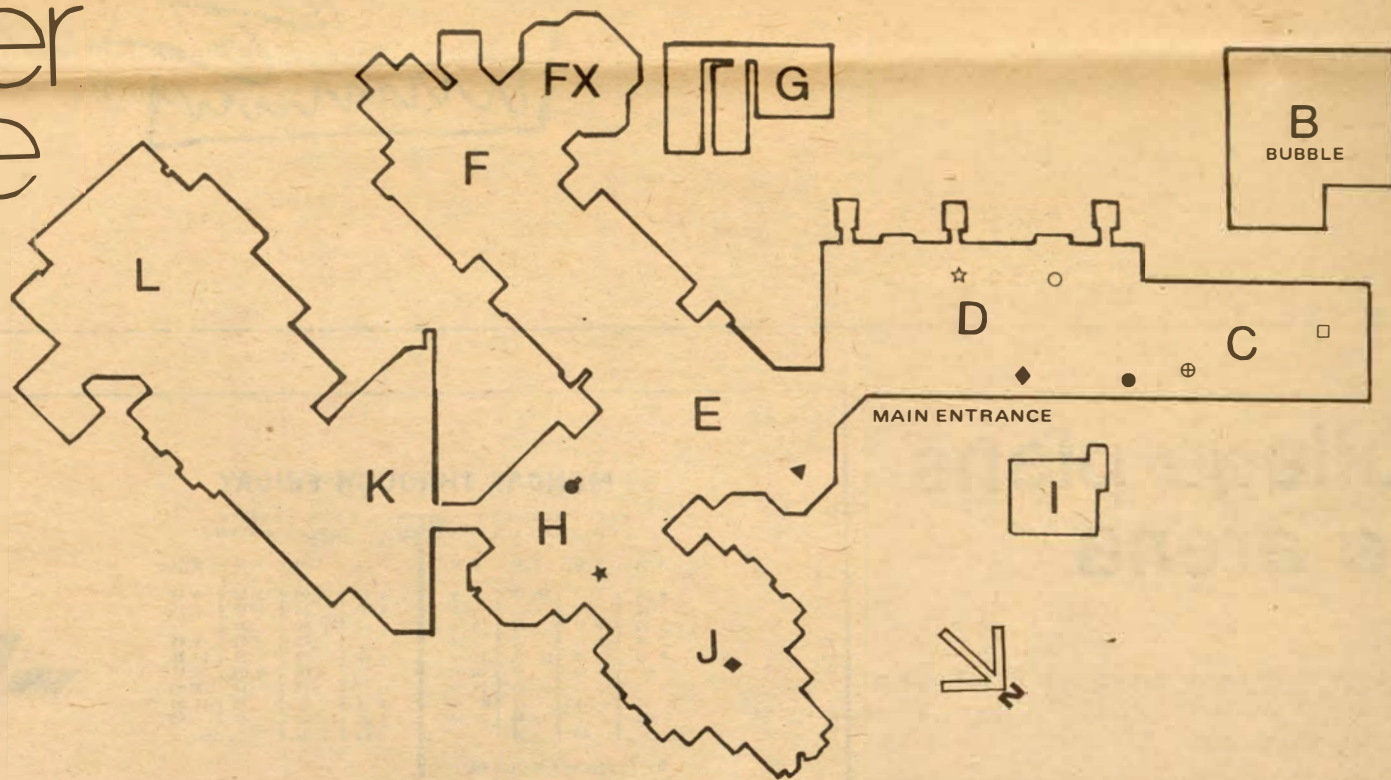

Explosion proof room in Phase IVa

Hidden in Phase 4A there lies a storage room that will literally blow its top if necessary. Originally designed for spray painting furniture, it is now used to store inflammable paints from the Visual Arts department and liquid from the Technology department.

According to Harry Edmunds, director of physical resources, the new room has special electrical fittings, special ventilation and an explosion-proof roof which will open up if an explosion should occur. The room has been approved by the Ontario Fire Marshall's Office and the Etobicoke Fire Department.

The room was put to its present use after it was revealed last year that dangerous explosive chemicals were being stored in a small room in the basement of the Technology wing. Mr. Edmunds didn't say for how long the liquids would be stored in the room, but for this year at least Humber will not be in danger of blowing up.

Housing

Personal Dining Plan vouchers, which run from \$420 to \$650, which can be used at any of the 14 eating areas at York. The total cost therefore runs from \$1,035 to \$1,390, including a \$50 deposit, non-refundable after 10 days of accepting the room. So far five students have applied, with two paying their \$50 deposits.

The term of residency is from September 3 to April 30. According to Student Affairs Co-ordinator Laurie Sleith, students staying beyond April 30 will have to arrange with the residence manager for housing at a monthly rate, with meals paid for in cash.

Wally Berseth, York University supervisor for college residences said, "We will try to have the male and female students on different floors. However, if more men apply than women, or vice-versa, one of the floors will have to be integrated,

Humber leaves ACCSC

Humber College is no longer a member of the Association of Community College Students' Councils.

The A.C.C.S.C. was formed to give community college student Councils a unified voice to deal with problems that may arise.

However, only five of Ontario's 22 community colleges belonged to the A.C.C.S.C.

Those five, which include Humber, paid \$1,100 a year to belong. Keith Nickson, SU vice-president, said Humber just wasn't getting its money's worth out of the association.

Mr. Nickson explained that if the association lowered its fees and got more colleges involved Humber would consider re-joining. The way it worked before according to Mr. Nickson, was to have the larger colleges carry the financial burden for the others and Humber is no longer prepared to do that.

Course reps for SU

The Student Union is considering a move that would increase the input of students into the SU.

The plan is to create representatives for each course in the College. Currently representation stops at the division level.

SU vice-president Keith Nickson said the division representatives don't really have good contact with the students they represent because of the number of students they represent.

The change in structure to add course representatives would have to be ratified by the Student Affairs Committee of which the SU is a sub-committee.

Also under consideration is a plan which would make the SU secretary's position an appointed one.

The SU would hire a secretarial student to do the job and pay her the honourarium currently paid an elected secretary.
