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INTERIOR DESIGN STUDENTS WIN INTERNATIONAL AWARD

Marek Pain, Program Coordinator of Humber's Interior Design Program, has every reason to be proud of his students.

In February, four third-year students won all the top prizes at the Institute of Business Designers Student Competition which was held in High Point, North Carolina.

Humber College was the sole Canadian entry of a total of 21 colleges and universities that participated.

First prize was awarded to Leslee Frederick and second went to Adriana Orsini. Margaret Balch and Kent Bunston shared third prize.

In addition, Leslee, a recent graduate of the program, went on to win first place in the National Design Contest held on June 11th in Chicago.

The contest, sponsored by the Institute for Business Designers and "Interior Design" Magazine, attracted more than 650 student entries from colleges and universities in the United States.

Participants were asked to design lounges, lobbies, restaurants, offices and banquet rooms for an abandoned partially constructed hotel. Architectural planning and some exterior design were also required.

Leslee, who is currently employed by Prestige Office Interiors as Junior Designer, was awarded \$500. for winning the regional competition and \$1000. for the national first prize. Her winnings will certainly come in handy when she visits Europe in the fall.

LANDSCAPE STUDENTS WIN

Thirty students from Humber's Landscape Technology Program received an award for outstanding design and construction of their entry in a competition sponsored by Landscape Ontario. This is the second year that Humber students have received honours at the Landscape Ontario Congress.

Bob Cheesman from Landscape Ontario made the presentation on April 2 at Humber's North Campus. Landscape Ontario is an organization made up of all landscape-oriented businesses which include nurseries, garden centres, and contractors.

The 1980 Landscape Ontario Congress was held at the Sheraton Centre, Toronto, early in the year.

CREATIVE CINEMATOGRAPHY

Patricia Day, a recent graduate of the Creative Cinematography Program at Humber walked off with two awards which were presented at the national conference of the Association for Media and Technology in Education in Canada, held in Edmonton, Alberta in June 1980.

Pat produced a program titled, "Musical Memories, The Way We Were" and submitted it as a student production in the video tape category. In addition to the Panasonic Award, her submission also won an Award of Merit from the AMTEC Media Festival.

According to Jerry Millan, Senior Program Coordinator of the Television Centre at the North Campus, the award is given annually "to the educational video production judged to have accomplished the highest overall level of quality standards, and for the effective utilization of the video medium as well as the application of skills to provide a successful communications result."

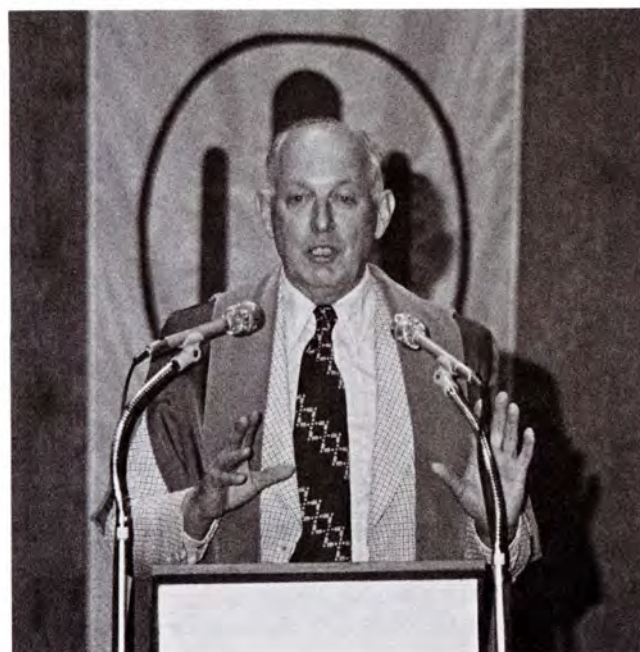
Humber College graduated a record number of students at the convocation ceremonies which were held the week of June 9th.

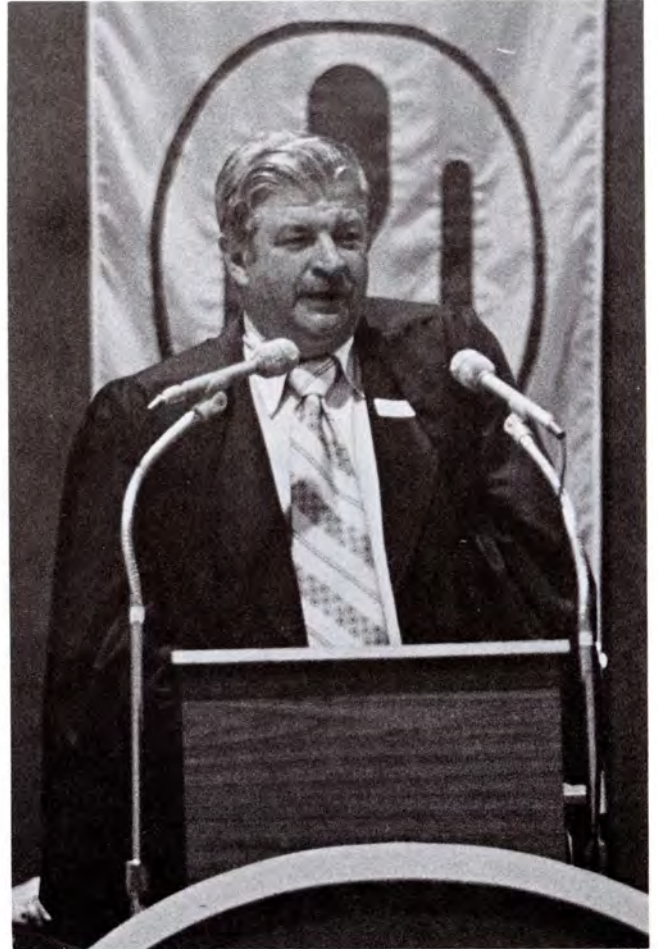

MANY HATS FOR BLAIR CARTER



When Blair Carter returned to Humber College last year, it was to become Director of the unique and innovative Developmental Centre, a day care facility for severely retarded and handicapped children. But in the process, he also managed to become Coordinator of the Early Childhood Education and Early Childhood Education for the Developmentally Handicapped Programs.

Carter, 29, was born in Orillia and is a graduate of York University with a degree in clinical psychology. He has previously worked at the Huronia Regional Centre in Orillia, been assistant director of the Centre at Humber, and most recently was a faculty member at Mohawk College in Hamilton.

The summer has been a busy one for Blair. In addition to his duties at the Centre and the business of preparing for September, he spent a good deal of his time at the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education working towards his Masters Degree in Special Education.

A resident of Toronto, Carter is especially enthusiastic about the work being done at the Centre, a lab school facility for students enrolled in the child-care oriented programs at Humber. By stressing normalization, the Centre works closely with families and the community.

TECHNOLOGY GETS STEREO PLOTTER

In April, a Kelsh Stereo Plotter was formally presented to Bob Higgins, Dean of the Technology Division of Humber College, by the Honourable Douglas J. Wiseman, Minister of Government Services.

The Stereo Plotter enables students to make topographical maps from aerial photographs and, although it is worth approximately \$16,000., it was sold to the College for \$1. through the Assets Disposal Service of the Ministry of Government Services.

Although Humber already has two Stereo Plotters, the third will certainly do much to increase the efficiency of the Aerial Survey Technology Department.

APPROXIMATELY 2,500 CALLS PER DAY KEEP SWITCHBOARD BUSY



Did you know that approximately 2,500 calls are received every day of the work-week by the main switchboard at Humber's North Campus? And that figure doesn't take into account the numerous long-distance calls placed and the hundreds of seemingly never-ending questions answered at the general enquiries desk just inside the main entrance.

Kay Hilton, Coordinator of Telecommunications and supervisor of the General Enquiries and Switchboard Department can be justifiably proud of the seven employees that make up the staff of the area.

"Our main function is service," she said recently, "But it's especially important that a caller's first impression of Humber is that it's basically a very friendly place."

Maturity, a keen interest in putting forth an effort, a good sense of judgement and a willingness to learn are just some of the qualifications required of good switchboard/information dispensing personnel. Primrose Chapman, Barbara Hall, Anne Hutchinson, Eleanor Lacey, Edith Morrow, Darlene Rail, and part-timer Joe Wolfond display their professionalism and human relation skills time and time again. All are frequently expected to perform duties not specifically outlined in their job descriptions. Emergency messages are relayed; out-of-towners, over-

whelmed by the size of the college and the rush of first-day registration procedures, are calmed; and simple courtesies are extended daily.

The two-position board is operational from 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. from Monday to Thursday and until 5:00 p.m. on Friday. In addition, the front desk is manned on Saturday mornings. In order to ensure that both areas are covered effectively, staff members work staggered hours.

Every job has its drawbacks, to be sure, and the main one in working on the switchboard, according to Mrs. Hilton, is that "people are inclined to take you as part of the equipment. And having to screen so many of the incoming calls demands a lot of patience and time. But the new Traffic Data Analyser will hopefully make life a little easier.

On the other hand, I really believe that it's the most exciting job in the college. You constantly meet new people and get to know so many of the staff and students."

A few weeks ago, I heard of an anecdote about Winston Churchill pertaining to the Second World War.

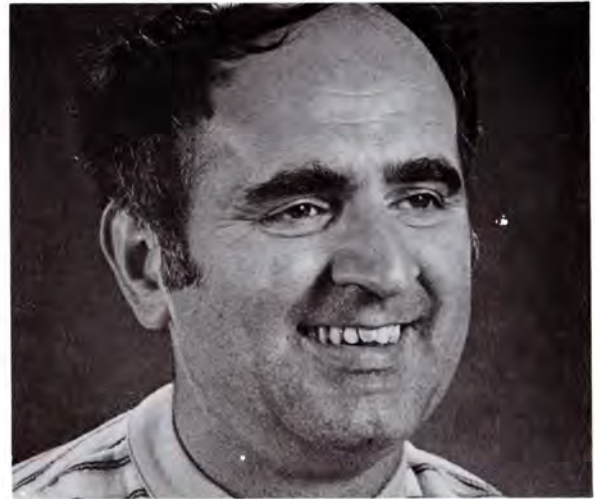
My response is a simple one. Extend your hand and say "Bonjour" to a fellow Canadian even though you may not be politically, economically, or socially obliged to do so.

James Brodie, one of Canada's leading authorities in the area of employee benefits and pensions and former Director of the Centre for Continuing Studies in Employee Benefits at Humber College, passed away on Saturday, June 14, 1980.

Brodie, 68 retired last May from the centre which he founded in 1970.

Born in Yorkshire, England, Brodie received his law degree from Leeds University. When he moved to Canada in 1957, he became Life Underwriter and Estate Planning Consultant with the Sun Life Assurance Company of Canada in Montreal. After satisfactorily completing further studies in life underwriting, he was appointed Senior Editor of the Dominion Law Reports at C.C.H. Canada Limited, Law Publishers in Toronto, and just before joining the faculty at Humber as Senior Law Lecturer, he was employed by William M. Mercer Ltd., Consulting Actuaries as Pensions and Employee Benefits Consultant.

He leaves his wife Ruth, daughter, Judith Copeland of Arad, Israel, son, Peter, of Wembley, England, and three grandchildren.



Pam Amos, Special Projects Clerk in the Personnel Department at the North Campus, died of cancer at the Etobicoke General Hospital on June 7, 1980. She was 47 years old.

Pam was born and educated in England and emigrated to Canada in 1968. She joined Humber College as payroll clerk in 1974.

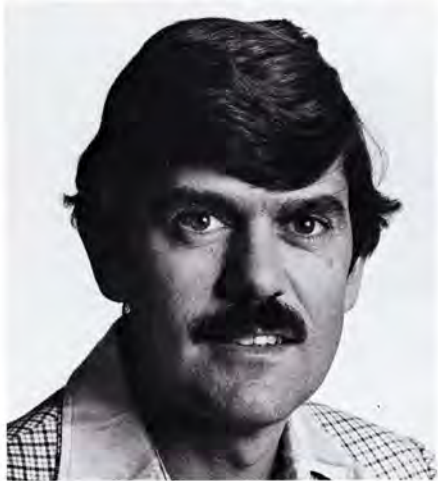

TRAN FAMILY NEWS

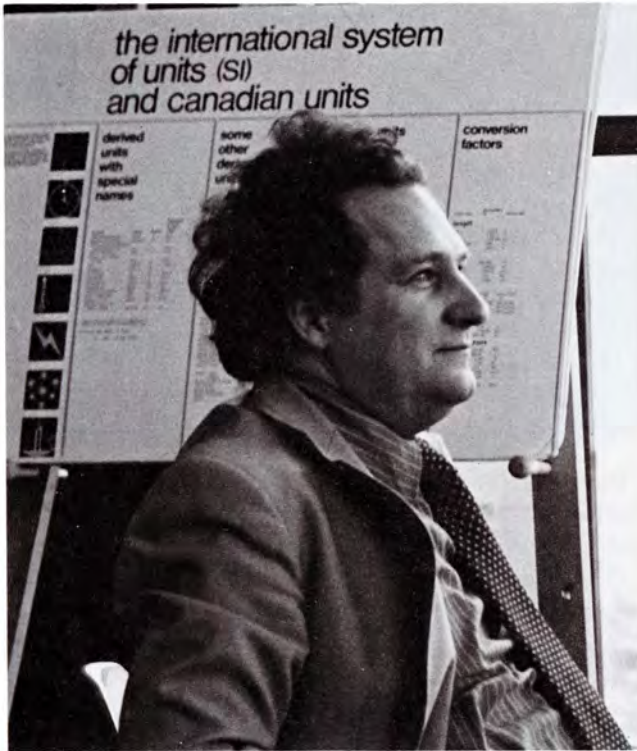
Since their arrival in Canada from Vietnam in February, the Tran family, assisted by Mr. and Mrs. Wragg, have had a busy time of settling in.

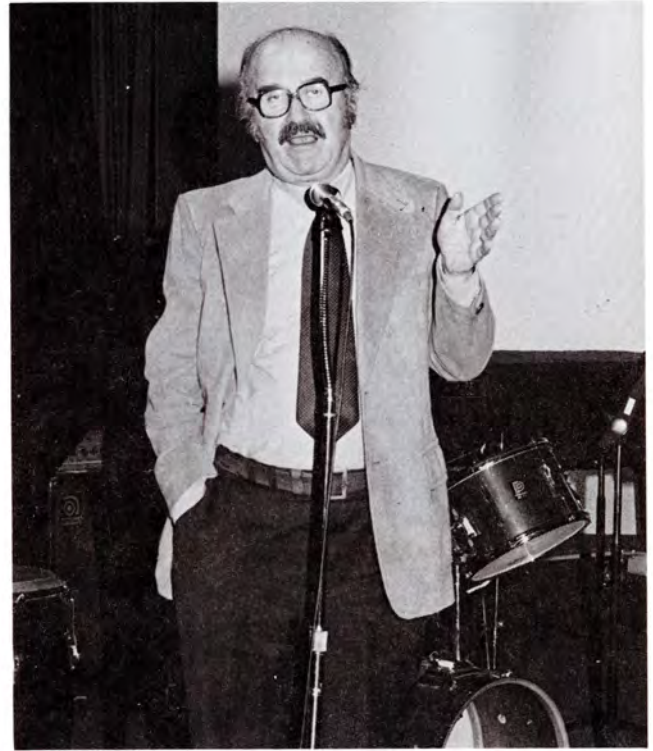
As a matter of fact, they've come along so nicely that the family was able to move into an apartment in Rexdale recently — and Quang and Ming have been successful in finding employment.

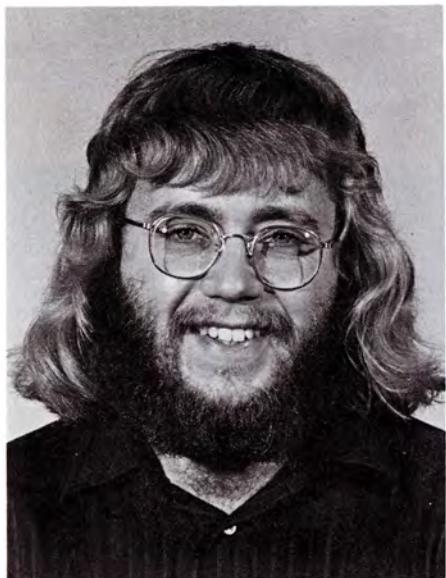

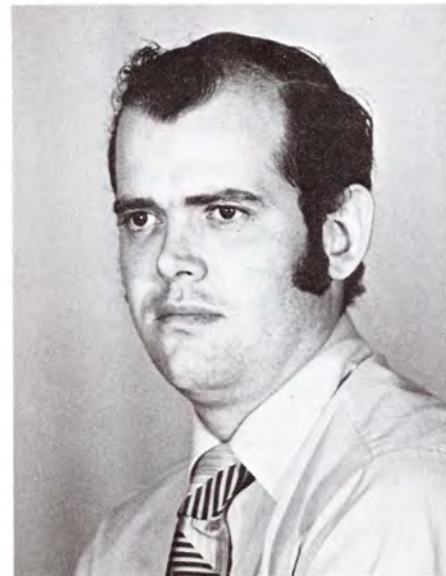
