University of Guelph-Humber opening a celebration of innovation

Joan Rivers speaks to students at Humber

"It's a winning combination that helps students succeed," said David Trick, Guelph-Humber's Chief Executive Officer at the University of Guelph-Humber's grand-opening celebration in May. The event highlighted the state-of-the-art \$45million facility and the unique partnership that has made the venture a success.

The only one of its kind, the University of Guelph-Humber enables students to earn a university honours degree and college diploma in four years. The joint initiative between the University of Guelph and the Humber Institute of Technology and Advanced Learning is a major accomplishment in the way postsecondary education is offered. "The University of Guelph-Humber has been designed from the start to connect students to the world outside the classroom," Humber President Robert A. Gordon said while a slate cornerstone was placed in front of the new university, a symbolic completion of the building. Also in attendance were Lincoln Alexander, University of Guelph's Chancellor; Stuart Smith, Chair of Humber's Board of Governors; and Alastair Summerlee, University of Guelph's President. "It is the culmination of years of hard work and careful planning, during which the University of Guelph has been a truly dedicated partner," said Gordon. "We had the never-ending cooperation of our faculty, staff and students." The University of Guelph-Humber first began offering classes in the fall of 2002, taught by faculty from both institutions. The Guelph-Humber building opened last fall and has been serving some 850 first- and second-year students. The university plans

to have 2,000 students by 2007. "This is a genuinely unique and successful partnership that



than \$30 million from the Ontario government's Super-Build fund. It was designed to complement the university's commitment to a learner-centred environment. Most classrooms are designed for small groups of between 30 and 65 students, and the entire second floor is devoted to informal learning. There are also computer classrooms, state-of-theart laboratories, an Internet café, and a plant wall biofilter, a "living wall" that improves air quality and creates a natural source of indoor fresh air. Guelph-Humber offers programs in business, computing, media studies, early childhood, family and community social services, and justice studies. Last month, the university announced a unique degree completion program in justice studies, a model program it intends to expand to other



in this province," Summerlee said. "By pooling our talents, we have enhanced opportunities for access and created programs that combine the benefits of both a university and college, balancing the theoretical and the applied. And we do it all in a learning environment that is one of the most innovative in North America."



Founded in 1974, the North Sea Jazz Festival attracts approximately 100,000 attendees and features over 100 top jazz artists on 16 stages. Ten slots are reserved annually for applications from high schools, colleges, and universities. School of Applied Technology students win at Skills Ontario

Students from Humber's School of Applied Technology won ten medals (four gold, five silver and one bronze) at the 15th Annual Ontario Technological Skills Competition in Waterloo in May. Students from across the province had the opportunity to showcase their talents and test themselves against industry standards.

The School also received a prize for best booth. The main attraction at the booth was the "live" production, through the use of a plastics injection moulding machine, of a CD holder designed and developed through a unique manufacturing educational initiative called Neptune. Over 2000 CD holders were produced on site and given away; inside each CD case was a specially produced CD on the making of Neptune. The "real life" experience of seeing the designs translated into finished products provided invaluable lessons and understanding for the students.

President's lecture series encourages debate

Each year at Humber, President Robert A. Gordon invites thought provoking speakers to inform students, faculty and staff on community, national and international events, and create an atmosphere that encourages discussion. Two well-known writers visited Humber this spring.

In February, celebrated military analyst and journalist Dr. Gwynne Dyer presented a lecture on his new book, *Three Projects and a Few Funerals*, due out this spring. His presentation elicited hard-hitting questions from students and faculty. Dyer is a recurring speaker at Humber and he has a clear purpose in speaking to students. "It is the duty of a journalist to have a conversation about his subject matter," said Dyer. "I need feedback, and this is a conversation that needs to happen. It is part of the democratic process." Dyer's last book was *Ignorant Armies*: *Sliding into War in Iraq*.

Writer Erna Paris presented, Seeking Justice: The Struggle for Human Rights, at the Humber North Campus in March. Paris is the recipient of ten national and international writing awards, including a gold medal from the National Magazine Awards Foundation. Her six literary and non-fiction books, include The End of Days: A Story of Tolerance, Tyranny, and The Expulsion of the Jews from Spain, which won the 1996 Canadian Jewish Book Award for History. Her most recent work, Long Shadows: Truth, Lies and History won the Pearson Writers' Trust Non-Fiction Prize.

"We try to incorporate as much "real work" as possible into our students' classes, and enthusiastically welcome projects with other Humber

programs and clients in the industry," said Heather Lowry, First Year Co-ordinator of Advertising & Graphic Design.

It took over six hours for Denny Christianson, Director of the Music program, to decide on the winning design. "It was her design that I kept coming back to. It seemed to project what the title and the content of the album was all about," said Christianson.

When asked how she came up with the theme for the CD cover, Messina stated, "The concept of the album cover was inspired by the title Everything Must Change. I wanted to find a simple way of showing change, and still have it relate to jazz. There are a lot of instruments that come to mind when I think of

jazz, but

the piano is the one that really stood out in my head. So I started changing the shape of the piano keys until I came up with a design I felt symbolized change."

Messina hopes to get into editorial design; there is something about the field that inspires her. "I feel like this is a starting point for me. This is the first of my designs to go to print. This experience is something that will stay with me, and go wherever my career takes me."

New Forensic Social Work program a first in Canada

Comedy students

Merv Griffin and Merv Griffin Entertainment (MGE) have signed an exclusive agreement with the Humber School of Creative & Performing Arts to create and produce a television series around students enrolled in the Comedy Writing & Performance programs. Griffin and Ernest Chambers will executive produce the weekly series which will follow the progress of selected students. MGE is also developing a feature film based on the School's unique curriculum and programs.

"We're thrilled about discovering the only college of its kind, and even more excited about bringing the real drama

behind the laughs to television audiences," said Merv Griffin.

Joe Kertes, Dean of the School of Creative & Performing Arts at Humber, sees this as an excellent opportunity. "Humber is delighted to be developing the project with Merv's company. It's unusual for a college to be working with a Hollywood producer and agent, but it's even more unusual for a college to offer a program in Comedy Writing & Performance. What we say around here is that we can't make you funny, but we can make you funnier," he explains.

Beginning in fall of 2004, the Humber School of Social and Community Services will offer the first Forensic Social Work Graduate Certificate program in Canada. This program will afford those who already have a degree or diploma, an opportunity to specialize in this area of social work by taking courses on a part-time basis.

"We anticipate that this program will be of special interest to professionals who are working with criminal offenders in various capacities, professionals who regularly deal with the courts, and those who work in the area of child protection and custody and capacity assessment. Standard social work degree programs do not specifically prepare students for this kind of work," said Dr. Patricia Spindel, Program Co-ordinator.

The Forensic Social Work program has four streams: child protection, corrections/probation and parole, forensic mental health, and custody and capacity assessments for the courts. It is unique in that it was developed with the assistance of a broad range of professionals working in the forensic social work field. Courses such as Mental Health Issues in Child Protection, Working with Sex Offenders, Assessing Parenting Capacity, and Court Documentation and Testimony will be offered beginning in September, and also running in the winter and spring semesters. All courses will be taught by an expert in the field. Interested individuals may take individual courses or complete the full, ten-course certificate.

"There is a phenomenal void and desperate need for education, training and collaboration in this area, not just for social work but also the allied disciplines," said Michele Choma, senior social worker in the Specialty Clinics, Law and Mental Health Programme at the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health. "The level of excitement that I have encountered when talking about this project with administrators, psychiatrists, psychologists, social workers, community workers, probation and parole, and others is palpable."

Representatives of numerous agencies and organizations involved in forensic social work form the advisory committee that developed this program, including: the Ontario Association of Childrens' Aid Societies, Corrections Canada, Toronto Area Probation and Parole, an Assistant Crown Attorney, the Chief Child Advocate for Ontario, and the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health, to name just a few. "We are excited to have these very qualified professionals, with high levels of expertise, developing and teaching these courses. This is an opportunity for students to learn from the best!" said Spindel.

and business skills, I was able to put together a killer resumé. It impressed more than a couple of recruiters, one of them being my present employer," wrote one successful client.




SNL, SCTV veteran joins Humber faculty



Minister of Community Safety and Correctional Services, Monte Kwinter, announced the appointment of Dr. James Young to the newly created position of Commissioner of Emergency Management for Ontario at Humber on April 30, 2004.

"Dr. Young's appointment addresses the need for an overall leader responsible for planning for and responding to all emergencies in Ontario," said Minister Kwinter.

For the past 12 years, Dr. Young was the Chief Coroner
