Expansion should be finished by 1980

Students can be expected to have locating problems and alphabet trauma over the next few years with the addition of three new buildings on Humber's north campus containing M, N, and Q.

The Instructional Materials Centre (IMC) will occupy the basement of section M and part of the first level along with the Royal Bank and the book store. Section N at the basement level will hold receiving and book storage. Levels one and two of section N will house the Centre for Continuous Learning.

The offices of the president, vicepresident, executive dean, personnel and physical resources will enhance level two of section M. The library nearby will be served by a circular staircase which will wind up to the third level.

Finally, level three of sections M and N will provide space for another library along with seminar and class rooms.

Relocation of the library will allow the computer staff to breath easier in the vacated space. Remaining area in the library — (the area above the Humberger) will provide room for another lounge. Whether it will be for teachers or students is still to be decided.

A library feature will be the availability of audio-visual tapes, a set-up similar to the manner in which records are listened to in the library now.

Democracy and music will appropriately mix in section D, now the reception area, where the Student Union and the music department will eventually make their permanent headquarters.

Ceilings on education spending significantly slowed down progress of Humber's completion said Mr. Kielman, Director of Campus Planning. He said it had been hoped construction would start this fall but as it is, Mitchell Construction Ltd. may not get the "go ahead" until the spring of '74. The three buildings under discussion now may be completed by 1976 and complete Humber expansion may not be seen until the early 1980's.

Spending ceilings also account for the stucco finish and painted brick work around Humber which is less expensive than other finishings being offered. Humber allows \$25 to \$30 per spuare foot when considering construction costs whereas, said Mr. Kielman, other institutions may double that.

Humber has been able to buy three new buses and hopes to acquire more if funds permit but students will still be faced with crowded conditions because students a larger number of who. are travelling in this manner.




