Summer Workshop

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The Humber School for Writers is both practical and inspirational – a place that provides a supportive coterie and the tools to improve your writing. Consider it jet fuel for the literary mind.

Since 1992, the Humber School for Writers has distinguished itself as a leading centre for the study of creative writing. Our track record speaks for itself: more than 261 of our graduates have gone on to publish books of fiction, non-fiction, or poetry. Several have been nominated for literary awards, and a few have gone on to win. Robert Rotenberg, for instance, had bidding wars in New York, London, and Toronto for his first novel, *Old City Hall*, and Cathy Marie Buchanan's *The Day the Falls Stood Still* sold in Italy, the USA, the UK, and made The New York Times Best Sellers list. Alumna Kim Echlin was shortlisted for the Giller Prize for *The Disappeared*.

Our faculty is no less impressive. In 2009, Annabel Lyon won the Rogers Writers' Trust Fiction Prize for *The Golden Mean*. M.G. Vassanji won the Governor General's Literary Award for Non-Fiction for his impressive travel memoir, *A Place Within: Rediscovering India.* Wayson Choy's *The Jade Peony* was shortlisted for Canada Reads.

The week-long workshop consists of two full days and four afternoons of lectures, five mornings of classes, one evening reading, lunches, and a closing banquet.

Elizabeth Abbott is a writer whose books have been translated into 16 languages, and include the best-selling A History of Celibacy and A History of Mistresses. A History of Marriage, the final volume in this historical relationship trilogy, was published in January 2010. In 1991, Elizabeth won a

National Magazine Award for environmental writing. Her book Sugar: A Bittersweet History was short-listed for the 2009 Charles Taylor Prize for Literary Non-Fiction.

David Bezmozgis is a writer and filmmaker. His work has appeared in The New Yorker, Harper's, Zoetrope, The Walrus, The New York Times Magazine, and various other publications. His first book, Natasha and Other Stories, was nominated for the

Governor General's Award, shortlisted for the Guardian First Book Prize, listed as one of the 10 Best Picks by Amazon. com, and awarded the Reform Judaism Jewish Book Prize (2004), David holds an MFA from the University of Southern California School of Cinema-Television. He is winner of the Commonwealth Regional Best First Book Award.

Wayson Choy is the author of the critically acclaimed The Jade Peony, which shared the Trillium Book Award (1996) with Margaret Atwood, won the City of Vancouver Book Award, and has been chosen to compete in the 2010 Canada Reads



competition. His haunting memoir, Paper Shadows, was nominated for the Governor General's Award and won the Edna Staebler Prize. The best-selling All That Matters was nominated for The Giller Prize, and won the Trillium Book Award. Wayson Choy was named to the Order of Canada in 2006. He won the Harbourfront Festival Prize in 2008. His memoir, Not Yet, is his most recent work.



Anthony De Sa, a Humber creative writing alumnus, grew up in Toronto's Portuguese community. He graduated from the University of Toronto, and did his post-graduate work at Queen's University. His short fiction has been published in several literary journals.

His first book, Barnacle Love, was critically acclaimed, and was a finalist for the 2008 Scotiabank Giller Prize and the 2009 Toronto Book Award. He is currently working on his novel, Carnival of Desire.

Bruce Jay Friedman is one of

the most influential comic writers of our time. He has written for film and stage, but is best known for his fiction, which includes A Mother's Kisses, Stern, and The Current Climate, The Collected Works of



Bruce Jay Friedman, A Father's Kisses, Even Rhinos Were Nymphos: Best Non-Fiction, and Violencia. His most recent book is Three Balconies, a New York Times Editor's Choice pick. His Lonely Guy was adapted into a film starring Steve Martin.

Mary Gaitskill is the author of the novels Two Girls: Fat and Thin, and Veronica, as well as the story collections Bad Behavior and Because They Wanted To, the latter of which was nominated for the PEN/Faulkner in 1998. Her stories and essays

have appeared in The New Yorker, Harper's, Granta, Best American Short Stories, and The O. Henry Prize Stories. Her novel Veronica was nominated for the National Book Award in 2005. Her new story collection is titled Don't Cry.



Annabel Lyon is the author of Oxygen (stories), The Best Thing for You (novellas), All-Season Edie (juvenile novel), and The Golden Mean, which was short-listed for the Scotiabank Giller Prize, the Governor General's Literary Award, and the Rogers Writers' Trust Fiction Prize,

which it won. Lyon has taught in the Banff Centre Wired Writing Program, the Simon Fraser University Writing and Publishing Program, and the University of British Columbia Optional-Residency MFA Program in Creative Writing.

Alistair MacLeod is the author of three collections of short stories: The Lost Salt Gift of Blood, As Birds Bring Forth the Sun, and Island. His novel No Great Mischief won the International IMPAC Dublin Literary Award, the Dartmouth Book Award for Fiction.

the Thomas Randall Atlantic Fiction Award, and the Trillium Book Award, among others. In 2003, he was awarded the Lannan Literary Award. His most recent work is To Everything There is a Season, a young adult/children's story which won the Booksellers' Choice Award.



Richard Scrimger has published 15 books for adults and children, and dozens of articles for magazines and newspapers. His work has won awards in Canada and the United States, and been translated into a dozen languages. His latest is Me & Death, a true-to-afterlife adventure. Richard has four children - or, more accurately, they have him.



Olive Senior is the author of three collections of short stories: Summer Lightning, which won the Commonwealth Writer's Prize Best Book; Arrival of the Snake-Woman, which has just been reissued; and Discerner of Hearts. Her poetry books include Gardening in the

Tropics, Talking of Trees, and Over the Roofs of the World, which was shortlisted for the Governor General's Literary Award. She has also written works of non-fiction on Caribbean culture, and her work has been translated into several languages. Her 2007 poetry collection, Shell, is her latest work.

Marsha Skrypuch is known for writing historical fiction for young readers. She is the author of 11 books, including Silver Threads, The Hunger, Enough, Hope's War and Nobody's Child. Two books were published in 2008: Call Me Aram and Daughter of War.



D. M. Thomas is a British poet and novelist best known for his novel The White Hotel, which won the Los Angeles Times Book Prize, and has been translated into 30 languages. His recent (second) memoir, Bleak Hotel, charts his Hollywood tribulations. He is the winner of a Cholmondeley Award for poetry, and the Orwell Prize

for his biography of Solzhenitsyn. His latest poetry collection is Flight & Smoke.





Miriam Toews writes both fiction and non-fiction. She is the author of Swing Low: A Life, A Boy of Good Breeding, Summer of My Amazing Luck, and A Complicated Kindness, an outstanding Canadian bestseller. Among her



many honours are a Governor General's Literary Award, a National Magazine Award for humour, and a Margaret Laurence Award for fiction. She won the 2008 Rogers Writers' Trust Fiction Prize for her most recent novel, The Flying Troutmans.



M G. Vassanji's extraordinary novel, The Book of Secrets, won the Giller Prize. This was followed by The Gunny Sack, which won the Commonwealth Prize. Another novel, No New Land, and a collection of short stories, Uhuru Street, were met with

critical acclaim. Amriika, Wayward Spirits, and a new novel, The In-Between World of Vikram Lall, are his most recent works. The latter won a second Giller Prize for the author. When She Was Queen, a collection of stories, appeared in 2005. M. G. Vassanji won the 2009 Governor General's Award (Non-Fiction) for his impressive travel memoir A Place Within: Rediscovering India.

Margaret Hart is the principal agent with the HSW Literary Agency. Responsible for selling manuscripts by our alumni in Canada, the U.S., and abroad, she has placed a number of works of fiction and non-fiction. Representation by the agency is open to students registered in the program whose work is recommended by an author.



Applying

When you register (see How to Register), we require that you send us, in duplicate, a work-in-progress, which will be forwarded to your writing mentor for discussion during the workshop. Your submission will help us place you in a class according to your level of accomplishment and experience. No manuscript substitutions will be accepted after placement.

You MUST include

-A cover letter describing yourself and your writing -Work-in-Progress and the Registration Form -Two identical copies (no more than 15 pages each) of an excerpt from your novel, work of non-fiction, short story, or poetry for assessment. If you are accepted, one copy will be forwarded to your mentor.

Please make sure that pages are numbered, double-spaced in 012-point font, and that your name appears on each page. Also, please keep in mind that manuscript substitutions or changes cannot be made after your submission. Include, as well, two copies of a cover letter that tells us a little about yourself and your writing.

Assessment and Placement

We will take into serious consideration your preference of instructor when deciding your placement. A committee will make all placement decisions and these decisions are final.

Photocopies

You must bring with you (in July) 10 copies of the piece you submitted to us for use in the classroom. To have enough time to study your writing, your mentor will receive a copy of your submission before the workshop begins.

NO manuscript substitutions will be made after acceptance into the program.
