
The Humber School for Writers is both practical and inspirational – a place that provides a supportive coterie and the tools to improve your writing. Consider it jet fuel for the literary mind.

Since 1992, the Humber School for Writers has distinguished itself as a leading centre for the study of creative writing. Our track record speaks for itself: more than 260 of our graduates have gone on to publish books of fiction, non-fiction, or poetry. Several have been nominated for literary awards, and a few have gone on to win. David Chariandy was long-listed for the Giller and short-listed for the Governor General's Award for his first novel, *Soucouyant*. He went on to strike a two-book deal with M&S. Robert Rotenberg had bidding wars in New York, London, and Toronto for his first novel, *Old City Hall*. And, alumnus Vincent Lam's first novel, *Bloodletting & Miraculous Cures*, won the 2006 Giller Prize – the most prestigious literary award in Canada.

Our faculty is no less impressive. In 2008, for instance, each of the major Canadian literary award winners was a current or former Humber School for Writers (HSW) faculty member. Joseph Boyden won the Scotiabank Giller Prize for *Through Black Spruce*; Miriam Toews won the Rogers Writers' Trust Fiction Prize for *The Flying Troutmans*; and Nino Ricci won the Governor General's Literary Award for *The Origin of Species*.

The week-long workshop consists of two full days and four afternoons of lectures, five mornings of classes, one evening reading, lunches, and a closing banquet.

Martin Amis is the author of ten novels, two collections of stories and seven collections of non-fiction. *Koba the Dread*, the successor to his celebrated memoir, *Experience*, was published in 2003. His novel *Yellow Dog* was published in 2004. *House of Meetings*, published in

2006, was described by the Edmonton Journal as 'unstoppable and unforgettable'. An 11th novel, *The Pregnant Widow*, is due next year. He lives in London.

Wayson Choy is the author of the critically acclaimed *The Jade Peony*, which shared the Trillium Award (1996) with Margaret Atwood, and won the City of Vancouver Book Award. His haunting memoir, *Paper Shadows*, was nominated for the



Governor General's Award and won the Edna Staebler Prize. His latest novel, the best-selling *All That Matters*, was nominated for The Giller Prize, and won the Trillium Award. Wayson Choy was named to the Order of Canada in 2006. He won the Harbourfront Festival Prize in 2008. His memoir, *Not Yet*, is his most recent work.

Bruce Jay Friedman is one of the most influential comic writers of our time. He has written for film and stage, but is best known for his fiction which includes A Mother's Kisses, Stern, and The Current Climate. His works include The



Collected Works of Bruce Jay Friedman, A Father's Kisses, Even Rhinos Were Nymphos: Best Non-Fiction, and Violencia. His most recent book is Three Balconies, a New York Times Editor's Choice pick.



Isabel Huggan has long been a valued instructor in our correspondence and summer workshop programs, with an excellent reputation for careful and kindly attention to both writers and manuscripts. She has taught creative writing in the Philippines, Hong Kong,

Australia, Switzerland, France and Canada. An internationally acclaimed writer of short stories (*The Elizabeth Stories* and *You Never Know*), she won the Charles Taylor Award for Literary Non-Fiction for her memoir, *Belonging: Home Away from Home*. She makes her home in France.

Rachel Kushner is the author of Telex from Cuba, a 2008 National Book Award finalist, and the first novel ever to tell the story of the Americans who were driven out of Cuba by revolutionary forces in 1959. A frequent contributor to Artforum,



Kushner co-edits the literary, philosophy and art journal *Soft Targets*, whose focus is political inquiry, poetry, and literature-in-translation. Her essays and fiction have also appeared in The New York Times, Bomb, Grand Street, Believer, Fence, Cabinet, and Descant. She lives in Los Angeles with her husband and son.

Carole Langille, the author of three books of poetry, has been nominated for The Governor General's Award and The Atlantic Poetry Prize. Six poems from her third book, *Late in a Slow Time*, were put to music by the composer Chan Ka Nin and performed at Sound Symposium, and



the Ottawa International Chamber Music Festival. She's given readings in New York, Athens, Prague, as well as workshops in Delhi and Kashmir. Her short-story collection was published in 2008. Currently she teaches poetry at Dalhousie University.



Alistair MacLeod is the author of three collections of short stories: The Lost Salt Gift of Blood, As Birds Bring Forth the Sun, and Island. His novel, No Great Mischief, won the International IMPAC Dublin Literary Award, The Dartmouth Book Award for Fiction.

the Thomas Randall Atlantic Fiction Award and The Trillium Award, among others. In 2003, he was awarded the Lannan Literary Award. His most recent work is *To Everything There is a Season*, a young adult/children's story which won the Booksellers' Choice Award.

John Metcalf is a writer and editor. For many years, he directed editorially the Porcupine's Quill Press and currently edits the critical journal Canadian Notes and Queries. He has been responsible for bringing to prominence such writers as Andrew Pyper, Russell Smith and Steven




Heighton. His most recent books have been Forde Abroad, a novella; Standing Stones: The Best Stories of John Metcalf; and An Aesthetic Underground: A Literary Memoir. Shut Up He Explained is his most recent work.



David Mitchell's first novel Ghost-written won the Mail on Sunday/John Llewellyn Rhys Prize and was short-listed for the GuardianFirst Book Award. His following novels number9dream and Cloud Atlas were short-listed for the Man Booker Prize in 2002 and 2004. In 2003

David Mitchell was named by Granta magazine as one of twenty 'Best of Young British Novelists'. His latest novel, *Black Swan Green*, was short-listed for the Costa Prize.



Arthur Ellis Best Crime Novel Award and serialized on CBC Radio's Between the Covers. Her most recent novel, The Restoration of Emily, was also serialized on CBC Radio.



Nino Ricci is the author of Lives of the Saints, which won the Governor General's Award, and aired as a TV adaptation. The novel, the first in a trilogy, was followed by In a Glass House and Where She Has Gone, which was short-listed for The Giller Prize. His next

novel, *Testament*, won the Trillium Award and was short-listed for the Rogers Writers' Trust Fiction Prize, as well as the Commonwealth Prize. He won the 2008 Governor General's Award for his latest novel, *The Origin of Species*.

Marsha Skrypuch is known for writing historical fiction for young readers. She is the author of 11 books, including Silver Threads, The Hunger, Enough, Hope's War and Nobody's Child. Two books were published in 2008: Call Me Aram and Daughter of War.



Miriam Toews writes both fiction and non-fiction. She is the author of Swing Low: A Life, A Boy of Good Breeding, Summer of My Amazing Luck, and A Complicated Kindness, an outstanding Canadian bestseller. Among her many honours are a Governor General's

Award, National Magazine Award for humour, and a Margaret Laurence Award for fiction. She won the 2008 Rogers Writers' Trust Fiction Prize for her most recent novel, *The Flying Troutmans*.

Toronto Book Award. His latest, *The Last Crossing*, won the Canadian Booksellers' Association Ex Libris Award for best fiction book of the year, was a regional finalist for the Commonwealth Writers Prize, won the CBC's Canada Reads, and was made into a movie for television.



Erika de Vasconcelos is the author of two novels: My Darling Dead Ones and Between the Stillness and the Grove, both published by Knopf Canada. Her third novel, The Last House, is forthcoming. Her work has been translated into several languages.

She has also published in several Canadian magazines, including *Toronto Life*, *Chatelaine*, *Brick*, *House and Home*, and others.

Margaret Hart is the principal agent with the HSW Literary Agency. Responsible for selling manuscripts by our alumni in Canada, the U.S., and abroad, she has successfully placed a number of works of fiction and non-fiction. Representation by the agency is open to students registered in the program whose work is recommended by an author.

Applying

When you register (see How to Register), we require that you send us, in duplicate, a work-in-progress, which will be forwarded to your writing mentor for discussion during the workshop. Your submission will help us place you in a class according to your level of accomplishment and experience. No manuscript substitutions will be accepted after placement.

You MUST include the following:

- -A cover letter describing yourself and your writing
 -Work-in-Progress and the Registration Form
 -Two identical copies (no more than 15 pages each) of an
 excerpt from your novel, work of non-fiction, short story,
- excerpt from your novel, work of non-fiction, short story, or poetry for assessment. If you are accepted, one copy will be forwarded to your mentor.

Please make sure that pages are numbered, double-spaced in 12-point font, and that your name appears on each page. Also, please keep in mind that manuscript substitutions or changes cannot be made after your submission. Include, as well, two copies of a cover letter that tells us a little about yourself and your writing.

Assessment and Placement

We will take into serious consideration your preferences of instructor when deciding your placement. A committee will make all placement decisions and these decisions are final.

Photocopies

You must bring with you (in July) 10 copies of the piece you submitted to us for use in the classroom. To have enough time to study your writing, your mentor will receive a copy of your submission before the workshop begins.

NO manuscript substitutions will be made after acceptance into the program.
