Since 1992, the Humber School for Writers has distinguished itself as a leading centre for the study of creative writing. The Globe and Mail called our workshop 'one of the best programs of its kind in North America', and Toronto Life called us "... a course not only highly regarded in this town, but praised on the world literary stage." What's more, our track record speaks for itself: more than 220 of our graduates have gone on to publish books of fiction, non-fiction, or poetry. Several have been nominated for literary awards, and a few have gone on to win. Take alumnus Vincent Lam, for instance. His Bloodletting & Miraculous Cures won the 2006 Giller Prize – the most prestigious literary award in Canada.

Each July, new writers from around the world gather at the Humber School for Writers to study with one of our distinguished faculty – a supportive faculty dedicated to helping participants find their creative voices - whether they're working on novels, short stories, poetry, or pieces of creative non-fiction.

The workshop consists of two full days of lectures, five mornings of classes, four afternoons of lectures, one evening reading, lunches, and a closing banquet.

The Faculty

Wayson Choy is the author of the critically-acclaimed The Jade Peony, which shared the Trillium Award (1996) with Margaret Atwood, and won the City of Vancouver Book Award. His haunting memoir, Paper Shadows, was nominated for the Governor General's Award and won

the Edna Staebler Prize. His latest novel, the best-selling All That Matters, was nominated for The Giller Prize, and won the Trillium Award. Wayson Choy was named to the Order of Canada in 2006.



Erika de Vasconcelos is the author of two novels: My Darling Dead Ones and Between the Stillness and the Grove, both published by Knopf Canada. Her third novel, The Last House, is forthcoming. Her work has been translated into several languages, and she has also

published in Toronto Life, This Magazine, and Brick.

Bruce Jay Friedman is one of the most influential comic writers of our time. He has written for film and stage, but is best known for his fiction, which includes A Mother's Kisses, Stern, and The Current Climate. His works include The Collected Works of Bruce Jay Friedman, A Father's Kisses, Even

Rhinos Were Nymphos: Best Non-Fiction, and Violencia. His most recent book is Sexual Pensées.



Isabel Huggan is the author of two short fiction collections: the award-winning The Elizabeth Stories, and the equally acclaimed You Never Know. She has achieved an international reputation for her stories, as well as for her work as a teacher of creative writing in the Philippines, Australia, Hong Kong, Switzerland, and France, where she now lives. Belonging: Home Away From Home, won The Charles Taylor Prize for



Literary Non-Fiction in 2004.

to Jamaican parents. She is the author of four novels, Every Light in the House Burnin', Never Far from Nowhere, and Small Island, which was the unique winner of The Orange Prize for Fiction, the Whitbread Book of the Year 2004, The Commonwealth Writer's Prize 2005, and the Orange Prize, Best of the Best. Her most recent novel is Fruit of the Lemon. She lives and works in London.

Alistair MacLeod is the author of three collections of short stories: The Lost Salt Gift of Blood, As Birds Bring Forth the Sun, and Islands. His novel, No Great Mischief, won the International IMPAC Dublin Literary Award, The Dartmouth Book Award for Fiction, the Thomas Randall Atlantic Fiction Award and The Trillium Award, among others. In 2003, he was awarded the Lannan Literary Award. His most recent work is To Everything There is a Season, a young adult/ children's story which won the Booksellers' Choice Award.



John Metcalf is a writer and editor. For many years, he directed editorially the Porcupine's Quill Press and currently edits the critical journal Canadian Notes and Queries. He has been responsible for bringing to prominence such writers as Andrew Pyper, Russell Smith and Steven Heighton. His most recent books have been Forde Abroad, a novella; Standing Stones, selected stories; and An Aesthetic Underground: A Literary Memoir. A new memoir is in the works.



Kim Moritsugu is coordinator of the Humber Writers' Circle, and the author of four novels, including Looks Perfect, a romantic comedy shortlisted for the City of Toronto Book Award, and The Glenwood Treasure, a literary mystery that was nominated for the Arthur Ellis Best Crime Novel Award and serialized on CBC Radio's Between the Covers. Her most recent

novel, The Restoration of Emily, was published in May, 2006 and serialized on CBC Radio.

Ninno Ricci is the author of Lives of the Saints, which won the Governor General's Award, and aired as a TV adaptation. The novel, the first in a trilogy, was followed by In a Glass House and Where She Has Gone, which was short-listed for The Giller Prize. His latest novel, Testament, won the Trillium Award and was short-listed for the Rogers Fiction Prize, as well as the Commonwealth Prize.



Richard Scrimger is the author of Crosstown, Still Life With Children, Nobody's Daughter, and Mystical Rose. The Nose from Jupiter, winner of The Mr. Christie Book Award for excellence in children's writing, was followed by The Way to Schenectady, The Nose for Adventure and Of Mice and Nutcrackers. He is also winner of a Ruth Schwartz Award for Children's Writing, and was short-listed for the City of Toronto Book Award.



Olive Senior is the author of three collections of short stories: Summer Lightning, which won the Commonwealth Prize, Arrival of the Snake-Woman and Discerner of Hearts. Her poetry books include Gardening in the Tropics, Talking of Trees,

and Over the Roofs of the World, which was shortlisted for the Governor General's Literary Award. She has also written works of non-fiction on Caribbean culture and her work has been translated into several languages.

Marsha Skrypuch is best known for writing historical fiction for young readers. She is the author of Silver Threads, The Hunger, Enough, Hope's War and Nobody's Child. Two books are being published in 2007: Call Me Aram is due this spring, and The Internment Diary of Anna Soloniuk, in the fall.







Miriam Toews writes both fiction and non-fiction. She is the author of Swing Low: A Life, A Boy of Good Breeding, Summer of My Amazing Luck, and A Complicated Kindness, an outstanding Canadian bestseller. Among her many honours are a Governor General's Award, National Magazine Award for humour, and a Margaret Laurence Award for fiction. She lives in Winnipeg where she is currently working on a new novel.

> Guy Vanderhaeghe received the Governor-General's Award (1982) for Man Descending, and in 1996 for The Englishman's Boy. His novel, Homesick, was co-winner of the City of Toronto Book Award. His latest, The Last Crossing, won the

Canadian Booksellers' Association Ex Libris Award for best fiction book of the year, was a regional finalist for the Commonwealth Writers Prize, and won the CBC's Canada Reads.

The Timothy Findley Visiting Chair in Creative Writing was established in memory of the distinguished Canadian author and playwright who passed away in 2002. Timothy Findley taught for the Humber School for Writers for many years. Each summer, a faculty member with an international reputation will assume the Timothy Findley Visiting Chair. This year, the honour goes to Andrea Levy.

Each of his novels, Dinner at the End of the World and Buying on Time (which was short-listed for the Stephen Leacock Medal and the Toronto Book Award), was received enthusiastically by critics and readers alike, as was his most recent, Woman in Bronze,

which was named a Globe and Mail Best Book, 2004. Maria Gonsalves is the Administrative Manager for the School of Creative & Performing Arts. She has helped breathe life into Humber's writing programs which have attracted students from around the world, and she has done this

with patience and humour. Madeleine Matte is Director of Communications for the School of Creative & Performing Arts. A first-rate editor who brings a broad knowledge of contemporary fiction to the Humber School for Writers, she studied creative writing with Richard Ford and D. M. Thomas.

Margaret Hart is the principal agent with the HSW Literary Agency. Responsible for selling manuscripts by our alumni in Canada, the U.S., and abroad, she has successfully placed a number of works of fiction and non-fiction. Representation by the agency is open only to students registered in the program whose work is recommended by an author.

Applying

When you register (see How to Register), we require that you send us, in duplicate, a work-in-progress, which will be forwarded to your writing mentor for discussion during the workshop. Your submission will help us place you in a class according to your level of accomplishment and experience. No manuscript substitutions will be accepted after placement.

You MUST include the following:

Two identical copies (no more than 15 pages each) of an excerpt from your novel, work of non-fiction, short story, or poetry for assessment. If you are accepted, one copy will be forwarded to your mentor.

Please make sure that pages are numbered, double-spaced in 12-point font, and that your name appears on each page. Also, please keep in mind that manuscript substitutions or changes cannot be made after your submission. Include, as well, two copies of a cover letter that tells us a little about yourself and your writing.

Assessment and Placement

We will take into serious consideration your preferences of instructor when deciding your placement, but Antanas Sileika, Artistic Director, together with a committee, will make all placement decisions and these decisions are final.

Photocopies

You must bring with you (in July) 10 copies of the piece you submitted to us for use in the classroom. To have enough time to study your writing, your mentor will receive a copy of your submission before the workshop begins. NO manuscript substitutions will be made after acceptance into the program.
