Summer Workshop

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The Humber School for Writers is both practical and inspirational - a place that provides a supportive coterie and the tools to improve your writing. Consider it jet fuel for the literary mind.

Since 1992, the Humber School for Writers has distinguished itself as a leading centre for the study of creative writing. Our track record speaks for itself: more than 275 of our graduates have been published, including placements by our in-house agency. Several have been nominated for literary awards, and a few have gone on to win. Alumna Angie Abdou's *The Bone Cage*, for instance, was chosen for a prestigious list - one of the five books on this year's Canada Reads. Sarah Selecky's *This Cake is for the Party* was shortlisted for the 2010 Scotiabank Giller Prize. Robert Rotenberg had bidding wars in New York, London, and Toronto for his first novel, *Old City Hall*, and Cathy Marie Buchanan's *The Day the Falls Stood Still* sold in Italy, the USA, the UK, and made The New York Times Best Sellers list.

Our faculty is no less impressive. Sandra Birdsell won the 2010 Saskatchewan Book Award for Fiction for her latest novel, *Waiting for Joe*. David Bergen was shortlisted for the Scotiabank Giller Prize for his *The Matter with Morris*, as was M.G. Vassanji who won the Governor General's Literary Award for Non-Fiction for his travel memoir, *A Place Within: Rediscovering India*.

The week-long workshop consists of two full days and four afternoons of lectures, five mornings of classes, one evening reading, lunches, and a closing banquet.



He has won two National Magazine Awards, a Guggenheim Fellowship, a Lila-Wallace Reader's Digest Fund Writer's Award, the Award of the American Academy of Arts and Letters, the PEN/Malamud Award for Excellence in the Short Story and, for Peace, the Dayton Literary Peace Prize.

David Bezmozgis is a writer and filmmaker. His work has appeared in The New Yorker, Harper's, Zoetrope, The Walrus, The NewYork Times Magazine, and various other publications. His first book, Natasha and Other Stories, won the Commonwealth Regional First Book Prize



and was nominated for the Governor General's Award. His first novel, The Free World, will be published in April 2011. In 2010, he was included in The New Yorker's prestigious 20 Under 40 fiction issue.

Wayson Choy is the author of the critically acclaimed The Jade Peony, which shared the Trillium Book Award with Margaret Atwood, won the City of Vancouver Book Award, and was chosen to compete in the



His memoir, Not Yet, is his most recent work.



Bruce Jay Friedman is one of the most influential comic writers of our time. He has written for film and stage, but is best known for his fiction, which includes A Mother's Kisses, Stern, and The Current Climate, The Collected Works of Bruce Jay Friedman, A Father's Kisses, Even Rhinos Were Nymphos: Best

Non-Fiction, and Violencia. His most recent book is Three Balconies, a New York Times Editor's Choice pick. His Lonely Guy was adapted into a film starring Steve Martin.

Julia Glass is the author of Three Junes, winner of the National Book Award for Fiction; The Whole World Over; and I See You Everywhere, winner of the Binghamton University John Gardner Book Award. She has received fellowships from the National Endowment for the Arts,



the New York Foundation for the Arts, and the Radcliffe Institute for Advanced Study. Her short fiction has won several prizes, and her personal essays have been widely anthologized. Her latest novel is The Widower's Tale.





Alistair MacLeod is the author of three collections of short stories: The Lost Salt Gift of Blood, As Birds Bring Forth the Sun, and Island. His novel No Great Mischief won the International IMPAC Dublin Literary Award, the Dartmouth Book Award for Fiction, the Thomas

Randall Atlantic Fiction Award, and the Trillium Book Award, among others. He was awarded the Lannan Literary Award. His most recent work is To Everything There is a Season, a young adult/children's story which won the Booksellers' Choice Award.

John Metcalf is a writer and editor. For many years, he directed editorially the Porcupine's Quill Press and currently edits the critical journal Canadian Notes and Queries. He has been responsible for bringing to prominence such writers as Andrew Pyper,




Russell Smith and Steven Heighton. His books include Forde Abroad, a novella; Standing Stones: The Best Stories of John Metcalf; and An Aesthetic Underground: A Literary Memoir. Shut Up He Explained is his most recent work.



Kim Moritsugu is the author of four novels, including Looks Perfect, a romantic comedy shortlisted for the City of Toronto Book Award, and The Glenwood Treasure, a literary mystery that was nominated for the Arthur Ellis Best Crime Novel Award and serialized

on CBC Radio's Between the Covers. Her most recent novel, The Restoration of Emily, was also serialized on CBC Radio.



Award and was short-listed for the Rogers Writers' Trust Fiction Prize, as well as the Commonwealth Prize. He won the Governor General's Award for his latest novel, The Origin of Species. Lives of the Saints was recently re-issued by Cormorant Press as a 25th anniversary special edition.



Olive Senior is the author of three collections of short stories: Summer Lightning, which won the Commonwealth Writer's Prize Best Book: Arrival of the Snake-Woman, which has just been reissued; and Discerner of Hearts. Her poetry books include Gardening in the

Tropics, Talking of Trees, and Over the Roofs of the World, which was shortlisted for the Governor General's Literary Award. She has also written works of non-fiction on Caribbean culture, and her work has been translated into several languages. Her poetry collection, Shell, is her latest work.

Guy Vanderhaeghe has received the Governor General's Award for Man Descending, and for The Englishman's Boy. His novel, Homesick, was co-winner of the City of Toronto Book Award. His latest, The Last Crossing, won the Canadian Booksellers' Association Ex Libris Award for best fiction book of



the year, was a regional finalist for the Commonwealth Writers Prize, won the CBC's Canada Reads, and was made into a movie for television. Guy Vanderhaeghe is an officer of the Order of Canada.

Erika de Vasconcelos is the author of two novels: My Darling Dead Ones and Between the Stillness and the Grove, both published by Knopf Canada. Her third novel, The Last House, is forthcoming. Her work has been translated into several languages, and she has also published in Toronto Life, This Magazine, and Brick.



Frieda Wishinsky was born in Munich, raised in New York, and now lives and writes in Toronto. A student of international relations with a graduate degree in special education, she has taught children and adults with learning disabilities in Canada, the United States and Israel. She has

written well over 40 books, some of which have been translated into Spanish, French, Swedish and Danish. She has been nominated for a Governor General's Award and won the Print Braille Book of the Year Award. The Toronto Public Library named her No Frogs for Dinner as one of the 100 Best Canadian Children's Books.

Scholarships

Scholarship applicants will automatically be considered for all available scholarships. To apply for these, please state your application prominently in your cover letter. Because competition for scholarships is keen, applicants must provide a statement explaining their financial situation, some proof of need, and a credit card number. Card numbers, however, will not be processed until you have been notified of acceptance. The scholarship amount, if awarded, will be deducted from your payment. Scholarships include:

You MUST include

- a cover letter describing yourself and your writing
- the Registration form
- two identical copies (no more than 15 pages each) of an excerpt from your novel, work of non-fiction, short story, or poetry for assessment. If you are accepted, one copy will be forwarded to your mentor.

Please make sure that pages are numbered, double-spaced in 12-point font, and that your name appears on each page. Also, please keep in mind that manuscript substitutions or changes cannot be made after your submission. Include, as well, two copies of a cover letter that tells us a little about yourself and your writing.
