

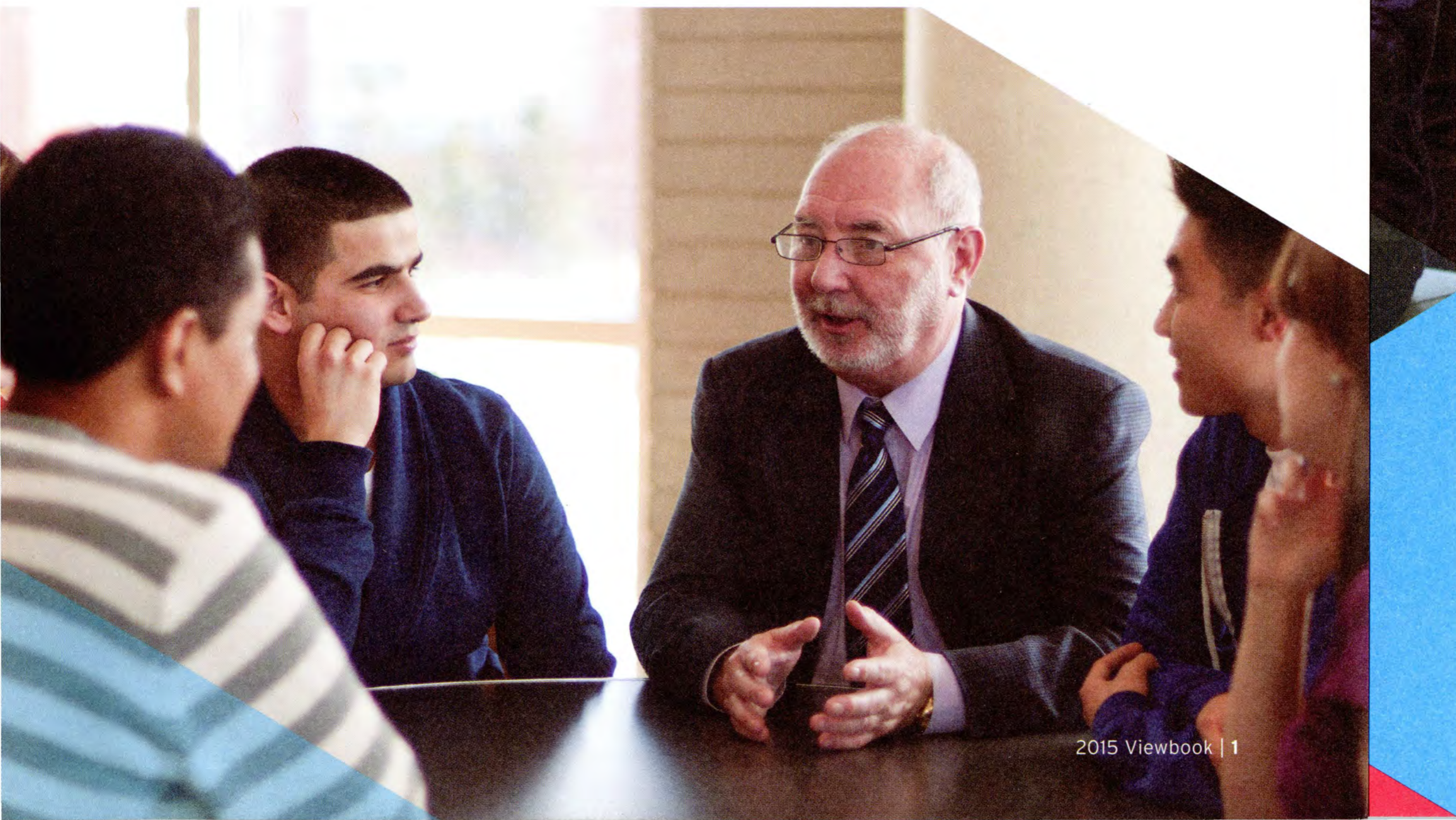

The University of Guelph-Humber is a collaboration between the University of Guelph and Humber College Institute of Technology and Advanced Learning (Humber). 

Focused curriculum

Your courses will be focused: curriculum that challenges you academically and demands hands-on experience as you learn. You know what you want and fewer electives means more content targeted to your area of study and your future career. We continue to be innovators with workplace experience an important part of every program.

Practising experts

Our faculty are experts in their field, keeping one foot in the classroom and one in the workplace to offer you real-world experience and connect you to other professionals. For instance, Dr. Shawna Coxon, a professor in Justice Studies, is a Staff Sergeant for the Toronto Police Service with 18 years of experience. Many professors are also involved in research. For example, Kinesiology Program Head Dr. Daniel Santa Mina is a scientist at the Princess Margaret Cancer Centre whose research focus includes the effect of exercise after a cancer diagnosis.

International perspectives

You have the opportunity to learn and explore the world. In the International Study course, you are part of a small group on an educational adventure. Through instructor-guided study tours, you experience concepts discussed in class, first-hand! And because all study abroad courses are partially subsidized by the University, the opportunities are within reach.

Past highlights include visiting a Soka elementary school in Tokyo, Japan; hiking in the Ecuadorian Andes at the Tandayapa Bird Lodge; and a lecture on the history and logistics of running the Cannes Film Festival by one of the logistical directors in France.

If you participate in one of our international partnerships, or exchanges, you can spend a number of weeks overseas at a foreign university such as the Management Center Innsbruck, Austria or the University of Ulster, Northern Ireland. You get to travel and study abroad, but can do so while paying University of Guelph-Humber tuition fees (not foreign student rates).

International faculty will also be coming to you! We are pleased to welcome visiting professors that can share their academic expertise and culture with you in class. We also encourage our professors to reciprocate the exchange experience in the partner country.

Undergraduate research

A research grant fund, for all programs, gives you the chance to work alongside faculty as a paid research assistant—a rare undergraduate achievement. Students have contributed more than 14,000 research hours since the program began in 2011. Through these assistantships, you are able to put classroom knowledge into practice, while also developing skills in conducting experiments, research and data collection. You may also have the opportunity to contribute to research publications.

Some of the research projects students have worked on include topics such as mental health in a northern Cree community; early childhood educators’ attitudes, knowledge and comfort addressing sexuality in early years; chemical absorption on firefighters’ clothing; and media’s coverage and influence on Canadians’ perceptions of animal welfare issues.

Business

Do you have the drive to find a competitive business career? Interested in understanding how markets work and the different ways goods are bought and sold? Do you have a passion for leadership?

Take charge. Learn how to market goods, fund a business, lead others, work ethically, think big and work within a team, but above all focus on your career objectives. Get introduced to a range of different business areas and discover where your interests lie. Our program combines an in-depth knowledge of the business world with the hands-on skills necessary to lead and succeed.

Focused academic program

Start with a foundation in the key areas of business. Courses in your first two years explore marketing, logistics, human resources management, ethics, organizational behaviour, economics and accounting. In years three and four, you will build a more personalized curriculum. You can choose to focus your studies in one of six areas of emphasis or select a variety of courses reflecting a range of interests.

Areas of emphasis

Accounting: Complete the courses you need to pursue your CPA or CGA when you graduate.

Finance: Learn about banking, insurance, capital projects, investing and portfolio management.

International Business: Explore global currencies, trade and industry practices of Asia Pacific, Europe and Latin America.

Management: Learn the challenges of running various types of enterprises including for-profit and not-for-profit.

Marketing: Explore how product, price and promotion meet consumer needs and achieve company objectives.

Small Business Management and Entrepreneurship: Study key strategies for starting and maintaining a successful new venture.

Industry connections

After your third year, you will take part in the Applied Business Study course, gaining a minimum of **100 hours** of workplace experience tailored to your goals. Placements have included BMO Financial Group, Scotiabank, RBC Dominion Securities, Sun Life Financial, Daily Bread Food Bank, Rogers, Ontario Lottery and Gaming Corporation, and Investors Group.

Opportunities

Hands-on practice

In our Business Management Simulation course, you will run a virtual business over one semester—making business decisions and managing the results. In the Planning a Small Business course, you will prepare a business plan for a small business to gain a practical understanding of the process for start-ups. You will work in a team in the Event Management course, to develop, implement and manage a special event in our Art Gallery.

Compete and network

Put your skills to the test and earn valuable experience. You can represent the University at business conferences and competitions against other postsecondary institutions, such as the Royal Roads University International Undergraduate Case Competition.

Early Childhood

Do you want to help children learn and make a difference in their lives? Are you passionate and caring? Are you enthusiastic, creative and fun? Do you want to learn more about children's growth and behaviour?

Our program focuses on the physical, social, emotional and cognitive development of young children from birth to eight years old and their interaction with the world around them. You will learn how to engage children in learning, understand parent-child relations and assess a child's development. You get the know-how to support children individually, as well as work with their families, schools and the community.

Focused academic program

Your first two years look at children as individuals. In your first year, you are introduced to the areas, or "domains", of childhood development and key issues such as human behaviour in society, nutrition and safety. In your second year, you will learn the basics of child anatomy and physiology; how to create curriculum; research and observation skills; and dynamics of relationships.

The third and fourth years of the program expand your focus to children and the community. You will learn how to work with children with special needs, program administration, assessment and intervention, and leadership. You also have the opportunity to study abroad: see page 6 for the exciting details.

Industry connections

You will complete more than **700 hours** of workplace experience. Past placements include school classrooms, early learning centres, children's mental health centres, hospital pediatric units, and inclusive learning and therapeutic environments.

Placement 1: Three two-day job shadow experiences will help introduce you to the range of job opportunities available.

Placement 2: Experience a pre-school or childcare setting.

Placement 3: Participate in a placement related to infant and toddler care.

Placement 4: Gain knowledge in the areas of special needs, junior and senior kindergarten or early years centres.

Placements 5 & 6: Based on your previous experience, you will select a year-long setting tailored to your career aspirations and knowledge base.

Note: You will be required to complete a Vulnerable Sector Screening, documentation of immunization and a First Aid/CPR certificate prior to placement.

Opportunities

Know the why and how

You will develop a comprehensive set of abilities to assess children's development and be able to support and educate children based on that assessment in a meaningful way. Earn hands-on experience designing and implementing play materials that meet the developmental needs of children in our Play and Programming for Early Childhood course.

Teach with toys

You can borrow from our extensive collection of toys and educational materials in the Early Childhood Resource Room for use in your field placements. Choose from developmental, skill-building, cognitive and creative play.

Family and Community Social Services

Do you want to help others? Do you want to effect change? Are you interested in getting involved hands on with a social issue you are passionate about?

Make a difference in society in a very meaningful way. Our program explores current social issues, and the development and delivery of programs designed to assist individuals, families and communities. You will be exposed to different areas of social service work and learn how to understand the challenges faced by vulnerable populations so you can learn how to deliver impactful services, including counselling, mediation and crisis intervention.

Focused academic program

Courses in your first year focus on understanding human behaviour and issues related to individuals, families and groups in the field of social work. Courses include Issues in Social Welfare, Early and Middle Childhood Development, and Interpersonal Communication. In your second year, you will engage in theoretical and practical studies in counselling, ethics and professional issues, and working with various vulnerable populations.

The third and fourth years of the program will introduce you to working with groups, communities and the elderly, as well as how to handle conflict. You also have the opportunity to study abroad: see page 6 for more details.

You will graduate with important skills and approaches you need for the workplace or further studies in social work—how to listen, how to support someone, understanding boundaries, professionalism, cultural awareness, compassion and self-care.

Industry connections

Starting in your second year, you will earn more than **850 hours** of supervised workplace experience at three different placements. Past placements include children's mental health centres, hospitals, seniors' residences, addiction centres, research clinics, detention centres and correctional institutions.

Placement 1: Initial exposure to a variety of social issues and the day-to-day operations within a community organization.

Placement 2: Continue to learn about agency functions and begin to interact with agency staff, volunteers, clients and the community for one academic year.

Placement 3: Provide direct client services through individual, family, group and/or community interventions in a year-long placement.

Note: You will be required to complete a Vulnerable Sector Screening prior to placement.

Opportunities

Simulate a community agency

Take advantage of a lab simulating aspects of a typical community agency. The room is equipped with one-way observation mirrors, audiovisual equipment, interview furniture and offices. Use it for research and to practise administrative, interviewing and counselling skills.

Participate in professional development

The Social Services Symposium is an annual themed event organized by Family and Community Social Services students that gives you the opportunity to present research and learn from various practitioners and researchers in your field.

Hands-on practice

Two courses offer you the opportunity to practise interviewing and counselling. By videotaping the sessions and receiving peer support and instructor feedback you can analyze your techniques to help you learn to communicate and help people more effectively.

Justice Studies

Are you interested in work related to policing, immigration, law, social justice, security, parole or probation? Do you want to help people? Would you like to be a part of making the world a better place?

Accept the challenge and responsibility a career in justice studies holds. Our program gives you the opportunity to gain academic and practical experience in justice issues. Develop strategies for working in a public service role with high-risk individuals in public, private, community and institutional settings, or moving ahead with further educational opportunities.

Focused academic program

In your first year, you will build a foundation in justice and related fields through courses such as Crime and Criminal Justice, Introduction to Law, and Principles of Sociology. In year two, you begin to take courses that touch on various services and how they are delivered, such as counselling, conflict resolution, forensics and policing.

After four years of full-time study, you will earn an **Honours Bachelor of Applied Science in Justice Studies** as well as a college diploma. You will choose which diploma to pursue in your second year:

Community and Justice Services

Focuses on social issues and explores the development of community programs, ways to work with both victims and offenders, and methods of crime prevention.

Or

Police Foundations

Prepares you for a career in the various levels of law enforcement in the Canadian justice system.

Years three and four, move on to advanced courses that immerse you in issues such as ethics, equality, rights and freedoms, youth and the law, and criminology. You also have the opportunity to study abroad: for more information see page 6.

Throughout your four years, you will be exposed to the justice system: from the rules we follow, to dealing with people and communities, to the hands-on processing of crime scenes and making arrests. Build key skills required in any area of justice such as critical thinking, research methods and how to write effectively.

Industry connections

Unique to our program, you will take part in at least **200 hours** of community service placements in two justice agencies/organizations. Past placements include Toronto Police Service, Ontario Provincial Police, Special Investigations Unit, Yonge Street Mission, The Salvation Army and Ministry of the Attorney General.

Note: You may be required to complete a Vulnerable Sector Screening and/or Criminal Reference Check prior to placement.

Opportunities

Investigate crime scenes

Evaluate staged crime scenes in our very own crime scene investigation (CSI) room. You can use mock court to seek search and arrest warrants or role-play through a case. Also, learn investigative techniques and how to handle evidence.

Observe social issues

In the Canadian Social Problems course, you will take part in a street walk with classmates and faculty in downtown Toronto to observe and discuss social issues, such as poverty and homelessness.

Meet people in the field

Take specialized field trips to places such as Maplehurst Correctional Complex, the Ontario Police College and local courthouses. Guest speakers and visiting professors lend their expertise to your education.

Join a society

Join the Criminal Justice Honour Society, Alpha Phi Sigma. The society promotes academic excellence, community service, educational leadership and unity.

Kinesiology

Do you want to teach people how to adopt healthier lifestyles? Are athletics and physical fitness important to your life? Would you like to be a part of new performance and health research?

Turn your passion for health and fitness into a future in kinesiology and help address today's health concerns. Our program focuses on the science of the body and human movement. You will learn how the body works, how to make it work better, what causes health issues and how to prevent illness. You will develop a strong scientific background and practical skills that will enable you to apply your knowledge to essential roles in health promotion, fitness and lifestyle assessments, rehabilitation, training and research.

Focused academic program

In the first two years of the program you will learn the fundamentals of the human body through courses such as Biochemistry and Metabolism; Human Anatomy; and Cell Biology, while developing applied skills in courses such as Health Counselling and Behaviour Change; Exercise Prescription; and Fitness/Lifestyle Assessment. In the third and fourth years, your courses will focus on performance and clinical applications of exercise and nutrition theory. You will also engage in independent research.

Embedded in our program is hands-on experience through practicum courses, labs and placements. Our study abroad course offers you the opportunity for additional first-hand experience: see page 6 for more details.

Industry connections

You will complete more than **240 field placement hours** during your final two years. On campus, in your third year, you will work one-on-one with a client to help reach their fitness goals through a personal training placement. Off campus, you will work with an organization offering applied experience or research. Placements have included Princess Margaret Cancer Centre, Ontario Lung Association, Aim2Walk Neurological Rehabilitation Centre, Toronto and Peel District school boards, GoodLife Fitness and several university athletic departments.

Opportunities

Learn through labs

Labs extend your classroom content with applied techniques and hands-on lessons. They are integrated into every year of study and enhance your learning experience of anatomy (working with human cadavers), exercise prescription, biomechanics, fitness assessment and more.

Choose career-relevant practicums

You will take at least two practicum courses, focusing on complementary and advanced exercise training and testing, to gain hands-on experience in an area of interest. Courses include Functional Ability Evaluation; Athletic Bandaging and Taping Techniques; Group Strength and Athletic Training; Therapeutic Exercise for Special Populations; and Flexibility, Yoga and Pilates Training.

Gain undergraduate research

Our program offers unique, valuable research experience through faculty-supervised research courses (literature review or thesis); by utilizing placement hours for research-based work; and/or through research assistant positions with University faculty.

Get certified

With your degree, you will be eligible to pursue the following designations with several professional organizations: Registered Kinesiologist; Certified Personal Trainer; Certified Exercise Physiologist; Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist; Fitness Instructor Specialist; and Functional Capacity Evaluator.

Explore journalism (telling stories), digital communication (telling stories digitally), public relations (telling stories on behalf of others), image arts (telling stories visually) and media business (managing the business of storytelling). Our program teaches you how to communicate, while giving you the skills to use different media platforms to meet those needs. We keep pace with an industry that sees our graduates as media professionals with the versatility to work in diverse and changing environments.

Focused academic program

During your first two years, you will be introduced to various media fields and study the historical, social, cultural and ethical aspects of the industry through courses that challenge you to think, read and write critically. Learn how media has developed then look ahead to emerging trends. Following your second year, you will choose one of five specializations.

Specializations

Digital Communications: Create multi-platform content; work with web design, audio and videography.

Image Arts: Learn photographic techniques, video and photo editing and manipulation, and study commercial and art photography.

Journalism: Explore print, broadcast and online journalism with a strong focus on writing, editing and pitching stories.

Media Business*: Learn the business of managing media sales, marketing and advertising.

Public Relations: Learn corporate communications, media relations and event management using various tools, including traditional and social media.

You are not limited by your specialization. You can take courses from other areas as well. Third and fourth year courses teach you about governance and policy and how to work in a team environment, such as producing a newspaper or television broadcast or promoting and managing a large event.

As part of the Applied Research Project course, you will explore, in depth, a subject of your choice. Past projects have included "The Impact

of Social Networking Sites on Today's Youth" and "The Fascination with Anti-Heroes in 21st-century Television." You also have the opportunity to study overseas: see page 6 for the exciting details.

Industry connections

After third year, you will take part in an internship to gain more than **200 hours** of experience in any aspect of media linked to your curriculum. Placements have included TSN, Faze Magazine, Chatelaine, 680News, Photographers without Borders, Holmes PR, Corus Entertainment and Bell Media.

Opportunities

Access technology

Our new multi-purpose production facility has high-definition sound; a green screen; editing suites; facilities for photography, videography, streaming radio and television broadcasts; and mobile technology. Also available to you is our integrated newsroom for newspaper, magazine, television and/or radio, and photography studios.

Broadcast your skills

In the two courses, Specialized Reporting and News Editing and Writing, you will produce Radix: a weekly print and online newspaper. You can also apply your media skills to the Guelph-Humber Media Society, fondly known as GuHu, which can involve you in running the GuHu radio or TV station, or website.

Work as a team

In fourth year, you will work with your classmates as a multi-disciplinary team to organize EMERGE, an annual media conference, online/print magazine and photography exhibit.

Psychology

Interested in learning how people think? Want to understand human emotion and why people behave the way they do? Are you curious about the human brain?

Find your niche. Through our program you will examine theories and research to explore our understanding of human thought, feeling and behaviour. Study the brain. Learn research skills. Discover how psychology plays a role in every area of society—business, health, sports, entertainment, law, communication and more. Get the mix of theoretical knowledge and experience that will prepare you for continued study or to be competitive in the workplace.

Focused academic program

A solid foundation in psychology will drive your success. Your first two years introduce you to key concepts and provide foundational courses, including Developmental Psychology; Social Psychology; Research Methods for Social Science; and Personality. You will also build your skills in critical thinking and effective writing.

You will have the option to choose one of three areas of emphasis in a field complementary to psychology.

Areas of emphasis

Business: Learn how psychology plays a role in business. Related field - Industrial/Organizational Psychology.

Human Services: Develop an understanding of mental illness and crisis intervention. Related field - Community Mental Health.

Justice Studies: Learn how psychology is applied in the justice field. Related field - Criminal/Forensic Psychology.

In years three and four, your courses will become more focused and offer more applied study. You will apply learned concepts in psychology through courses such as Drugs and Behaviour, and Mediation and Conflict Resolution. You also have the opportunity to study overseas: see page 6 for details.

You will choose an honours seminar or thesis option in your final year, which will engage you in detailed investigation into a specific topic. If graduate school is your goal, the thesis option gives you the opportunity to receive valuable research experience.

Industry connections

In the third-year course Applied Study in Psychology, you will integrate psychological theories and research with at least **60 hours** of workplace experience. Placements have included Aphasia Institute, Community Living Mississauga, Operation Springboard, Toronto Catholic District School Board, and Peel Halton Dufferin Acquired Brain Injury Services.

Note: You will be required to complete a Vulnerable Sector Screening prior to placement.

Opportunities

Learn outside the classroom

As part of the optional field course, you learn from Elders, community members and local mental health care service providers in Ontario's northern Cree communities. Examine the challenges and treatments, and explore the future of Aboriginal mental health in these communities.

Combine education and social events

Take part in Common Time: weekly workshops, notable guest lecturers and special events that bring together fellow classmates and faculty in an academic and social atmosphere. Many activities are run by the Psych Society.

Gain undergraduate research

Consider applying for a paid research assistant position and work alongside faculty for additional hands-on experience. Study examples include examining coping strategies in marathon runners, and evaluating a new program to help elementary children manage stress.



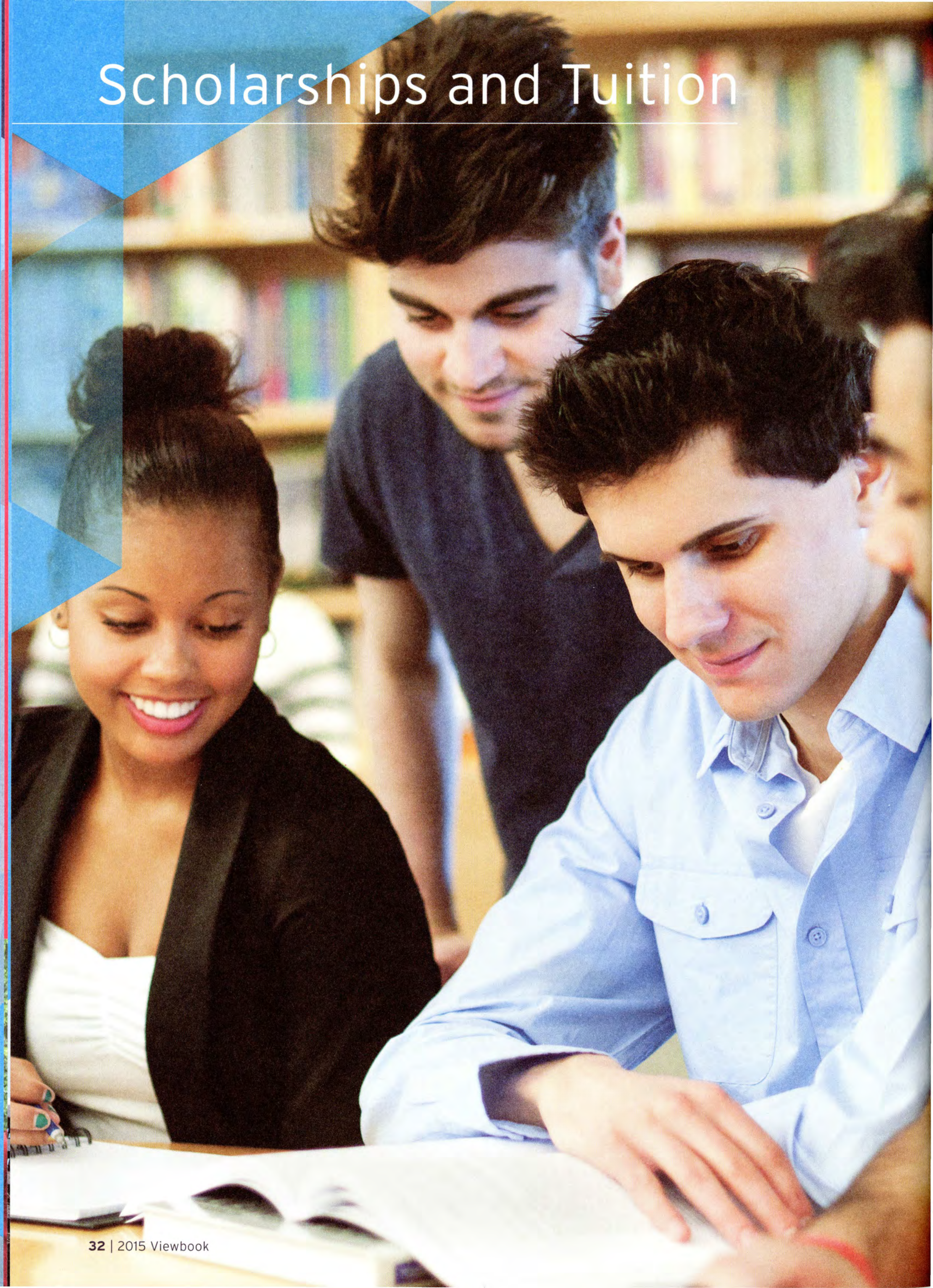



Awards and Scholarships

Scholarships, bursaries and awards are a great way to support your educational expenses.

Academic Merit Entrance Scholarship

When you apply as a high school student you will automatically be considered for our Academic Merit Entrance Scholarship, which is based on your academic achievement. When you apply as a college student with a completed diploma or a university student with one year of university courses, you will also be considered for the Academic Merit Entrance Scholarship based on your final cumulative average. International students are also automatically considered for this scholarship.

An estimate of your Academic Merit Entrance Scholarship amount will be included in your offer of admission. An increase in your final average may increase your scholarship amount. Keep working hard!

Founders' Academic Merit Scholarship

\$20,000

Developed to recognize academic achievement, leadership and extracurricular activities, the scholarship will be disbursed in \$5,000 installments per year, over your four years of study. Ten scholarships are awarded each year.

To be considered for this scholarship you must be entering postsecondary studies for the first time at the University and have a minimum 90% admission average. To retain the scholarship in your second, third and fourth years you must be a full-time student and maintain a cumulative average of 80%. 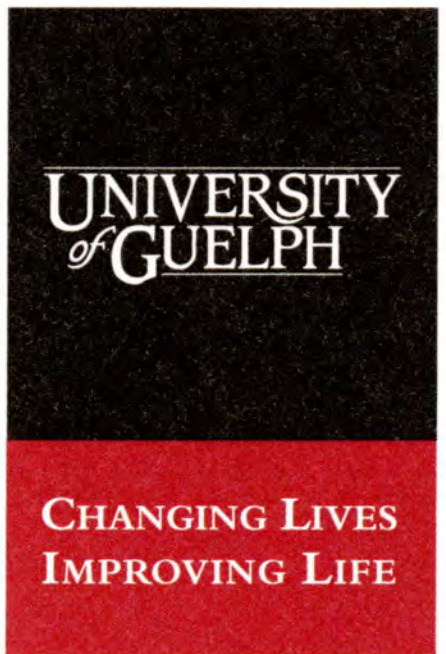

A high-affinity college diploma program is one that has been determined to have close affinity to a University of Guelph-Humber program. If you have completed a high-affinity diploma program, then you have met the specific subject area requirements expected from the high school curriculum. Students transferring from high-affinity diploma programs are typically eligible to receive a block of pre-determined transfer credit based on successful diploma completion.

Admission average

Students transferring from a high-affinity diploma program (see chart, right) may be considered for admission based on a minimum cumulative average of 75% upon completion of the diploma. Possession of the minimum requirements for entry does not guarantee admission.

Transfer credit assessment
