# Business

Our Business program combines an in-depth knowledge of the business world with the hands-on skills necessary to lead and succeed in any field.

## Curriculum

Courses in the first two years explore marketing, logistics, human resources management, ethics, organizational behaviour, finance and leadership.

Courses in years three and four allow you to build a personalized portfolio. You can either mix and match courses or choose to focus your studies in one of six areas of emphasis.

## Areas of Emphasis

**Accounting:** Courses in Managerial Accounting, and Taxation and Auditing are part of the 51 credit hours that are required for CA candidacy with the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Ontario (ICAO). You will also be able to further your education as a CMA or CGA.

**Finance:** Explore money-management practices in Investment Finance, Personal Financial Planning and Portfolio Management.

**International Business:** Conduct business in the global economy and explore the industry practices of Asia Pacific, Europe and Latin America and take courses in international trade, finance and law.

**Management:** Gain a theoretical and practical understanding of the challenges involved in running enterprises of various kinds including large and small businesses, for-profit and not-for-profit organizations.

**Marketing:** Explore how product, price, promotion and distribution methods meet consumer needs and achieve company objectives in Professional Selling, E-Commerce and the Applied Business Project.

# Early Childhood

Our Early Childhood program teaches students to become skilled professionals who are prepared to work with the most important people in the world: children.

## Curriculum

Focusing on the physical, social, emotional and cognitive development of young children within the context of the family and community, the Early Childhood program's first-year courses help to build an understanding of human behaviour in society, issues related to infant and childhood development as well as nutrition and safety.

In your second year you will take courses in curriculum development, parent-child relations, and observing and recording children's behaviour.

The third and fourth years of the program will introduce you to topics such as working with children with diverse needs, program administration, and leadership to fully prepare you for all aspects of the field.

## Get to Work!

You will participate in five placements totalling 650 hours of experience in a variety of settings.

**Placement 1:** Job shadow careers in the field of early childhood.

**Placements 2–4:** Engage with families and young children at agencies and organizations that assist children at different developmental stages.

**Placement 5:** Based on your previous experience, you will select a year-long setting or program tailored to your career aspirations and knowledge base.

Note: Agencies offering placement opportunities require all students to complete a police record check, documentation of immunization and a First Aid/CPR certificate.

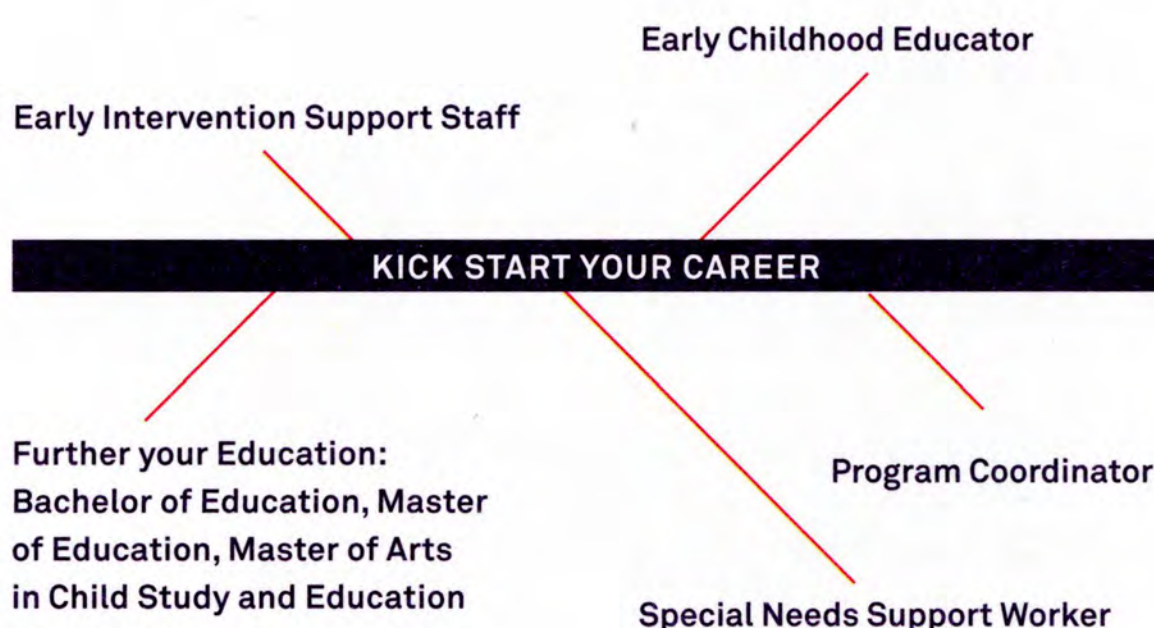

# Family and Community Social Services

2008

The FCSS Social Justice Committee is developed to provide financial assistance and awareness to contemporary social issues.

The Family and Community Social Services program explores challenging issues present in our modern world including homelessness, mental health, abuse and addiction.

## Curriculum

Courses in your first year focus on understanding human behaviour in society and issues related to individuals, families, groups and the field of social work.

In your second year you will engage in theoretical and practical studies in counselling, ethics and working with various vulnerable populations.

Third and fourth years of the program will introduce you to working with groups, communities and the elderly as well as how to handle crisis situations.

## Get to Work!

Starting in year two, you will take part in three placements totalling over 900 hours of experience.

**Placement 1:** Provides you with the initial exposure to the field of social work and the variety of issues related to community agency operations.

**Placement 2:** In this placement you will continue to learn about agency functions and begin to experience direct client work.

**Placement 3:** In your final year you will become involved in providing direct services through individual, family, group and/or community interventions in a year-long placement.

Note: Agencies offering placement opportunities require all students complete a police record check.

# Justice Studies

Our Justice Studies program gives you the opportunity to gain practical experience within the judicial system and develop strategies for working in a public service role with high-risk individuals in public, private, community and institutional settings.

## Curriculum

In the first year of the program you will take core courses that provide a background in the justice field such as Crime and Criminal Justice, Introduction to Law, and Principles of Sociology.

In your second year you will choose between two areas of emphasis: Police Foundations or Community and Justice Services to further focus your studies.

In your final two years of the program you will continue to take courses in your area of emphasis as well as explore core issues in justice such as ethics, youth and the law, criminology and Canadian social problems.

## Areas of Emphasis

**Police Foundations:** Prepare for work in the various levels of Canadian policing through courses like Community Policing, Police Governance and Accountability, and Physical Fitness.

**Community and Justice Services:** Explore the development of community programs, how to work with both victims and offenders and ways to prevent crime in courses like Community Building Practices, Restorative Justice, and Inclusive Community Practices.

## Get to Work!

In your second and third years you will complete 200 hours of community service placements to develop your awareness of contemporary social issues. Some places our students have worked include the Association in Defence of the Wrongly Convicted, Special Investigations Unit (SIU) and Toronto Court Services.

Note: Agencies offering placement opportunities require all students to complete a police record check.

# Kinesiology

Our program focuses on understanding the science of the human body, while also providing you with the opportunity to apply that knowledge to essential roles in health counselling and promotion through fitness and lifestyle assessments.

In 2011 a Kinesiology graduate was the first University of Guelph-Humber grad to be accepted into the Canadian Memorial Chiropractic College.

## Curriculum

The first year of the program will introduce you to the field of Kinesiology through courses covering anatomy, health counselling, cell biology and physiology.

Your second year focuses on exercise prescription and fitness assessment while applying the knowledge you gained in your first year.

In your third and fourth years you will participate in two field placements giving you hands-on experience in the field. You will also have the opportunity to take part in scientific research through an independent study course.

# Media Studies

Our Media Studies program allows you to explore the world of media, evaluate the role of mass communication in society and the impact it has on a global scale.

## Curriculum

In the first two years of the program you will get a strong theoretical background in historical and current media communication through courses such as Mass Communication, Film Study and Ethical Issues in Media.

In your third and fourth years you will focus your studies in one of four areas of emphasis: Digital Communications, Image Arts, Journalism or Public Relations.

## Areas of Emphasis

**Digital Communications:** Learn to plan and produce web-based communication through web design, video production, image editing and written content.

**Image Arts:** Focus on visual communication, photographic techniques and photography-based art practices.

**Journalism:** Learn to write for newspapers, magazines and the internet and gain experience in radio and television broadcasting.

**Public Relations:** Prepare to write and produce communications on behalf of businesses, consulting firms, government and non-profit organizations.

## Get to Work!

Following your third year of study, you will take part in a 240–280 hour internship available from a range of media organizations in the Greater Toronto Area or abroad. Some of the places our students have worked include Weber Shandwick PR, Tangerine Photography and MTV.



In 2007 Media Studies students won the International Association of Business Communicator's Gold Quill Award for Best Student Project after a member of their class ran for mayor of Toronto.

# Psychology

Through the Psychology program you will examine foundational and current theories in human behaviour research to learn why we do the things we do.



In June 2011 the first graduating class in Psychology crossed the Convocation stage.

## Curriculum

In your first year you will receive a background in key concepts of psychology including personality, development and social psychology.

In your second year you can choose an area of emphasis in Business, Human Services or Justice Studies that will allow you to apply your knowledge to a discipline complementary to Psychology.

In your third and fourth years you will have the opportunity to participate in a work placement and to complete a research study to explore an area of Psychology that interests you.

## Areas of Emphasis

**Business:** Study core business practices through a selection of courses that include Consumer Behaviour, Marketing and Organizational Behaviour.

**Related field in Psychology:** Industrial/Organization Psychology

**Human Services:** Focus on key social problems and how they affect our world through courses such as Social Work in Canada, Couple and Family Dynamics, and Crisis Intervention Theory and Practice.

**Related field in Psychology:** Community Mental Health

**Justice Studies:** Explore the role of law and punishment in society in Crime and Criminal Justice, Correctional Institutions, and Immigration Policy and Practice.

**Related field in Psychology:** Forensic Psychology

## Get to Work!

In the Applied Study in Psychology you will combine academic study with a minimum of 60 hours of workplace experience. Some places our students have worked include the Mood Disorders Association of Ontario, Performance Psychology and Scarborough Village Public School.

Through the Applied Research Project you will work in conjunction with a faculty member to develop and test a research question.

## International Travel Opportunities and Field Study

### Independent Study in Business

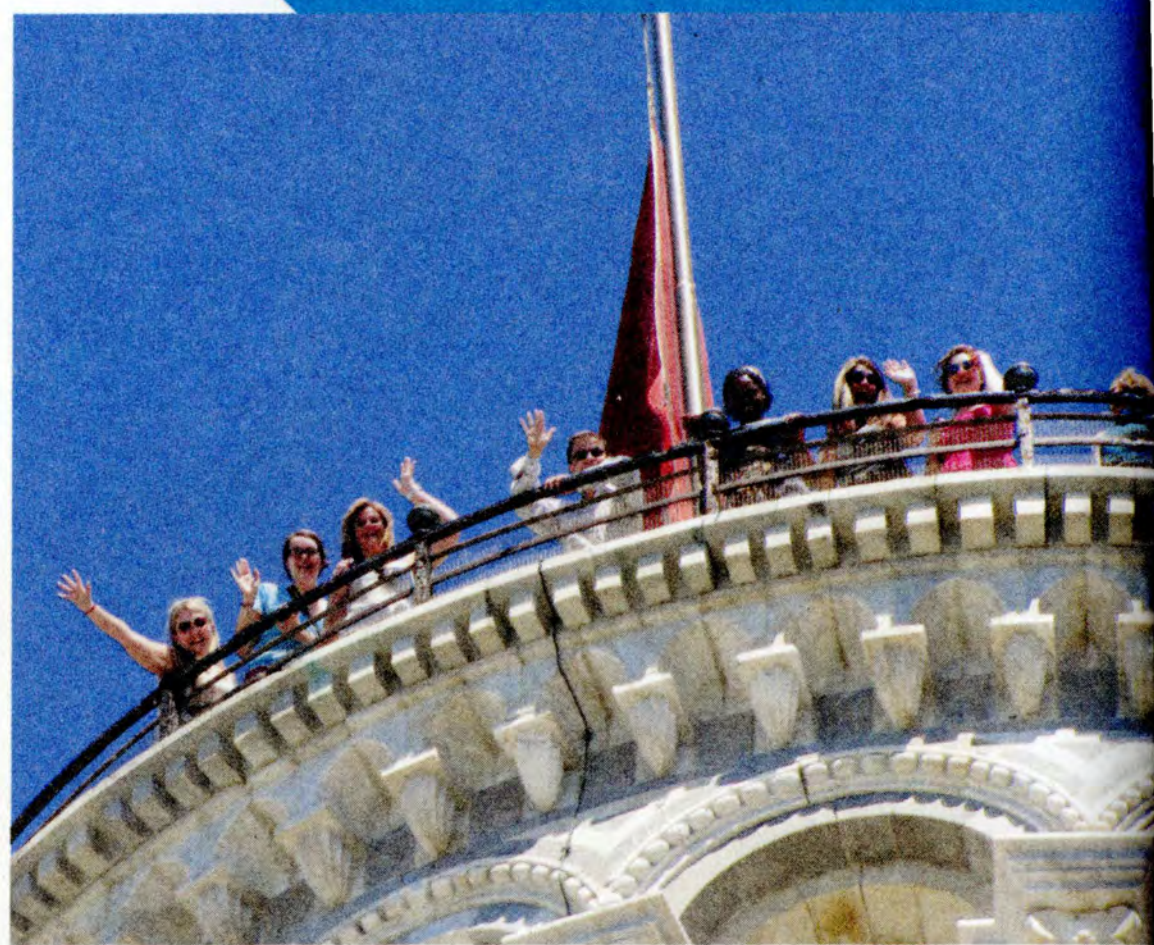
Open to students in all programs, the Independent Study in Business course has taken students to London, England; Florence and Venice, Italy; and Innsbruck, Austria.

Through trips abroad you will apply the concepts you are learning in class lectures, such as entrepreneurial operations in tourism or modern commerce and banking, by visiting them first hand and exploring their history.

Some highlights of excursions in the past include visiting the trading room of RBC Capital Markets and the London Metal Exchange in London as well as seeing the Uffizi Museum and Duomo Church in Florence.

### Field Studies: Connecting to Communities

Our students have the opportunity to explore service learning and be engaged in the community through field study courses. This transformative experience puts theory into practice. For example, in May 2011, students travelled to Moosonee, Ontario to work alongside mental health agencies of the area and learn first hand the issues facing Canadian Aboriginal communities.



## Participate in Research

A research grant fund at the University of Guelph-Humber gives our students the unique opportunity to work alongside faculty as research assistants.

Through research assistantships you will be able to put skills you are learning in the classroom into practice while also learning new skills in research, data collection and logistics. You may also have the opportunity to contribute to research publications.


Some of the research projects our students have worked on include Test-Retest Reliability of Toddler NutriSTEP, Detecting Sarcopenia in older Adults at Risk of Falling and the Effects of Collaboration on Intellectual Risk Taking.

## Student Transition and Resource Team (START)

The best people to help you navigate the application process and those first days of school are those who have been in your shoes. START Leaders are current students who will be there to share their personal experiences during campus tours and events, and will lead you through Orientation. They will also get in touch with you through email before classes begin to help answer any questions you may have.

## Kick Start

Once you choose the University of Guelph-Humber, you'll want to get a feel for what life will be like on campus. In the summer, we offer sessions through Kick Start for you and your family to help prepare you for university studies, familiarize yourself with our campus resources and introduce you to your new classmates.

Your Academic Advisor will assist you with course selection, review your education plans, help you to interpret degree regulations and refer you to key on-campus resources.

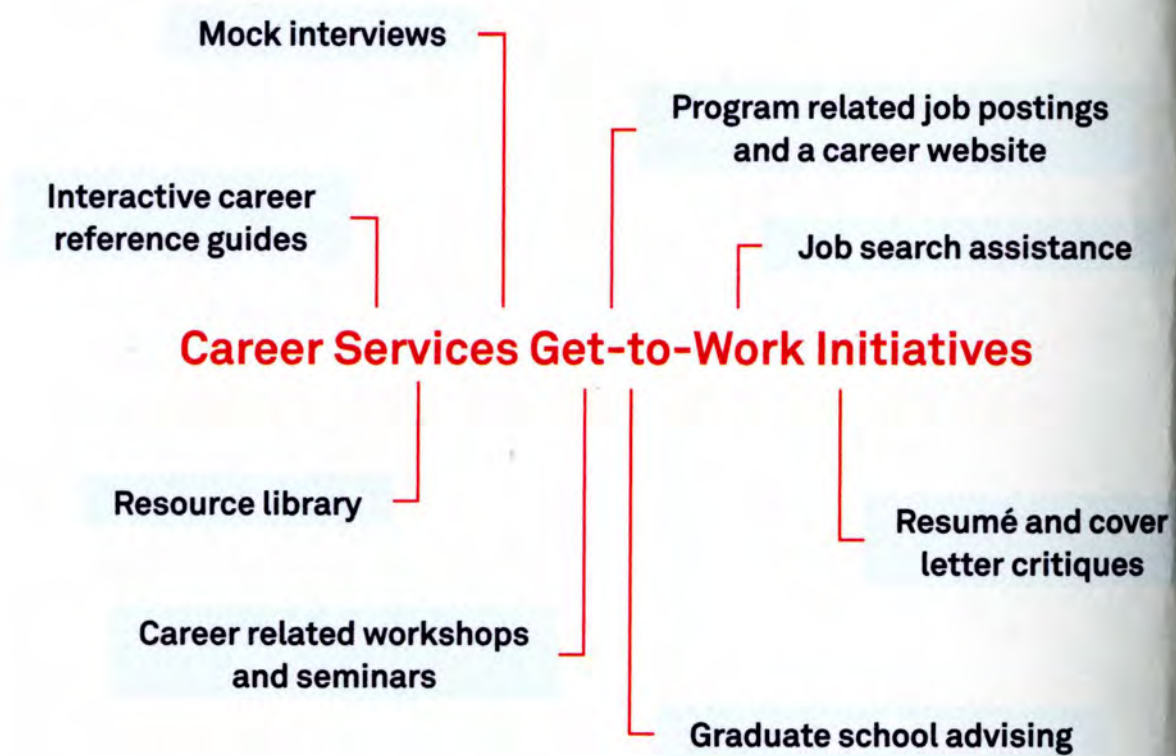

# Support

## Places to go

**Learning Commons:** An informal student-centered learning environment for group meetings and individual study. Staff in the Learning Commons are available to help you with research materials for assignments and will assist you with software and technology questions.

**Library:** You have access to two major academic library systems: the University of Guelph library system (which includes the University of Waterloo and Wilfrid Laurier University) and Humber libraries.

**Math Centre and Writing Centre:** The Math Centre offers assistance in calculus and statistics, while the Writing Centre provides support with essay writing and thesis development.

**Aboriginal Student Services:** A wide range of services are offered to support the Aboriginal student population including academic, personal, cultural and career support.

**Personal Counsellors:** Counsellors are available to assist you in identifying and resolving your personal concerns in a private, confidential setting, free of charge.

**Public Safety:** Services and programs such as a safety escort program and emergency telephones are available on campus. Security also provides a service to assist students who experience car trouble.

**Work-Study Program:** The Work-Study Program provides you with access to part-time jobs on campus. Positions are available in various departments including student life, recruitment, athletics and residence. The program is a great way to earn money and gain experience while you study.

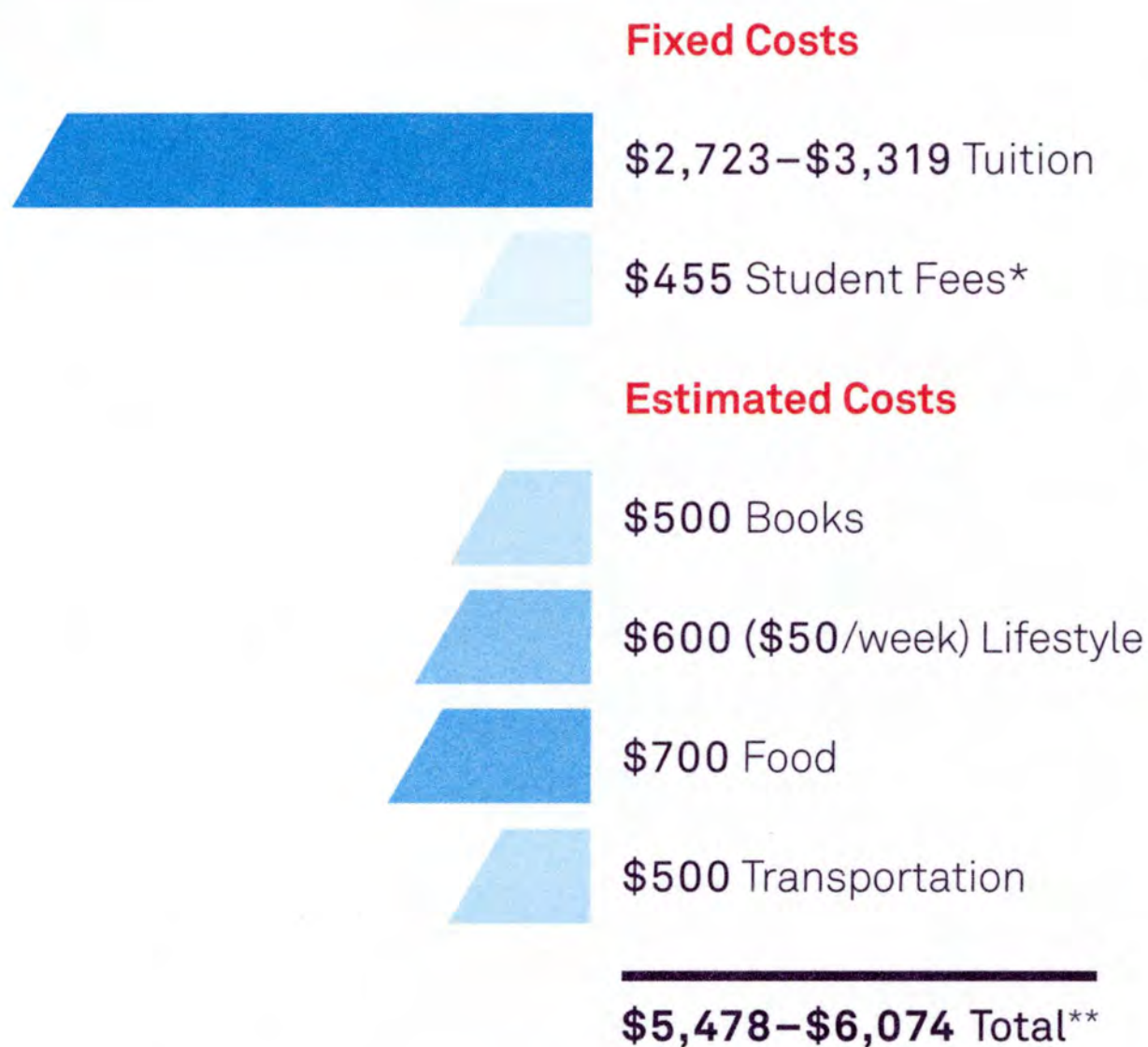

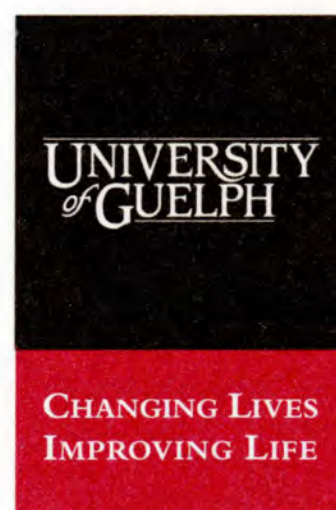

Factors beyond your control that may have negatively affected your academic performance (illness, personal issues) will also be considered. Although all applicants are strongly encouraged to submit a High School Student Profile, if you anticipate your average will be within the 70–74.9% range it is essential that you complete the High School Student Profile.

The High School Student Profile will be reviewed carefully when making admission decisions and is the basis for consideration for the Student Profile Scholarship (see page 39). The profile will be available at [guelphhumber.ca](http://guelphhumber.ca) in November.

## Advanced Placement (AP)

## College Transfer Applicants

### Grade and Subject Requirements

Transfer applicants should have a minimum 75% cumulative average to be considered for admission. If you are not applying from a recognized diploma program, you must meet the specific subject requirements at the 4U level or an equivalent course through your college course work. Contact Admission Services, [info@guelphhumber.ca](mailto:info@guelphhumber.ca), to determine the necessary subject requirements.

## Recognized Diplomas

A recognized college diploma program is one that has been determined to have close affinity to a University of Guelph-Humber program. Students transferring from a recognized diploma program (see chart below) may be considered for admission based on a minimum cumulative average of 75% upon completion of the diploma.

If you currently have or are completing a recognized diploma in Business or Kinesiology, you may wish to apply for May entry. Please refer to our website for more details.



## University Transfer Applicants

### Grade and Subject Requirements

University transfer applicants must be eligible to continue at their home institution and meet the specific subject requirements to be considered for admission. A minimum 70% cumulative average is required for admission consideration.

### Transfer Credit Policy

If you would like previous post-secondary course work to be considered for potential advanced standing credits, you must submit detailed course syllabi to be reviewed by the Admission Review Committee. Course syllabi should be submitted along with transcripts.

**I am attending post-secondary for the first time and I am over 21 years of age.**

**Mature Applicant**

If you are 21 years of age or older, have been away from high school study for at least two full years and have NOT attended a post-secondary institution, you may apply as a mature applicant. You must apply through the Ontario Universities' Application Centre at [www.ouac.on.ca](http://www.ouac.on.ca) using the 105D form by **May 1, 2012**.

To be considered for admission, three 4U or 4M courses including program specific subject requirements (as listed under the High School Applicant section) should be completed. Submit your secondary school transcripts to the university by **June 1, 2012**.

## Mature and Transfer Student Profile

Mature and transfer students should complete a Mature and Transfer Student Profile online.

It will be reviewed carefully when making admission decisions and forms the basis of consideration for the Student Profile Scholarship.

The Mature and Transfer Student Profile will provide you with an opportunity to tell the Admission Review Committee about activities you have been involved in that have contributed to your personal development (work experience, volunteer opportunities and community involvement). Factors beyond your control that may have negatively affected your academic performance (illness, personal issues) will also be considered. Although all applicants are strongly encouraged to submit a Student Profile, if you anticipate your average will be within the 70–74.9% range it is essential that you complete the Student Profile. Please submit the Student Profile when you submit your transcript documentation to ensure a complete review of your application.

# I am applying from a country other than Canada.

International Applicant

The University of Guelph-Humber welcomes students from all over the world. You are considered an international student if you are: attending a high school outside of Canada or if you are attending a high school in Canada but are not a Canadian Citizen, Permanent Resident or Protected Person.

Apply online through the Ontario Universities' Application Centre at [www.ouac.on.ca](http://www.ouac.on.ca) using the 105F form by **March 1, 2012**. Official high school and college/university transcripts should be sent directly to the University of Guelph-Humber from the originating institution.

A secondary school graduation certificate which would admit a student to an internationally recognized university in their home country is normally acceptable. Country specific admission requirements can be found at [guelphhumber.ca/admissions](http://guelphhumber.ca/admissions). You should include among your senior level courses specific subject requirements that are required for admission to the degree program of your choice. Possession of minimum requirements does not guarantee entry.

Students meeting the minimum requirements will be considered for admission on an on-going basis as soon as all required documentation has been received. The document deadline is **March 1, 2012**. We strongly advise you to submit a Student Profile, available online at [guelphhumber.ca](http://guelphhumber.ca), starting in November.

## International Requirements

### US requirements

Applicants from US secondary schools must have a minimum grade point average of 3.0., SAT score of 1100 or ACT score of 24.

You should present the minimum requirements inclusive of program specific course requirements. More information can be found at [guelphhumber.ca](http://guelphhumber.ca). Applicants should arrange to have the most current grade results sent to Admission Services by **April 1, 2012**.

While British Columbia has automatic electronic submission of grades, they will not arrive in time for our admission decision process. Please have your school forward an official transcript of your final semester mid-term marks.
