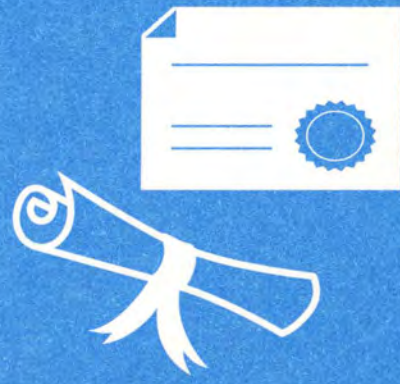

Early Childhood

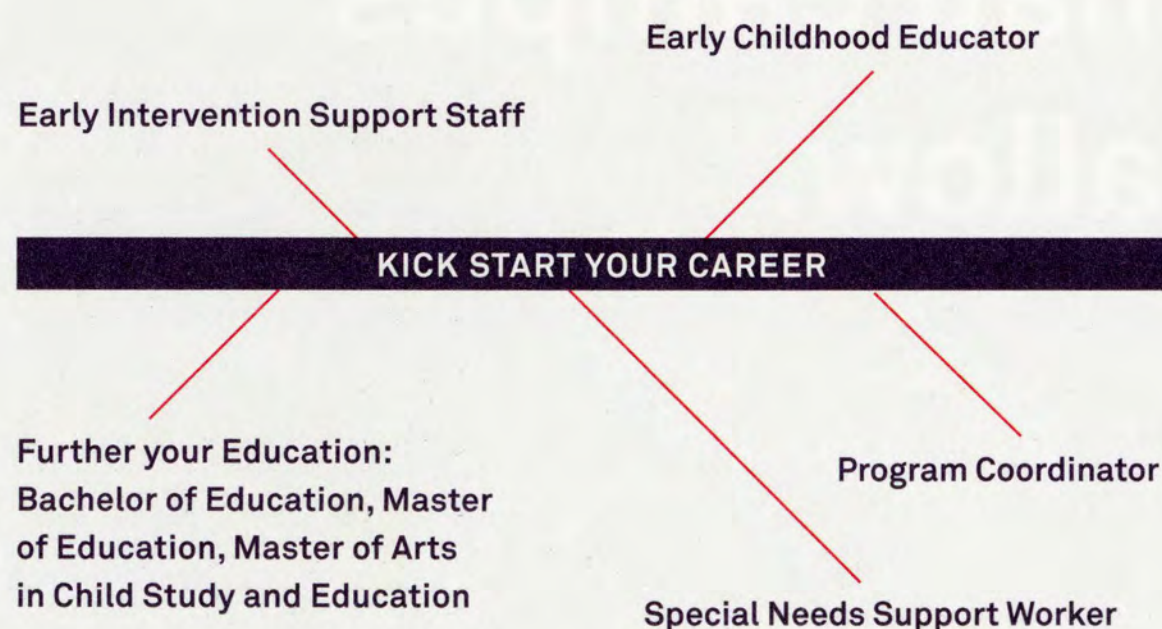
Our Early Childhood program teaches students to become skilled professionals who are prepared to work with the most important group of people in the world: children.

Curriculum

Focusing on the physical, social, emotional and cognitive development of young children within the context of the family and community, the Early Childhood program's first-year courses help to build an understanding of human behaviour in society, issues related to infant and childhood development as well as nutrition and safety.

In your second year you will take courses in curriculum development, parent-child relations, and observing and recording children's behaviour.

The third and fourth years of the program will introduce you to topics such as working with children with diverse needs, program administration, and leadership to fully prepare you for all aspects of the field.

Family and Community Social Services

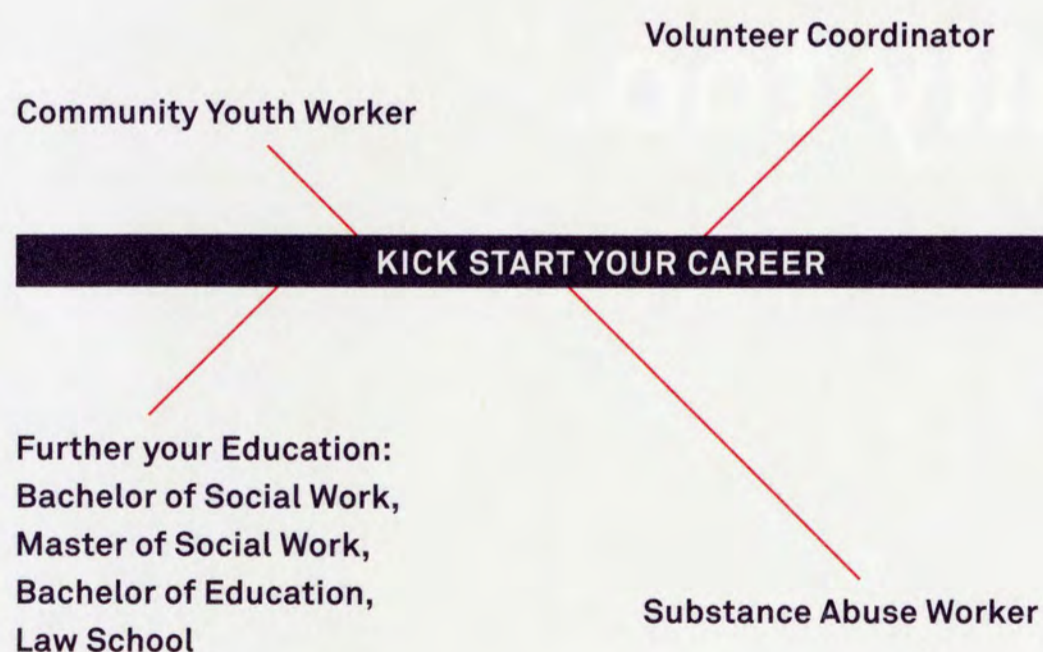
The Family and Community Social Services program explores social issues facing communities and the development and delivery of programs designed to impact individuals, families and communities.

Curriculum

Courses in your first year focus on understanding human behaviour in society and issues related to individuals, families, groups and the field of social services.

In your second year you will engage in theoretical and practical studies in counselling, ethics and working with various vulnerable populations.

Third and fourth years of the program will introduce you to working with groups, communities and the elderly as well as how to handle crisis situations.

Placement 3

In your final year you will become involved in providing direct services through individual, family, group and/or community interventions in a year-long placement.

Justice Studies

Our Justice Studies program gives you the opportunity to gain practical experience within the judicial system and develop strategies for working in a public service role with high-risk individuals in public, private, community and institutional settings.



Justice students placed first in 2009, 2011 and 2012 at the annual international Crime Scene Investigation Tournament at Mount St. Mary's University.

Curriculum

In the first year of the program you will take core courses that provide a background in the justice field such as Crime and Criminal Justice, Introduction to Law, and Principles of Sociology.

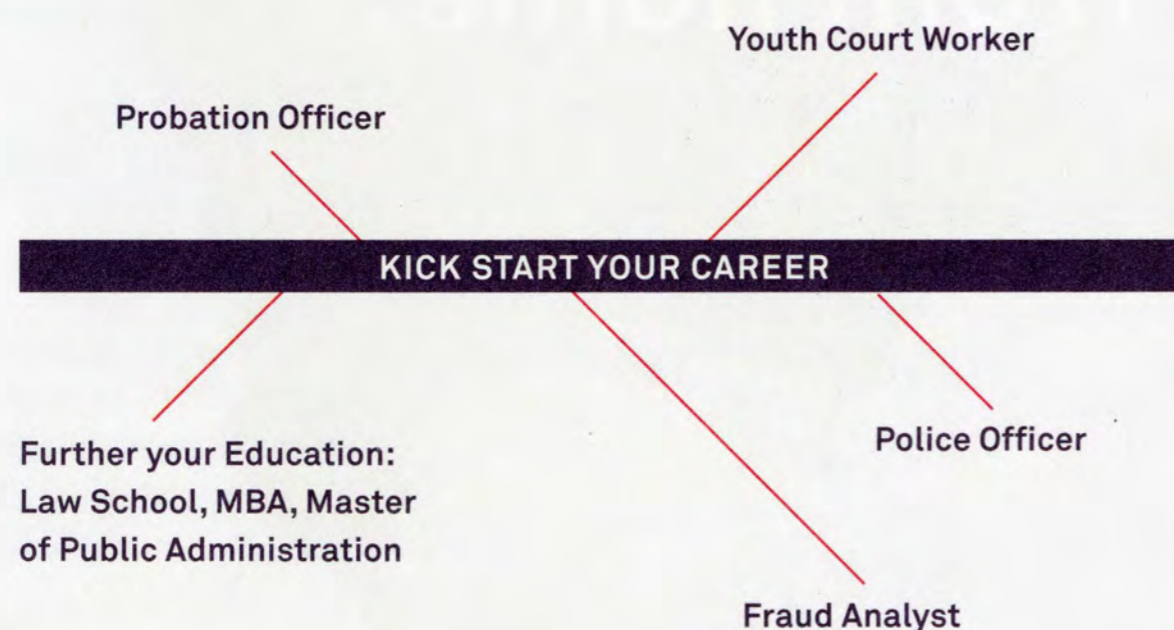
In your second year you will choose between two diploma options to further focus your studies.

In your final two years of the program you will continue to take courses in your diploma stream as well as explore core issues in justice such as ethics, youth and the law, criminology and Canadian social problems.

Kinesiology

Our program focuses on understanding the science of the human body, while also providing you with the opportunity to apply that knowledge to essential roles in kinesiology, health counselling, and fitness and lifestyle assessments.

Curriculum

The first year of the program will introduce you to the field of kinesiology through courses covering anatomy, health counselling, cell biology and physiology.

Your second year focuses on exercise prescription and fitness assessment while applying knowledge gained in your first year.

In your third and fourth years you will participate in two field placements giving you student-specific professional hands-on experience. If graduate studies and research is your goal, you can choose to take part in scientific research through an independent study course.

In your senior years you will complete 200 hours of industry experience. Your placements will be chosen by you and are designed to give you the necessary field experience and skills to propel you into your future career. Students can seek out their own placement or choose from over 250 different placement partners in the health and fitness industry as well as clinical/rehabilitation settings. Some locations students have completed their placements include Brock University Heart Institute, Chiro-Med Rehab Centre and Clarkson Sports and Physiotherapy.

Our Media Studies program allows you to explore the world of media, evaluate the role of mass communication in society and the impact it has on a global scale.

Curriculum

The Media Studies program is designed to produce media-savvy graduates with skills in all areas of media communications – from writing and editing to photography and web design.

In the first two years of the program you will get a strong theoretical background in historical and current media communication through courses such as Mass Communication, Film Study and Ethical Issues in Media ensuring you have a diverse background and understanding of all areas of the field.

In your third and fourth years you will focus your studies in one of four areas of emphasis based on your interests and career goals.

Psychology

Through the Psychology program you will examine foundational and current theories in human behaviour research to explore the diverse domains that shape our understanding of the brain and human mind.

Curriculum

In your first year you will receive a background in key concepts including learning, consciousness, motivation and emotion. You will also gain familiarity with major areas of psychology such as development, personality and social psychology.

In your second year you can choose an area of emphasis that will allow you to apply your knowledge to a related field in Psychology.

In your third and fourth years you will have the opportunity to participate in the Applied Study in Psychology, which focuses on community mental health, as well as our field course to Northern Ontario. In your fourth year you will also choose between an honours seminar or a thesis option to culminate the program.

In your fourth year you will choose between an honours seminar or thesis option, allowing more detailed investigation into an area of Psychology. If grad school is your goal the thesis options gives you the opportunity to receive valuable research experience.

International Opportunities and Field Study

Independent Study

Open to students in all programs, the Independent Study course has taken students to London, England; Florence and Venice, Italy; Buenos Aires, Argentina; and New York, among others.

Through trips abroad students apply the concepts they have learned in class lectures, such as entrepreneurial operations in tourism, media ownership, or modern commerce and banking, by seeing them first-hand or exploring their history.

Past course highlights include attending lectures at the University of Ulster, Belfast, visiting the trading room of RBC Capital Markets in London as well as spending the day at the New York Times.

Field Studies: Connecting to Communities

Our students have the opportunity to explore service learning and be engaged in communities through field study courses. The transformative experiences put theory into practice. For example, Psychology students travelled to Moosonee, Ontario to work alongside mental health agencies of the area and learn first hand about the issues facing Canadian Aboriginal communities.

Participate in Research

A research grant fund at the University of Guelph-Humber gives our students the opportunity to work alongside faculty as research assistants.

Through these assistantships our students are able to put skills they are learning in the classroom into practice while also developing expanded skills in research, data collection and logistics. Students may also have the opportunity to contribute to research publications.



Some of the research projects University of Guelph-Humber students have worked on include Personal Training vs. Group Exercise for Prostate Cancer Patients, The Intellectual History of Canadian Business: An Analysis of Google N-Grams, and The Couples Research Study.

Student Transition and Resource Team (START)

Every incoming University of Guelph-Humber student is assigned a Student Transition and Resource Team (START) Leader. A START Leader is a current student with many of the answers you're looking for regarding the services and resources available to you on campus. It wasn't long ago they were new students too!

Kick Start

Once you choose the University of Guelph-Humber, you'll want to get a feel for what life will be like on campus. In July, we offer a one-day program called Kick Start. The Kick Start program is designed to help you and your family prepare for university life. The day is filled with engaging and informative sessions for both students and family members. Meet current students, new students and Student Services staff members. You will leave with a better understanding of what to expect when you arrive in September and what resources are available throughout your studies.

Orientation

Orientation is a one-day fun-filled program designed to connect new students and help you prepare to succeed at the University of Guelph-Humber. You will meet other incoming students, START Leaders, staff and faculty. Orientation is your official welcome and introduction to life at the University of Guelph-Humber.

Student Services

Success begins here: visit Student Services to see your Academic Advisor, Career and Placement Services, Student Life, and Alumni Services.

Academic Advisors

Your Academic Advisor will assist you with course selection, review your education plans, help you to interpret degree regulations and refer you to key on-campus resources.

Learning Support Peers (LSP):

LSPs are current students who work alongside Academic Advisors and are trained to support you as you make important decisions that relate to your studies. They deliver Learning Skills Workshops that include sessions in time management and exam preparation.

Career and Placement Services

Career and Placement Services is ready to assist students and alumni in finding full-time, part-time and summer employment, offer assistance in resumé writing and interviewing techniques, and can provide students with job search tips and resources. Graduate school advising is also available for students considering further education, as well as support for finding and securing field placements and internships.

Student Life

The Student Life department will help you with your transition to university with programs like Kick Start and Orientation. They also work hard to bring you both fun and educational events throughout the academic year.

Alumni Services

Our University of Guelph-Humber graduates continue to be an important part of our community. Through Alumni Services, you have access to a variety of programs and services that will keep you informed, involved and engaged in the community after you graduate.

Places to go

Learning Commons

An informal student-centered learning environment for group meetings and individual study. Staff in the Learning Commons are available to help you with research materials for assignments and will assist you with software and technology questions.

Library

You have access to two major academic library systems: the University of Guelph library system (which includes the University of Waterloo and Wilfrid Laurier University) and Humber libraries.

Math Centre and Writing Centre

The Math Centre offers assistance in calculus and statistics, while the Writing Centre provides support with essay writing and thesis development.

People to see

Aboriginal Student Services

A wide range of services are offered to support Aboriginal students including academic, personal, cultural and career support.

Child Care

Humber has two centres on campus designed to accommodate the child care needs of students, staff and community members on a full-time basis. Child care is provided by Registered Early Childhood Educators. Applications should be made early as the centres usually have a waiting list.

Disability Services

Students diagnosed with a learning disability, mobility impairment, vision impairment, hearing impairment, medical condition or disabling condition can contact Disability Services for support services, access to assistive technologies and for special accommodations for tests and exams. All services are free and confidential.

Health Services

Experienced nurses are on duty in the Health Centre and physicians are available by appointment Monday to Friday. As a full-time student, you will be covered for accident, sickness and dental insurance through the student health plan.

Interfaith Services

An Interfaith Chaplain is available for spiritual guidance to students of all faiths and backgrounds. An Interfaith Prayer Room is open for individual or group prayer.

International Services

University can be especially challenging if you are studying in a new country. The International Student Services Office can help you make a smooth transition to the University. They can assist you in matters such as purchasing medical insurance, finding housing and linking new students with senior students.

Peer Tutors

Peer Tutors are available to provide one-on-one assistance to students having difficulties with a specific course or wanting some additional support to improve their grades. Peer Tutors are students who have achieved 80% or better in their courses, and are ready and willing to help others do the same.

Personal Counsellors

Professional counselling is provided free of charge in a private and confidential setting through the Counselling department. Counsellors work with students to assist them in identifying and resolving problems and concerns. When necessary, counsellors will refer students to appropriate services in the community.

Public Safety

Your welfare and safety is of paramount importance. Campus Security patrols the campus 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The Campus Walk Program provides a walking partner for students, employees and visitors who wish to be accompanied to their vehicle on the property, to the campus residence or to the perimeter of the campus property. Security also provides a service to assist students who experience car trouble.

Work-Study Program

The Work-Study Program provides you with access to part-time jobs on campus. Positions are available in various departments including student life, athletics and residence. The program is a great way to earn money and gain experience while you study.

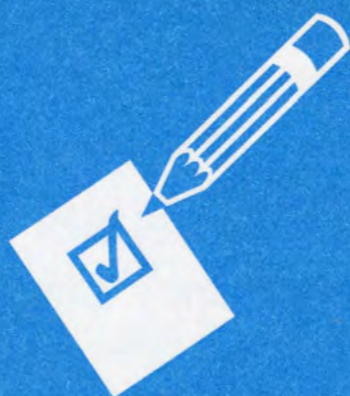

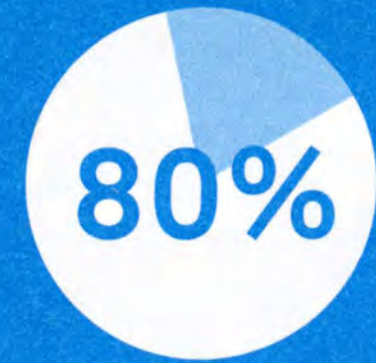

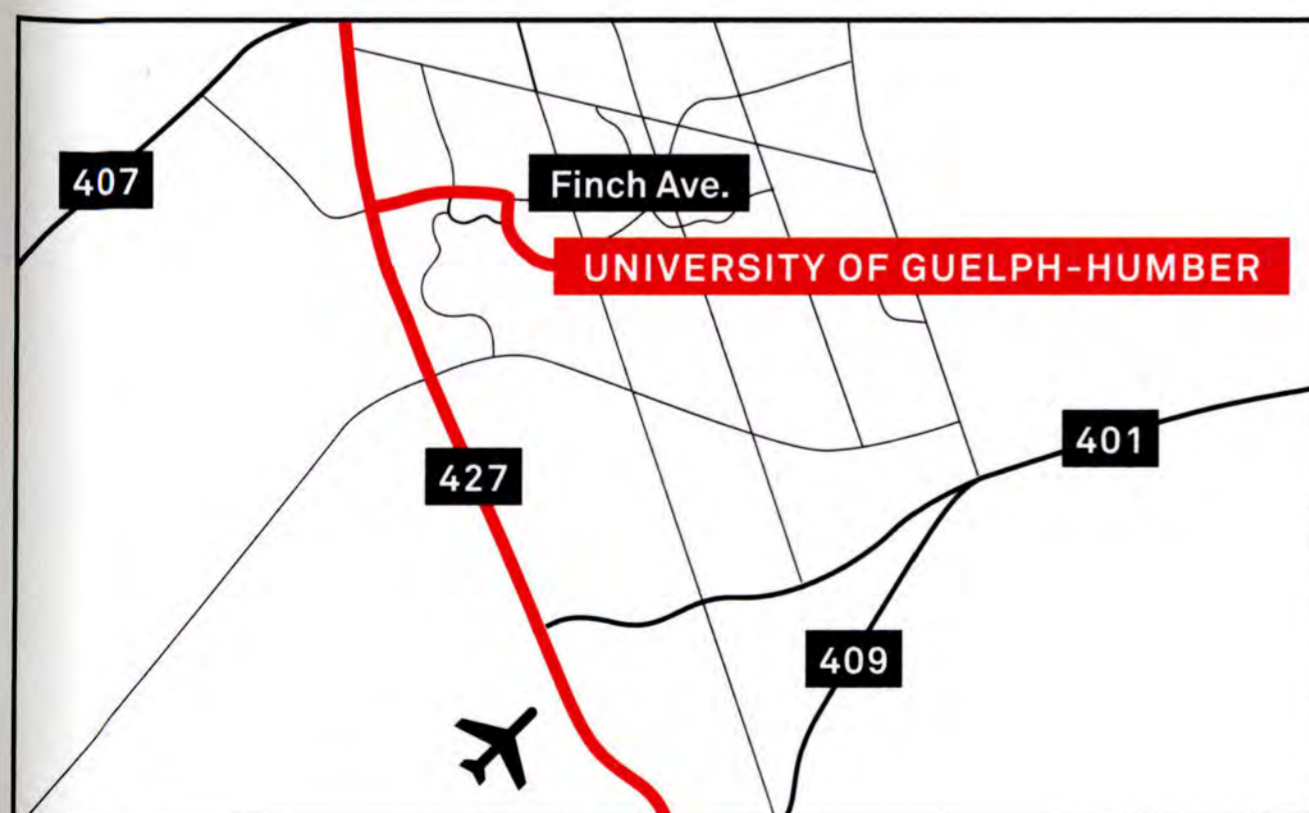
