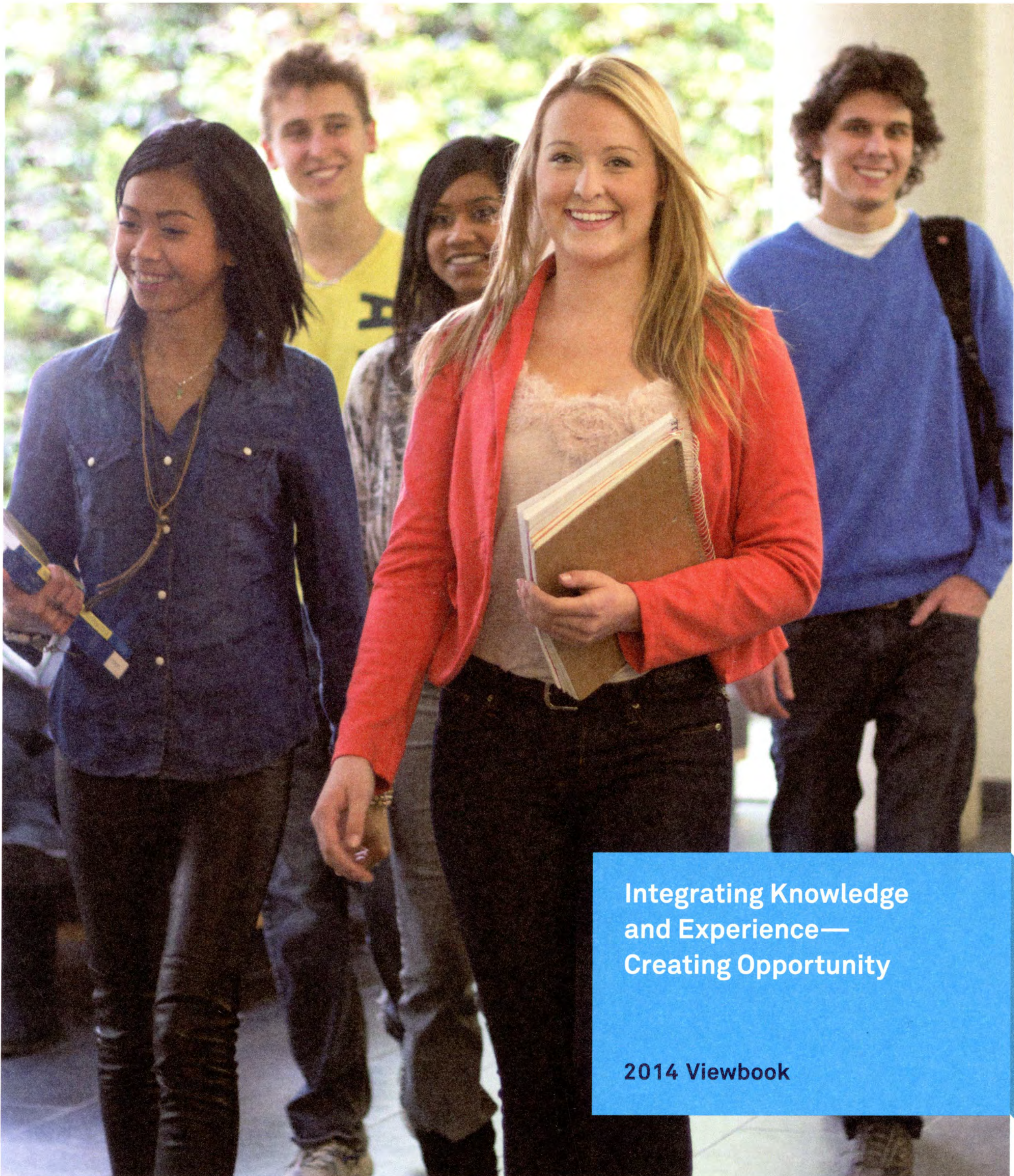

As you take the next step forward and begin your new journey, know that you are not alone. We are here to help. I look forward to seeing you on campus soon.

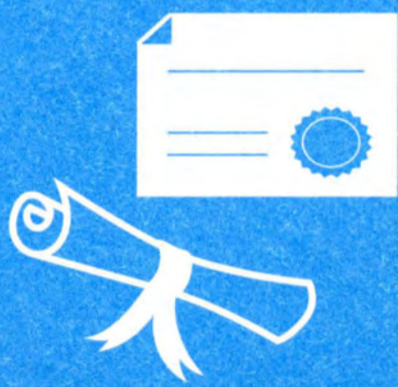

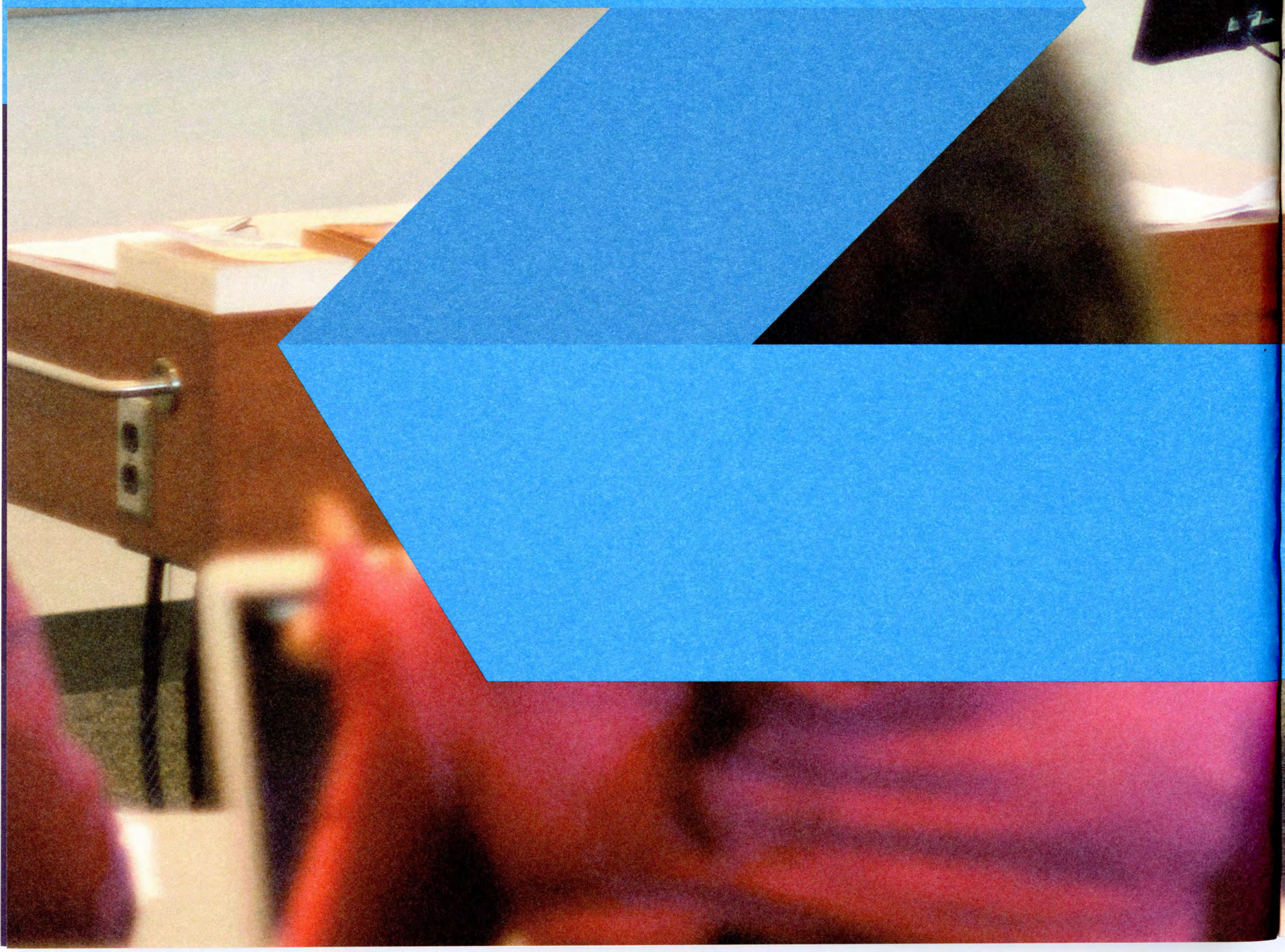

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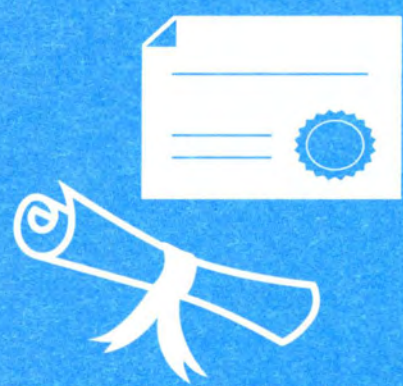

Our Business program combines an in-depth knowledge of the business world with the hands-on skills necessary to lead and succeed in any field.

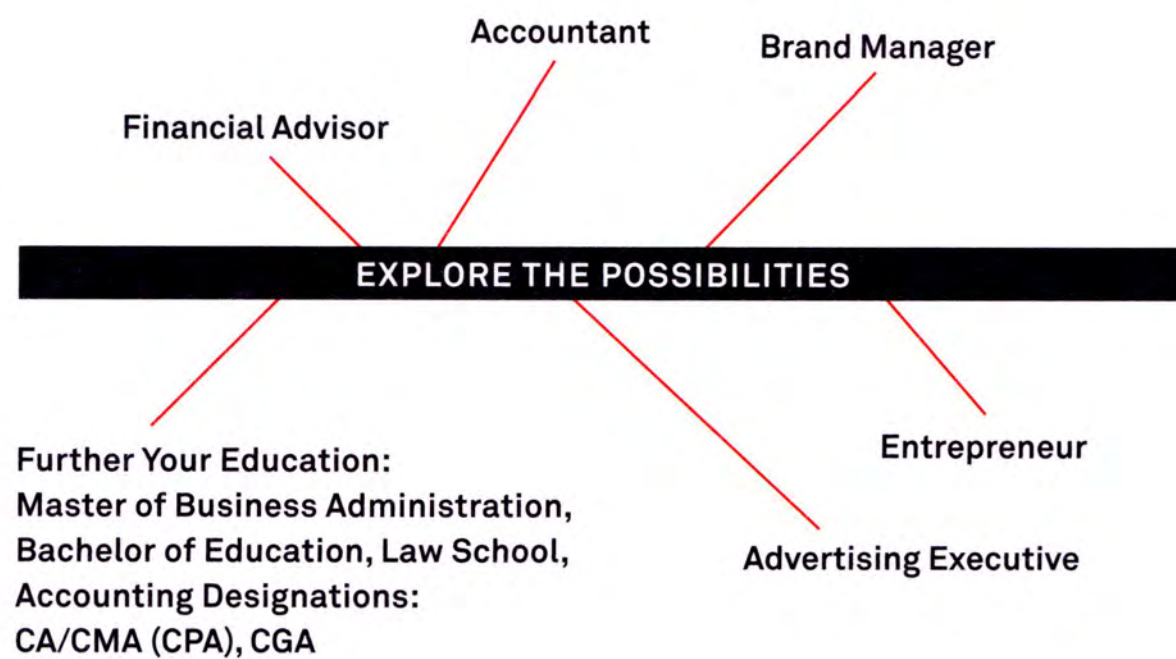
## Curriculum

# Early Childhood

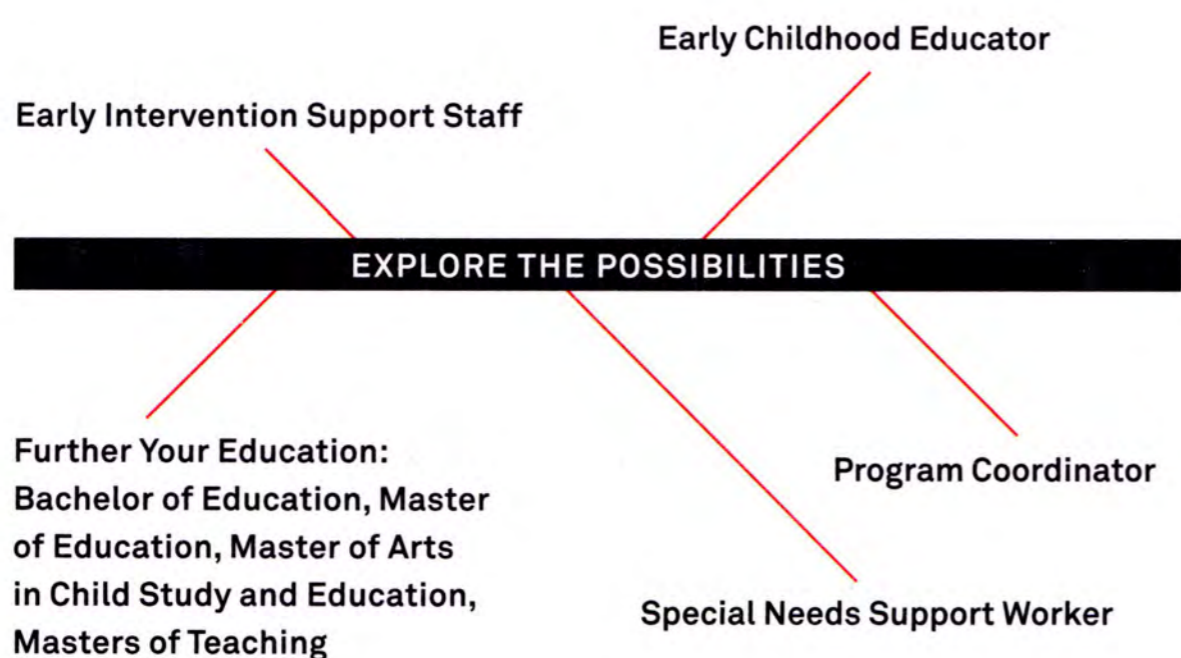
Our Early Childhood program teaches you how to be a skilled professional who is prepared to work with the most precious resource in the world: children.

## Curriculum

Focusing on the physical, social, emotional and cognitive development of young children within the context of the family and community, the program's first-year courses help to build an understanding of human behaviour in society, issues related to infant and childhood development, as well as nutrition and safety.

In your second year, you will take courses in curriculum development, parent-child relations, and observing and recording children's behaviour.

The third and fourth years of the program will introduce you to topics such as working with children with diverse needs, program administration and leadership to fully prepare you for all aspects of the field.



Access to the Early Childhood Resource Room provides \$100,000 in learning materials and toys for you to borrow for use at your placements.

### Placements 5 & 6

Based on your previous experience, you will select a year-long setting tailored to your career aspirations and knowledge base.

**Note:** Agencies offering placement opportunities require all students to complete a Vulnerable Sector Screening, documentation of immunization and a First Aid/CPR certificate.

# Family and Community Social Services

The Family and Community Social Services program explores social issues, as well as the development and delivery of programs designed to impact individuals, families and communities.

## Curriculum

Courses in your first year focus on understanding human behaviour in society and issues related to individuals, families, groups and the field of social work.

In your second year, you will engage in theoretical and practical studies in counselling, ethics and working with various vulnerable populations.

The third and fourth years of the program will introduce you to working with groups, communities and the elderly, as well as how to handle crisis situations.



A new FCSS lab has aspects of a community agency with an intake office, counselling room, one-way observation mirrors and more.

Provides you with an initial exposure to the field of social work and a variety of issues linked to community agency operations.

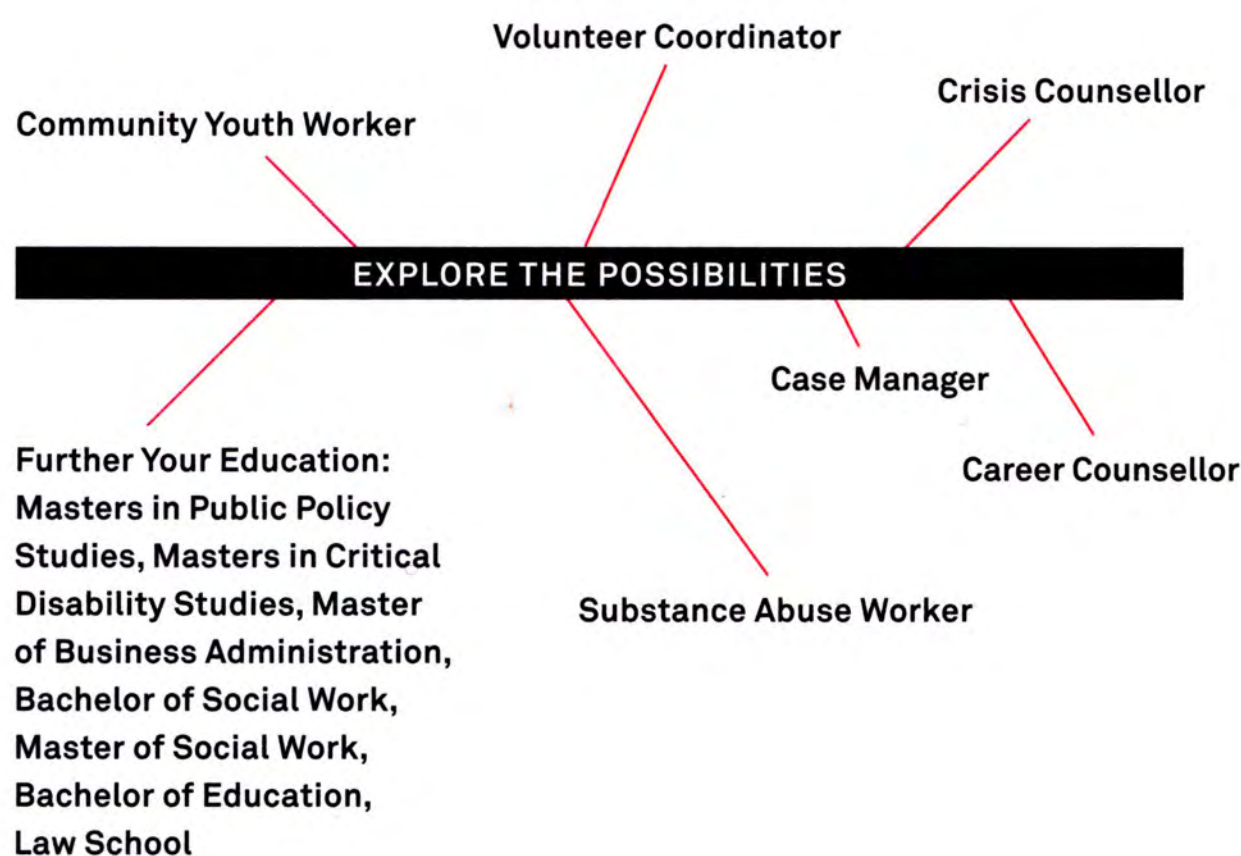
### Placement 2

# Justice Studies

Our Justice Studies program gives you the opportunity to gain practical experience within the justice system and develop strategies for working in a public service role with high-risk individuals in public, private, community and institutional settings.

## Curriculum

In the first year of the program, you will take core courses that provide a general background in the justice field such as Crime and Criminal Justice, Introduction to Law and Principles of Sociology.

In your second year, you will choose between two diploma options to further focus your studies:

### / Community and Justice Services

### / Police Foundations

In your final two years of the program, you will continue to take advanced courses, as well as explore core issues in justice, such as ethics, youth and the law, criminology and Canadian social problems that will prepare you for graduate school, law school or the workplace.



Since 2009, justice students placed in the top 5 at the International CSI Competition—finishing first three times.

## Get to Work!

In your second and third years, you will build your network by completing 200 hours of community service placement to develop your awareness of contemporary social issues.

Past placements include the Toronto Police Service, Ontario Justice Education Network, Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Special Investigations Unit, Ontario SPCA, Victim and Witness Assistance Program, Brampton Crown Attorney's Office, Toronto Court Services and Ontario Legal Aid.

# Kinesiology

Our program focuses on understanding the science of the human body, while also providing you with the opportunity to apply that knowledge to essential roles in kinesiology, health counselling, and fitness and lifestyle assessments.



Access to 7 kinesiology labs, including a human anatomy lab, means applying what you're learning in class!

## Curriculum

The first year of the program will introduce you to the field of kinesiology through courses covering anatomy, health counselling, cell biology and physiology.

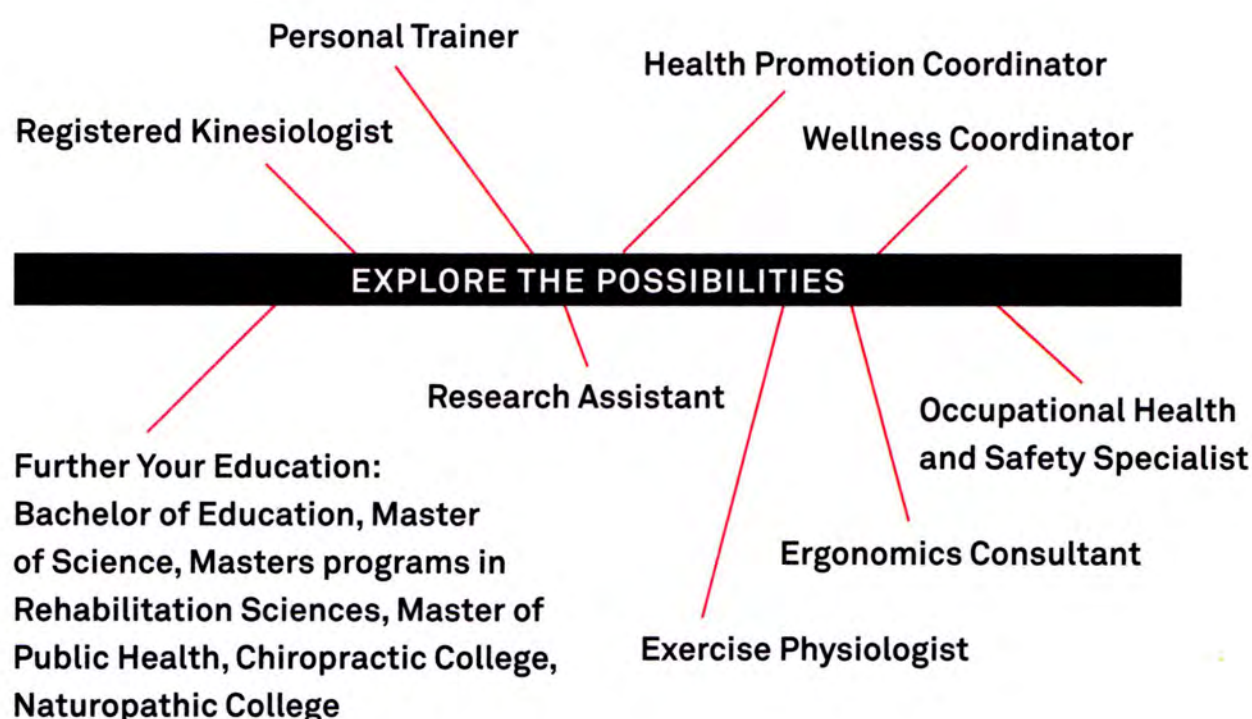
Your second year focuses on exercise prescription and fitness assessment while applying knowledge gained in your first year.

In your third and fourth years, you will participate in two field placements giving you hands-on experience. If graduate studies and research are your goal, you can choose to take part in scientific research through an independent study course.

# Media Studies

Our Media Studies program allows you to explore the world of media, examine the role of mass communication in society and evaluate its impact on a global scale.

## Curriculum

The program is designed to produce media-savvy graduates with skills in all areas of media communications – from writing and editing to photography and web design.

In the first two years of the program, you will build a diverse background and understanding of historical media communication and look to the future through courses such as Mass Communication, Film Study and Ethical Issues in Media, and be introduced to a variety of media fields.

In your third and fourth years, you have the option to focus your studies in one of four areas of emphasis based on your interests and career goals, or take courses from each. In the final semester, you will work with other students from the four areas of emphasis in a multi-discipline, multi-platform project involving a magazine and a media conference.

## Get to Work!

Following your third year of study, you will participate in an internship of more than 200 hours (over a 12-week period) in a media organization.

# Psychology

Through the Psychology program you will examine foundational and current theories to explore the diverse areas that shape our understanding of human thought, feeling and behaviour.



Students in the field study course travel 850 km to Moosonee, Ontario to study alongside mental health agencies in Aboriginal communities.

## Curriculum

In your first year, you will receive a background in key concepts of psychology and exposure to foundational courses.

In your second year, you will take a variety of psychology and elective courses that will prepare you for the opportunities ahead. You will also have the option to choose one of three areas of emphasis that will allow you to apply your knowledge to a field complementary to psychology.

In your third and fourth years, you will have the option to participate in the Applied Study in Psychology course, which focuses on community mental health, as well as our field course in Northern Ontario. In your fourth year, you will choose between an honours seminar or thesis option, allowing more detailed investigation into a specific topic in psychology.

## Get to Work!

In the Applied Study in Psychology course, you will combine academic study with a minimum of 60 hours of workplace experience. Placements have included the Mood Disorders Association of Ontario, Pilot Place Society, Performance Psychology, St. Leonard's Place - Peel, Aphasia Institute, International Journal of Mental Health and Addiction, and Richmond Hill Hospital.

If graduate school is your goal, the thesis option in year four gives you the opportunity to receive valuable research experience.

## International Opportunities

You have the opportunity to learn and explore the world. Through the Study Abroad course students have travelled to Australia, Italy, Japan, Portugal, Spain and more.

Through instructor guided study tours, you experience concepts discussed in class first hand, including entrepreneurship in the tourism industry, along with the differences between public and private sector approaches to the media, and the history of commerce and banking.

Past highlights include attending lectures at the University of Ulster, Belfast, visiting the trading room of RBC Capital Markets in London, studying Soka education in Tokyo, and spending the day at the New York Times or BBC.

## Field Study

Psychology students have the opportunity to explore service learning and be engaged in community support through a field study course. The transformative experience puts theory into practice. Senior level students travel to Moosonee, Ontario to examine mental health agencies and learn first hand about the issues facing Canadian Aboriginal communities.

## Research

A research grant fund at the University gives you the opportunity to work alongside faculty as a research assistant. More than 50 students have been employed as assistants since the program began in 2011, totalling more than 10,000 research hours.



Through these assistantships you are able to put classroom knowledge into practice, while also developing additional skills in conducting experiments, research and data collection. You may also have the opportunity to contribute to research publications.

Some of the research projects students have worked on include: "A Qualitative Study of Mental Health in a Northern Cree Community", "Extended Consumer Brand Relationship Theory", "The Couples Research Study" and "Personal Training versus Group Exercise for Prostate Cancer Patients".



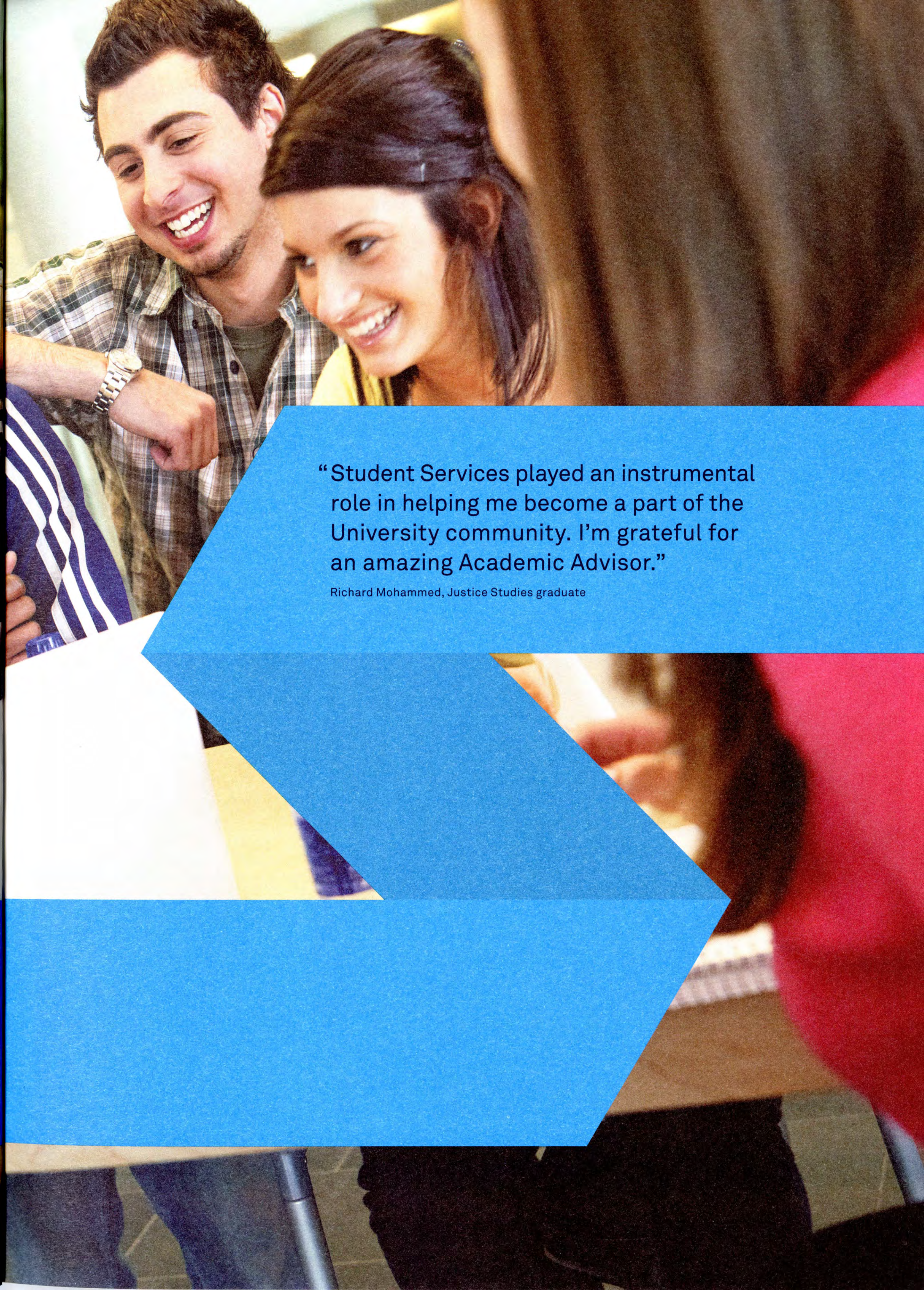

## Student Transition and Resource Team (START)

A Student Transition and Resource Team (START) Leader is a current student with many of the answers you're looking for regarding the services and resources available to you on campus. It wasn't long ago they were new students too! As an incoming student, you have access to a team of START Leaders throughout the summer leading up to your first year.

## Kick Start

Once you choose the University of Guelph-Humber, you'll want to get a feel for what life will be like on campus. In July, we offer a one-day program called Kick Start to help high school students and their families prepare for university life. The day is filled with engaging and informative sessions for you and your family. Meet other first-year and senior students, as well as Student Services staff.

## Orientation

## Academic Advisors

Your Academic Advisor will assist you with course selection, review your education plans, help you to interpret degree regulations and refer you to key on-campus resources.

### Support Peers

Support Peers are current students who work alongside staff and are trained to support you as you make important decisions that relate to your studies and career goals. They offer workshops and one-on-one assistance throughout the year.

## Student Life

With the motto, “Get Involved! Be Informed!” the Student Life team is here to ensure you have the best university experience. They provide leadership and development opportunities, from help with your transition to university—programs like Kick Start and Orientation—to your official graduation at Convocation. Enjoy fun, educational events throughout the academic year.

## Career and Placement Services

Career and Placement Services staff are available to help you find course-related placements and internships, which are integral to your success. Available to you from first year onward, Career and Placement Services can help you set and achieve your career goals. Career events are held throughout the year so that you can network with employers. Staff can assist you in your search for summer, part-time and full-time employment, or provide advice on further education.

## Alumni Services

Our graduates continue to be an important part of our community. As a student you will benefit through alumni mentoring—a chance to meet graduates working in your field. As an alumnus you have access to a variety of programs and services that will keep you engaged in the University community. Take advantage of social events, business networking opportunities and career services.









# Support Services

## Aboriginal Student Services

You can find a range of services to assist Aboriginal students including academic, personal, cultural and career support.

## Accounting, Math & Writing Centres

You can receive support for your accounting courses at the Accounting Centre, while the Math Centre offers assistance in calculus and statistics. The Writing Centre provides you with support for essay writing and thesis development.

## Bookstore

The bookstore offers convenient one-stop shopping for all your academic needs: new and used textbooks, reference and reading materials, public transit passes, university swag and more. Inquire about student discounts on software and computers. Shop on campus or online.

## Child Care

Humber has two centres on campus to accommodate your child care needs, as well as those of staff and community members, on a full-time basis. Child care is provided by Registered Early Childhood Educators. Applications should be made early as the centres usually have a waiting list.

## Disability Services

Disability Services provides you with confidential and free assistance to address the effects of disability on academic performance. If you require specialized services to assist with a learning, physical, sensory or psychological disability or condition you should contact Disability Services upon submission of your application. Services include assistive technologies, academic accommodations and liaison services.

## Health Services

Nurses and physicians are available in the Health Centre. You also have access to Campus Dental and an on-campus pharmacy. As a full-time student, you will be covered by accident, sickness and dental insurance through the student health plan.

## Interfaith Services

An Interfaith Chaplain is available to you for spiritual guidance for all faiths and backgrounds. The Interfaith Prayer Room is open for individual or group prayer.

## International Student Services

University can be especially challenging if you are studying in a new country. The International Student Services Office can help you make a smooth transition. They can assist you in matters such as purchasing medical insurance, finding housing and linking new students with senior students.







### **Internet Access**

Wireless network and internet access is available in most locations around campus.

### **Learning Commons**

An informal student-centered learning environment for group meetings and individual study. Staff in the Learning Commons are available to help you with research materials for assignments and will assist you with software and technology questions.

### **Library**

You have access to two major academic library systems: the University of Guelph library system (which includes the University of Waterloo and Wilfrid Laurier University) and Humber libraries. Subject librarians are here to help you find the materials needed for a specific course or program.

### **Media**

You can borrow equipment from Humber's Support Centre, such as data projectors, digital cameras, digital camcorders, laptops and multimedia carts. Media Studies students also have access to the University's Media Cage with a wide selection of professional video and photography equipment.

### **Peer Tutors**

Peer Tutors are available to provide one-on-one assistance to you should you find a specific course challenging or want some additional support to improve your grades. Peer Tutors are students who have achieved 80% or better in their courses, and are ready and willing to help others do the same.

### **Personal Counsellors**

Professional counselling is provided free of charge in a private and confidential setting through the Counselling department. Counsellors work with you to assist you in identifying and resolving

problems and concerns. When necessary, counsellors will refer you to appropriate services in the community.

### **Public Safety**

Your welfare and safety is of paramount importance. Campus Security patrols the campus 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The Campus Walk Program provides a walking partner for students, employees and visitors who wish to be accompanied to their vehicle on the property, to the campus residence or to the perimeter of the campus property. Security also provides a service to assist you if you experience car trouble.


### **Work-Study Program**

The Work-Study Program provides you with access to part-time jobs on campus. Positions are available in various departments including Student Life, Athletics, Public Safety and Student Residence. The program is a great way to earn money and gain experience while you study.

### Transcripts and required documents:

Official high school and college/university transcripts should be sent directly to the University of Guelph-Humber from the originating institution in a sealed envelope. A high school graduation certificate which would admit you to an internationally recognized university in your home country is normally acceptable.

You should include among your senior level courses specific subject requirements at the advanced level that are required for admission to the degree program of your choice. Possession of minimum requirements does not guarantee entry.
